In the early days of our Fellowship, we set up a church website which gave us an internet presence and resulted in a number of people either visiting us or joining us.


Our website was admittedly unsophisticated and had a rather dated look, however it served it's purpose.

# Sunday, 24th March - Mrs. Joyce Hall - (Harvest Thanksgiving) A Rich Harvest





For this, our Harvest Thanksgiving service, Joyce drew her thoughts from two Bible passages (Luke 5: 1-11 and John 21: 1-11) both mentioning fishing.

In the Luke reading Jesus tells His disciples to cast out their nets. Peter did so but a little half-heartedly as they had been fishing all night without success and were tired. They had a big catch, so large the nets began to break.

In John, again Jesus calls out to cast out their nets. They did so and again made a big catch. As soon as he realises it was Jesus who called out, Peter jumps into the water to go to him. This time the nets do not break.

We can pray for big or small things and should not limit our expectations of God. He is generous. Half-heartedness may lead to unnecessary concerns / the need to repair torn nets.

# **The Alford Mystery**

John and Pat H. came along to our Harvest Thanksgiving service and during supper John sidled up to me and asked if the author of the hymn 962 (Come, ye thankful people, come) that we had sung was the same Alford that had written Colonel Bogey March. I'm afraid I was unable to offer any enlightenment.

A few days later I received the following e-mail from John.

Thank you for the reminder/invitation to the service, last Sunday. The message, service, fellowship and food made it all worthwhile.

Maybe you remember my query about Henry Alford who wrote the words of hymn 962. Well, Henry [1810- 1871] was an English Churchman, scholar, poet, writer, theologian. hymnodist....

Kenneth Ricketts [1881- 1945] was British military through and through who, it seems, wrote Colonel Bogey, using his mother's maiden name of Alford and composed a number of marches.

So there. You have it! No connection!

Straying away from the hymn and looking at Colonel Bogey March, we find a golfing connection.

After a comment at a golf game likening a player to a Bogey man, referring to a song with the line "I'm the Bogey man, catch me if you can.", Bogey became the standard score for a good round of golf, what we today know as a par round. Golfers played against the course known as Bogey. Bogey became Colonel Bogey at a services golf club where every member had a rank.

The march tune was said to have been inspired by a military man who was also a golfer. That golfer did not shout "Fore" when it was called for. Instead, he whistled a two-note phrase, a descending interval which begins each line of the march's melody.

As players and courses improved the par score for golf holes went down but Bogey ratings remained the same. Eventually a Bogey score became known as 1 more than par for a hole and that is how it is understood today.

# **Apologetics Study Group**

"This is eternal life, that they know you, the only true God, and Jesus Christ whom you have sent." Jn 17:3.

That is what Theology is all about: knowing God in all his fullness. Moore Theological College has an excellent course which makes it easy, called the Preliminary Theological Certificate. A group of us wanted to give that a go and with a bit of discussion we thought we'd start off with the Apologetics course. After advertising at church we started off with Mark (leading), Katherine, Maree, Kelly, Miriam, Laurie, Trish, Vince, Joy and the occasional visit by John Mann. We met from 6-7 on Wednesday evenings so it was possible for both workers and seniors to attend.

Apologetics is defending the Christian faith, which we have seen has become more difficult in recent times. In that environment, the way we go about it is just as important as what we say. This is how the course describes itself:

Apologetics is written with the conviction that it is more than just intellectual and philosophical debate. Apologetics involves people's whole beings. We need to be concerned with how people feel toward Christ and the gospel as well as how they think. So the course provides apologetic arguments along with practical guidance on the attitude and behaviour that must accompany those arguments.

We've had some vigorous discussions, cold nights and difficult concepts; but we've learnt a lot and enjoyed it very much. Hopefully we'll have the opportunity to put it into action soon.

For those who are interested, next up we will be studying. "God's Plan from Beginning to End." It will be a helicopter view across the whole Bible showing how the message of the gospel develops and culminates in Jesus Christ.

This was a service where hymns were used to highlight aspects of our faith and to express our thanks and praise to God to a greater extent that in our normal services.


Of course Scripture readings and prayers were also an important part of the service.

The Church is blessed with the power of God's Word in the form of the Bible and that power can transform lives.



The Charles Wesley hymn, "O for a thousand tongues to sing" claims in verse 4

He [God] speaks, and, listening to His voice,

New life the dead receive. ...

The humble poor believe.

God's Word is powerful and it is found in the Bible.

The story of Naaman in 2 Kings 5 illustrates how seemingly unimportant people or things can bring about big changes.

The unnamed Israelite slave girl is the hero of the story. If it wasn't for her, Naaman would not have seen the prophet Elisha and been cured of his leprosy. She pointed him to Elisha for his leprosy cure and in a similar way to her we can point sinners to the means of their salvation, their Saviour.

The slave girl had no status and we may feel inadequate but the power of God is hidden behind weakness. Naaman had grand ideas of what his cure might involve but he was asked to do something very simple to be cured. Likewise the way of salvation is very simple but profound. "For God so loved the world that he gave his one and only Son, that whoever believes in him shall not perish but have eternal life." [John 3: 16]. Belief, faith and trust is all that is needed for salvation but many people cannot bring themselves to simply believe.

God's Word can transform any life and we are able to point people to His Word.

### Sunday, 26th May - Dr. lan Leung - The Parable of the Two Lost Sons



The term 'prodigal son' is well known and used loosely to mark the return of someone, perhaps a sports player, to a place or team they had previously left.

Jesus' parable of the prodigal son is these days less well known and what it teaches often lost or rejected.

Luke 15 contains three parables celebrating what is lost being found: the lost sheep; the lost coin; and the lost son - the common theme being that God desires to release sinners from

their sin.

The lost son is a tale with three main characters: the wasteful and then repentant son; the compassionate father; and the begrudging older brother. Often the focus is concentrated on the younger, prodigal son but perhaps the parable might be better described as the parable of two lost sons.

The younger son is selfish and reckless. He squanders what he has and eventually hits rock bottom. We, by sinning, also destroy ourselves. We deserve what we get. The son came to his senses and returned to his father's home repentantly.

The father was glad to welcome his son back and celebrated, just as God welcomes repentant sinners.

The older son refuses to celebrate. He is unforgiving and jealous. He doesn't understand his father's generosity and compassion. He felt he had to earn everything by his own efforts. He too needed to repent.

We need to repent of our sin. We need to celebrate when others repent of their sin.

Church isn't a place for the sinless - churches would be empty. Church is for sinners.

God is good to us and wants the best for us. He is pleased to welcome repentant sinners back into his care.

### Sunday, 2nd June - Rev. Bob Prior - Our God is Sovereign

**OUR** God IS Sovereign!

He is our God and He has supreme power and authority.

Many people live in despair. They don't recognise God's sovereignty.

Climate change is an issue raising great community fear, just as the threat of nuclear war or the communist threat has done in the past. It may be an important issue, however God remains sovereign - in control - and it is His will that will be done.



We can see God's sovereignty displayed in Joseph's life.

Joseph had dreams indicating that his brothers and parents would bow down to him yet he was sold to traders going to Egypt by his jealous brothers. There he was slave to Pharaoh's bodyguard captain whom he served faithfully until thrown in prison after a false accusation by his master's wife.

Joseph had served God, his father and master well, but he had become enslaved, falsely accused and imprisoned. He must have wondered what was going on, but he continued to trust in God.

Pharaoh had two dreams and Joseph was brought from the prison to interpret them. He told Pharaoh he could not do it himself, but God would provide the answer.

Joseph gave Pharaoh God's message and was placed in control of Egypt, second only to Pharaoh himself.

Eventually Joseph's brothers came to Egypt and before Joseph to get food during a seven year period of famine and his father came later. When Joseph revealed himself to his brothers, he told them it was not just their actions that had sent him to Egypt, but God acting to save them.

In His own time God's plans had come about.

God had always been in control and He still is.

Bob shared with us his own experience earlier in the week.

Enthused by a sermon similar to what he preached that he heard in Darwin where he and his wife were holidaying, Bob was looking for God's purpose when He and his wife were refused boarding on the plane for their flight home due to medical concerns.

At the hospital Bob had the opportunity to chat with a girl who had severe depression and had contacted the police for help. She was most appreciative of Bob's friendly counsel and for sharing his own experience of depression with her. He was able to share the gospel with her and she has his phone number so she is able to continue the contact. Bob requested prayer for Jasmine.

In **Uganda** we have been supporting the dual ministries Uganda School of Biblical Studies (SBS) and Church-based Training in Biblical Studies (CTBS) which equip pastors and lay people with a sound knowledge and understanding of the scriptures. **Dan and Andrew** have both visited us several times over the last few years with Andrew here late last year.
