We must all decide how we will live our lives as the coronavirus uncertainty continues. Some of us may decide to be extra cautious due to existing ailments or other reasons.


Generally accepted and recommended precautions include using hand sanitiser or washing your hands with soap and water regularly particularly after touching objects other people may have handled.

Avoiding touching your face and taking care when preparing or taking food items is also suggested.

The Australian government website says

Everyone should practise good hygiene to protect against infections. Good hygiene includes:

- washing your hands often with soap and water
- using a tissue and cover your mouth when you cough or sneeze
- avoiding close contact with others, such as touching



"it is most important to heed the advice of the health professionals whose expertise is to protect the community and prevent the spread of the disease, and to be aware of public health announcements." [from a letter to Uniting Churches from President Deidre Palmer]


Kids Spot

Dear Friends at Canberra Christian Fellowship

Greetings from David, Janenne and Rachel. ... This week sees us being back in South Africa for three months following our period of Home Assignment. ...

The school year is now in full swing. The beginning of the new school year is always a busy time. Getting stationary organised for all the children and new school uniforms. We were blessed this year to receive a donation for new good quality



school shoes for all the children. We attended parent information sessions with children starting high school and attended first day with little ones going to Grade R (kindergarten).

It is now a government requirement that all caregivers (the house parents who live in the cottages with the children) employed by Child and Youth Care Centres such as iKhethelo, must have a specified level of qualification as a Child and Youth Care Worker. Not all of our caregivers have this qualification. This year we will be getting our caregivers trained to achieve this qualification. Unfortunately, our longest-serving caregiver is unlikely to achieve this as she can neither read nor write. This will be very difficult for her and for everyone at iKhethelo. ...

Care and Prayer

Casting a superficial eye over our Fellowship, an outside observer might see a group of people mixing in a friendly manner each week as they come together for their regular Sunday gathering. There is a mix of ages, perhaps slightly more on the elderly side, but overall it is an unremarkable group.

Unremarkable we may be, but a closer knowledge of each of us reveals a more complex picture.

Age is a common factor for several of our number along with the restrictions and difficulties that it imposes.

Sickness is also a reality for many. Several of us have had recent hospital visits or stays ranging from hours to months. Ongoing treatment for serious conditions is a fact of life for some of us.

Bereavement has come as family members or friends pass on.

Lack of mobility, distance or other factors prevent some of our number joining with us and benefitting from the companionship of their friends.

Scanning our congregation for these complaints leaves very few of us untouched and it is quite likely that even they may be weighed down by trials of their own of which we are unaware.

Now that I have everyone depressed, let me give the good news.

God is with us, knows all our cares and sorrows and is our constant comfort and friend.

He has brought us into fellowship with Himself and with each other.

I am sure God wants us to extend His love for us to each other by looking out for each other and offering practical and prayerful support as we are able and as He shows us. I know that phone lines run hot with calls of concern, comfort and mere contact, visits are made to those more isolated and prayers offered for each other.

Unremarkable we may be in a human sense but God is using us in a remarkable way to build up, sustain and grow our little part of His Kingdom.

Sunday, 16th February - Mr. Phil Ng - The Way Home

The events in John 14: 1-14 take place in Jesus' last hours. Jesus' disciples were disturbed. They had left their old lives, now Jesus was talking of leaving them. Jesus exhorts them to keep their belief in God. He made it personal by telling them there will be a place prepared for them and he will take them there. Jesus makes it clear that He is the only way to the Father. "I am the way and the truth and the life. No one comes to the Father except through me." [John 14: 6]



There are lots of things in this world that are not as they should be but John gives us the words of life from Jesus. His Gospel is written "so that you may believe that Jesus is the Messiah, the Son of God, and that by believing you may have life in his name." [John 20: 31]. By grace we are saved through trusting in Jesus.

We cannot rationalise away Jesus claims. He offers not **a** way to be saved but **the** way. C.S. Lewis observed that if Jesus' claims are false they are of no importance, if true they are infinitely important. They cannot be moderately important.

Everyone worships something, even if they don't use that word for their devotion - success, sport, family, etc.. They may be very good and worthy things but they are lousy Gods. Only God can bring us true significance and life.

Responding to a question from Philip, Jesus repeats He and the Father are one. He tells Philip even greater things will be done by those who believe in Him so the Father will be glorified.

Sunday, 8th March - Mr. Michael Bevan (Gideons)

In Exodus 3:14 we read God's words to Moses 'I am who I am. This is what you are to say to the Israelites: "I am has sent me to you."

The statement 'I am' became well recognised as applying to God.

Many times during His ministry Jesus used the words 'I am' while talking of Godly matters.:

John 6: 35 "Jesus declared, 'I am the bread of life. Whoever comes to me will never go hungry, and whoever believes in me will never be thirsty."

John 11: 25,26 "Jesus said to her, 'I am the resurrection and the life. The one who believes in me will live, even though they die; and whoever lives by believing in me will never die."

John 14: 6 "Jesus answered, 'I am the way and the truth and the life. No one comes to the Father except through me."

Jesus' critics understood His claims. They understood He was equating Himself with God and that angered them. At the Last Supper Jesus' disciples showed by their questions that they still didn't properly comprehend Who He was.

Even though Jesus knew what was before Him, He showed concern for His disciples, explaining to them His oneness with the Father and their relationship with the Father through Him.

Just as God "causes his sun to rise on the evil and the good, and sends rain on the righteous and the unrighteous" [Matthew 5: 45], His love and mercy is not restricted to any particular group or groups of people. Michael told us of a man who had been given a Gideon Bible by his mother when he was young. He valued the Bible but never read it. Getting himself into all manner of strife he ended up in prison. Finally he opened his Bible and came to know Jesus as his Saviour. Despite his new faith he continued to find life a struggle until one day several years later, he said to God that he couldn't continue coping with his life as it was. He realised that he had accepted Jesus as his saviour, but not as his Lord. Allowing Jesus to direct his life changed everything. He found life became much more straight forward and that man is now the Pastor of a church.

God used His Word to speak to that man, to show him the way to salvation and the way to live his life serving his master.
