I shall avoid places and persons where my presence is not needed in order not to become contaminated and thus perchance inflict and pollute others and so cause their death as a result of my negligence. If God should wish to take me, he will surely find me and I have done what he has expected of me and so I am not responsible for either my own death or the death of others. If my neighbour needs me however I shall not avoid place or person but will go freely as stated above. See this is such a God-fearing faith because it is neither brash nor foolhardy and does not tempt God."

Dear Friends at Canberra Christian Fellowship

Greetings from David, Janenne and Rachel. As the coronavirus situation is affecting everyone around the world, we thought it important to update our friends and supporters about how we are affected and what is happening at iKhethelo Children's Village.

The most important things for you to know are that we are well and that we are continuing to serve here at iKhethelo. ...

we are staying put in what is our home and avoiding unnecessary contact with people from outside the children's village.

Just over a week ago, the President of South Africa declared a national state of disaster. Following this, there are now many changes and restrictions in place to limit contact between people. The first one to significantly impact us is the closure of all schools in South Africa for at least four weeks. ...

The second thing is for Child and Youth Care Centres like iKhethelo to be placed under lockdown. Some of our children are not well with compromised immune systems and underlying health problems. No visitors or local volunteers have been allowed into the village, and children have not been allowed out for the holiday activities we had planned. All our children are at home 24 hours a day, seven days a week since last Wednesday and at least until after Easter.

The President has addressed the nation again this evening. He has announced a nationwide lockdown for a period of 21 days. People will only be able to leave their homes if they work in essential services or to obtain food or medical services.

Most of our international residential volunteers have been impacted. ... The only other volunteer remaining is Petra from Australia

With the children home and a lack of volunteers, our workload has increased enormously.



Despite the circumstances we find ourselves in, we know that we can trust our heavenly Father who knows all our needs.

We are incredibly grateful for your prayers at this time. We join with you in prayer for all those around the world who are impacted by this crisis.

We would also ask you to remember and lift up Andrew, our son (Janenne and David) and brother (Rachel). Andrew ... has been stood down. He now faces an unknown period of time with no income.
