

**Pastor Doug Nicholls**



Like Jimmy Little, the singer, Douglas Ralph Nicholls was an aboriginal man of the Yorta Yorta people who rose to prominence.

A hard worker with a cheerful disposition, Doug was a talented sportsman. He competed in sprint events at athletics meetings, winning several 'gift' races which led to being paid an appearance fee to enter races. Australian Rules Football provided another showcase for his sporting talent. Although only 5' 2" he was recognised as the best wingman in the Victorian Football Association (VFA) while playing with Northcote with whom he won a premiership. Switching to the Victorian Football League (VFL) he played with Fitzroy and also was selected for the state team on four occasions, the first aboriginal player to play for Victoria at that level.

In the football off-season he boxed as part of a travelling sideshow boxing troupe, taking on all comers.

Taunted and shunned particularly early in his football career, Doug took an active


interest in Aboriginal affairs and worked to improve the position of aboriginal people within Australian society, meeting with Prime Ministers and other politicians and holding office in various organisations.

The Second World War saw Doug Nicholls called up for service, however it wasn't long before he was released from his unit at the request of Fitzroy police to become a social worker amongst the Fitzroy Aboriginal community. As he helped deal with alcohol, gambling, crime and other social problems, the community gathered about him and he became pastor of the first Aboriginal Church of Christ in Australia and was ordained as a minister. His early upbringing had included strict Christian principles and after his mother's death in the 1930s his interest in Christianity had been renewed.

Douglas Nicholls was knighted in 1972 and received a second knighthood in 1977 while Governor of South Australia. He had been appointed Governor in December 1976 but served only 150 days, resigning due to ill-health after suffering a stroke while in office.

We can look to Sir Douglas Nicholls as someone who maintained a strong Christian faith and applied it to his life, guiding his actions and making a positive difference to the community he was a part of.
