

John Newton (1725 - 1807)

At our mini-service at Mark and Katherine's on Sunday, we started off by singing the hymn "How sweet the name of Jesus sounds In a believer's ear!". It wasn't until later that I realised that that hymn was one written by John Newton.

Most people have probably heard that John Newton was a slave trader who became a Christian and wrote the hymn "Amazing Grace" but perhaps know little more about him.

Born into a Christian home, his Godly mother died when John was 7. At age 11 he went to sea with his sea captain father and adopted the godless ways of many of his fellow sailors. Press-ganged into the Royal Navy when he was 19, he was flogged for attempted desertion and later was made a slave by a West-Africa slave trader. After 15 months he was able to leave his captivity however his experience didn't stop him becoming a slave ship captain himself.

His Christian conversion began when he was around 23 and was hastened by a violent storm which threatened to sink "The Greyhound" (the ship he was on) and so take his life. Another factor was his love for the pious Mary Catlett whom he had known since he was 17 and eventually married in 1750 when he was 25.

Having become a Christian, John Newton continued in the slave trade, although he did treat the slaves he was carrying better than slaves experienced on other transports. Meanwhile he was maturing in his faith.

on other transports. Meanwhile he was maturing in his faith. Forced to leave the sea for health reasons, Newton worked in Liverpool, studied, preached and consulted with Whitefield, Wesley and others before being ordained and becoming the Church of England vicar at Olney.

John Newton was zealous in his pastoral visiting, preaching and prayer. His evangelical enthusiasm, hymn writing and now strong support for the abolition of slavery continued when he moved to St. Mary Woolnoth Church, London. He encouraged and worked with William Wilberforce in his mission to end slavery.

After an eventful life culminating in much good service to his God, Newton died in 1807 at the age of 82. Newton is memorialised with his self-penned epitaph on his tomb at Olney:



JOHN NEWTON. Clerk. Once an infidel and libertine a servant of slaves in Africa was by the rich mercy of our LORD and SAVIOUR JESUS CHRIST preserved, restored, pardoned and appointed to preach the faith he had long laboured to destroy. Near 16 years as Curate of this parish and 28 years as Rector of St. Mary Woolnoth.



I am not what I ought to be — ah, how imperfect and deficient! I am not what I wish to be — I abhor what is evil, and I would cleave to what is good! I am not what I hope to be — soon, soon shall I put off mortality, and with mortality all sin and imperfection. Yet, though I am not what I ought to be, nor what I hope to be, I can truly say, I am not what I once was; a slave to sin and Satan; and I can heartily join with the apostle, and acknowledge, "By the grace of God I am what I am." John Newton

Mission Aviation Fellowship

A few days ago I received a phone call from Mike of MAF.

He rang to let me know the people of MAF are praying for the churches that support the work of MAF and to ask how they could best pray for us. I suggested that they could pray that God go before us and bring us together as we return to in person gatherings and worship.



When I mentioned we had a family connection with Ian and Adele Purdey within our Fellowship, Mike searched out the latest information from Madagascar and their activities.

In mid-July, MAF Madagascar Country Director Patrick Keller reported that "Numbers of confirmed Covid cases have been rising rapidly in the last weeks. The government has ordered more severe lockdown" ...

A fortnight after this tightening of regulations, pilots Ian Purdey and Ryan Unger were able to do a series of vaccine delivery flights for UNICEF. ...

In total they delivered 1458kg of freight across nine destinations. This included vaccines, syringes, sharps disposal containers, t-shirts for the health workers, and posters to advertise the vaccines.

"It was great to be able to help with these flights, especially as our work has dropped off due to covid," Ian says. "Despite covid and lockdowns, the needs in these remote locations don't change, so it's great that UNICEF have continued the work to supply these vaccination programmes. I hope and pray that these flights do change things in these communities, reducing the pain caused by the diseases that could otherwise be contracted." ...

"People - at least here in the city - seem to suffer more from the economic impact rather than the sickness itself," Patrick observes. "Many, many people have lost their jobs and therefore their income, and many families are down to one meal a day! ... Some MAF staff are also involved in church/social projects and try to help and bring relief, others try to help their families, friends and neighbours, often with their already limited resources."

As Ian said, the needs don't change, and we are so thankful that MAF has been able to continue to serve remote communities even in these challenging times.



Late August: Friday morning pilot lan Purdey together with ground staff at the Hanger prepared for a special flight – working closely together with Ravinala Airports, the airport operator in Madagascar. The Ravinala Airports of Madagascar wanted to donate medical equipment to the hospital in Nosy Be, to help prepare the hospital for the reopening of the airport on the island. Ravinala Airports donated several ventilators to support the people on the deeply challenged island, Nosy Be.

Nosy Be is a beautiful island north west of mainland Madagascar. Under normal circumstances Nosy Be is an island where you will find lots of tourists from mainly France and Italy. During the CoVid-19 crisis the island has been severely challenged because the Malagasy boarder has been closed since March 2020. Now the plan is to reopen the island of Nosy Be to tourists that can provide a negative CoVid-19

test. The rest of the country will still be closed for international flights.



Under COVID-19 restrictions, 65 people are permitted to attend the service for Ian in St. Philips's Church. Any above this number can gather in the St. Philip's Hall


We will miss your advice, laughter and friendship, but we will never forget you.


Rev. Don Purdey was not only Ruth's Son-in-Law, but a friend to many of us.




