Sunday, 21st November - Mr. Matt Sweeney - Our Inheritance (1 Peter 1: 3-7)



The reading begins by praising God and stating "In his great mercy he has given us new birth into a living hope through the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead, and into an inheritance that can never perish, spoil or fade."

What have we done to need God's mercy?

We have sinned! Sin hurts and grieves God.

Psalm 51: 4 tells us "Against you [God], you only, have I sinned and done what is evil in your sight".

We need a spiritual birth because our sin needed to be dealt with. "no one can enter the kingdom of God unless they are born of water and the Spirit. Flesh gives birth to flesh, but the Spirit gives birth to spirit." [John 3: 5,6]

We can rejoice in God's grace although we may suffer trials which refine our faith.

God holds us to His standards, not ours.

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I asked my brother-in-law, the father of four boys, "If you had to do it all over again, would you still have kids?"

Very few nativity scenes are present among the multitude of decorations all about us, most Christmas cards feature anything but aspects of the Christmas story and even Advent Calendars which once opened a window to a Christmas scene each day of advent, have been modified by chocolate, real estate or other commercial interests to advertise their products.

Holidays, parties and a spending extravaganza may represent Christmas for many, but the real Christmas story remains centred on real people and real events.

Mary and Joseph were part of an influx of people to Bethlehem, Joseph's ancestoral city, for the Roman census. Accommodation was in demand and the best they could get was the stable where Jesus was born. It wasn't an auspicious birth but it was momentous.

Shepherds, just ordinary, working people, visited the new born baby after angels glorified God and told them of His birth.

The Baby Jesus grew up, ministered here on earth then died to save us from our sins.

What is your response to the Christmas story?
