Although they each attended other churches, Dawn and her friend Norm started attending our services some years ago because they enjoyed singing the old hymns that we use. We saw them regularly for a year or so until transport difficulties, health and other commitments made it impractical for them to join us although we did stay in touch.

At her funeral service some memories of her early life that Dawn wrote were shared with the congregation.

MEMORIES OF GROWING UP IN DUBBO by Dawn Diehm

I grew up in Dubbo and had a younger sister. My mother and grandmother also grew up in Dubbo and my sister and I went to the same public school as they did. Diphtheria struck quite a few children, some did not survive. Both of us were in isolation in hospital for weeks and a long period of rest at home, later we were immunised. We had a family cocker spaniel who was given to my father at Nyngan because he chased cars. Dad bought him home on the train as he was a fireman on the railway. Like many people we had

chooks and vegies, fruit trees and grapes in our back yard and my grandparents had a nice fig tree and grapes growing.

When we were little we went to Salvation Army Sunday School, later to an Anglican one and after that to Methodist Sunday School. I was fortunate to learn tap and highland dancing – it cost one shilling a lesson and the teacher put on a few concerts. My mother made my costumes for them. My sister learned to play the piano. Highlights of the year were the Railway Picnic, the animal show and school holidays. Because my father worked for the railway, we had free travel once a year on a steam train for a holiday in Manly, where we met up with cousins. We were off to the zoo. The double decker buses, trams, escalators and cafeteria – as country children this was all very exciting. Dubbo, by comparison was very quiet and, I used to think, rather boring compared to Sydney. However, we could roam around and ride our bikes, which city kids couldn't. Dubbo was a big railway town, no-one locked their doors. My mother cooked everything on the fuel stove. We had no fridge or fans or washing machine.

Some children boarded at the Anglican Hostel as their parents were on farms. Others came to high school each day on the train and home each night on the train. We paid for our food each fortnight. When I went to the corner shop everything was written in a little book, with price alongside. I never handled money and I went to the shop everyday, with the little book.

My father came from Tenterfield. He met my mother in Enderby's Café where she was working. Kep Enderby [a former Federal Member for the A.C.T. / Canberra and Attorney General] was born while my mother was working there, she thought it an unusual name.

My father joined up and went to the Middle East and was away about 3 years. During the war years we had an Army Camp in Dubbo, and now the Dubbo Zoo is in that same place. Dubbo has grown from a little country town to a big city.

Unfortunately my mother passed away when I was 14 and my sister was 11 and we went to live in Tenterfield. I have always loved Dubbo and still have cousins living there and when we get together we talk about the good old days growing up in Dubbo.

Once Dawn's mother died, Dawn stayed with her grandmother but they moved frequently.

Dawn married when 18 but the marriage struggled and failed. Later she met and married Ted and they had a happy life together.

Dawn was described as a prayer warrior. She would pray with her daughter over the phone. She also sponsored many children.

She is remembered as an active, fun loving good cook (apple pies were given a special mention) who enjoyed knitting, craft work and hand making gifts. Roses and camellias were among her favourite flowers.

Her strong Christian faith was shown in many ways. She was very friendly and would invite people to come along to church. She was also a very generous person.

In her later years after Ted's passing, she enjoyed a friendship with Norm until he too passed on.

Her family were important to her and she had 1 great, great grandchild.

He is now a student at the ANU doing his Doctorate as a Human Rights Lawyer for the Pacific. He trusted God for the money to go to University.

Romulo met his wife Vivian in the room the dinner was held in at the Hellenic Club in 2010.

Romulo said his calling is in the Islands where he is most useful.

His priority in life is "God's calling".

He preaches in a Fijian Church every month.

He wants to be a Human Rights lawyer in the Islands.

He said that Scripture Union is a global family. Scripture Union, A.C.T. impacts Fiji and the world.

I would like to encourage everyone to hear this man of God, Romulo Nayacalevu, at the **Scripture Union Regeneration Dinner** on **Wednesday**, 8th **March 2023** and to support Scripture Union.

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
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
