In Canberra she attended St. Columba's Presbyterian Church, Braddon and then our Canberra Christian Fellowship from it's beginning.


Valda's family arranged a private, family cremation for her.

I felt that Caleb passed on God's message clearly and effectively and that he will prove to be an enthusiastic and committed servant of our God like his father.


Birthdays have a habit of sneaking up on people and accumulating almost unnoticed until an unexpectedly large number insists on being noticed.
