Lore of the Corps Bob Reutter

George was born on January 19, 1927. He came to Evansville from his home in Augusta Georgia before the war. He met and married his wife Dora and they started their family. He enlisted in the Marine Corps in 1944 and served in the Pacific until the end of WWII and after the occupation of Japan. After leaving the Corps, George worked at Bucyrus Erie as a CNC Programming Manager and George and Dora raised their family. George and Dora had three children. George died on March 11, 2020.

Glendal 'Glen' was born on January 7, 1945. He joined the Corps and served in Vietnam. When he came home, he married his sweetheart Harriet and they raised a family also. Glen worked for the City of Evansville as a mechanic where he retired after 30 years of service. Glen and Harriet had two children. Glen died on August 17, 2019.

What do these two Marines have in common? In addition to being members of the Marine Corps Family, Glendal 'Glen' Weiss was the son of George Robert Weiss, Sr. George, like many young men of his generation, answered the call of our Country to enlist and go away to fight in the jungles of the south Pacific islands. After completing his time overseas, he came home to be a productive member of our local society. Glen enlisted to fight in an unpopular conflict, choosing to emulate his father and become a part of the Marine Corps Family. After his time in Vietnam was finished, he also came home to again emulate his father and be an asset to our community.

Last year, at the request of his family, we were honored to be part of Glen's funeral service. At Browning Funeral Home we stood in front of Glen and talked about being Marines. We paid our respects to Glen and went outside the funeral home and fired a rifle salute to honor him. On Wednesday, March 18th six members of our detachment were at Sunset Funeral Home (again at the specific request of the family) to do the same for George. We spoke again about Honor, Respect and Commitment. We told the biological family of George and Glen about the ties to the Marine Family. As we did with Glen in August, we read our Marine prayer, folded the casket flag and payed our final respects to a brother Marine.

History of the Marine's Hymn Researched by Bob Reutter

We all know the words to (at least) the first stanza of the Marine's Hymn, but how much do you know about the history of the song? The "Marine's Hymn" is the official hymn of the United States Marine Corps. It is the oldest official song in the United States Military. We sing it at the position of attention as a gesture of respect. Our newest Commandant has issued an order that all Marines, upon hearing the song are to stand at attention and sing the words. Let's look at the verses and discuss origins and meanings. Let's start with the first stanza:

> "From the Halls of Montezuma To the shores of Tripoli We fight our country's battles In the air, on land and sea; First to fight for right and freedom And to keep our honor clean. We are proud to claim the title Of United States Marine."

The first line refers to the Battle of Chapultepec during the Mexican-American War in 1847. The 'blood stripe' on the trousers of NCO and Officers was incorporated because of the losses to those two groups as they led from the front during the battle. The second line refers to the Battle of Derne in 1805, during the First Barbary War. Lt. Presley O'Bannon raised the American flag over the old world for the first time. The third line (often mis-spoken as 'we will fight') says that we do, not will, fight to defend our country and its ideals, and that we will do so honorably. The next two lines are selfexplanatory. On to the second stanza:

> "Our flag's unfurled to every breeze From dawn to setting sun; We have fought in ev'ry clime and place Where we could take a gun. From the snow of far-off Northern lands And in sunny tropic scenes; You will find us always on the job The United States Marines.

The second stanza tells the story of our Corps. Regardless of where our Country calls on us to go, we are 'first to fight.' From the frozen mountains of Korea, the wheat fields of Flanders, to the jungles of the south Pacific and south-east Asia. From the countries of South and Central America, to the deserts of the Middle East you will find us. For nearly 245 years we have stood to answer the call of our Nation.

> "Here's health to you and to our Corps Which we are proud to serve; In many a strife we've fought for life And never lost our nerve; If the Army and Navy Ever look on Heaven's scenes; They will find the streets are guarded By United States Marines."

The third and final stanza is often used as a toast at Marine Birthday Balls and other formal (and informal) Marine gatherings. Once again, it tells the story of the dedication of Marines, past, present and future, who have carried on the legacy of all those who have preceded us. When you graduate from Marine boot camp, you have been 'indoctrinated' with the legends of those who went before. You know of the 'Devil Dogs' of WWI, the Cactus Air Force and it's defenders at Guadalcanal, the 'uncommon valor' of Iwo Jima, the Frozen Chosin, the 'forgotten' Marines of Vietnam and today's Marines who have taken the fight to those who would oppress others in the Middle East and eventually, if not checked, bring the fight to our shores.

It is not a coincidence that many of us have this music as the 'ring tone' on our cell phones. It is not a fluke that you see window decals, bumper stickers, license plates and other Corps related 'stuff' on our cars and trucks. It is pride in our Corps that causes us to wear our Eagle, Globe and Anchor on our shirts, jackets and covers when we are out in public. As you have seen on recruiting ads on television, the title "Marine" is earned, never given. So the next time you are out at an event and they play 'our song,' stand up and let those around you know you are "proud to claim the title of United States Marine."

National Bylaws Article Six - Members, Section 645 - Life Members:.


