Commandant's Corner By Bob Reutter, Commandant

July was a very busy time for the Marines of our Detachment. We bid farewell to 8 Marines with funeral home visits and helped with the graveside services for some of them. We lost three Detachment members, Marines Frank Counts, Bernard "Sparky" Perrette and Thomas Coomes. As difficult as it is to stand in front of a group of mourners and talk about being a Marine and why we are there to say farewell to a brother Marine even though we were not personally acquainted with him, it is infinitely more difficult when it was someone we have laughed with, worked with and shared time with in the Marine Corps League.

That camaraderie is what makes the League so special. No group of men can be closer than Marines who share stories, experiences and all the things that make us different from not only other branches of the service but from other people. The fact that most of us are much closer to that final farewell than we are to our time at Parris Island or San Diego brings that home with urgency. Each Color Guard, League event, breakfast or Devil Dog growl gives us a chance to carry on those traditions and memories. That all Marines have similar experiences and can understand better than 'outsiders' makes it even more special.

All the things above are the reasons recruiting Marines into the Marine Corps League is so important. I am constantly amazed at the families of deceased Marines who don't want any 'military presence' at the funeral. That tells me

the Marine never felt close enough to his family to share what being Marine meant to him. When we do the 'farewell' service at the funeral home I see the recognition on the faces of widows, children and siblings of the departed as they realize just how much being Marine might have meant to their loved one. I have never had a family express discomfort or regret at allowing us to be there.

One of our Life members asked that in lieu of flowers donations be made to our local Toys for Tots campaign. It was a sign of how respected he was that a dozen of his friends, relatives and co-workers respected his wishes with donations. Like so many Marines he made an impact on those around him.

It is very easy to spot Marines in public. We tend to show our colors in many ways from license plates to decals to what we wear. Make it your personal challenge to contact each and every Marine you see to tell him/her about our League. You never know when that contact might save the life of fellow Marine who feels alone in a sea of people. Being able to unburden their soul to a brother/sister Marine might be the lifeline that gives them the ability to go on. Even if they don't feel they have the time to join, you have now planted the seed that will grow then the need arises.

Remember, the rib and butt sale in this newsletter is one of our biggest fund raisers. If everyone will sell ribs and butts to your relatives and friends we can be very successful.

Marine Corps History By Gary Burk

The following is an excerpt from "The Battle History of the U.S. Marines." Iwo Jima

The Marines had good friends in high places as well

In addition to the Navy carrier pilots (the Marine Squadrons departed with the Task Force 58 on the third day) and a brutally effective squadron of Army P-51 Mustangs, the riflemen were faithfully served by their Marine "Grasshopper" observation crews in their fragile Piper Cubs.

"Out of the frying pan, into the fire," seemed an appropriate motto for the Grasshoppers, many of them launched at sea by means of the crudely experimental Brodie catapults on a lowly LST. "Like a peanut fired from a slingshot," remarked one unamused commander after watching two of his planes go spinning into the sea from the bizarre rig.

But once ashore, the Grasshoppers flew a thousand combat missions, calling in a rain of death and destruction on any Japanese gun crew that exposed itself.

General Kuribayashi had exhorted each of his troops to kill at least ten Americans in exchange for their own lives. While few achieved this distinction, the ratio of 1.25 Marine casualties (killed, wounded, missing) for every Japanese killed was the highest in the war. It was the first and only time a Marine landing force suffered greater casualties than they inflicted on the defending garrison.

Fortunately, casualty handling at Iwo was the best of the war.

A wounded Marine had a good chance of survival if he could just endure those awful first few minutes until his intrepid corpsman could crawl up to him, bind his wounds, give him a shot or two of morphine, and dispatch him to the rear with some strong-backed, nimble-footed litter bearers.

Field surgeons like Irish Mike Kelecher would be waiting at nearby battalion aid stations, backed

by a series of field hospitals of amazing sophistication.

Iwo was the first battle where whole blood, not

plasma, was widely used-fresh blood donated stateside one day, flown into the theater the nest, delivered ashore the third, and injected into the waiting arm of some desperately wounded Leatherneck that night.

Fully equipped hospital ships loitered offshore to receive serious cases-although the worst aspect for the evacuee was enduring the

rocking, rolling ride in an LVT or DUKW while strapped in a stretcher!

And 2,500 badly wounded Marines benefited from perhaps the most felicitous treatment of all-direct evacuation from Iwo to Guam by transport aircraft, each passage lovingly administered by a Navy fight nurse, truly an angle of mercy, tenderly grasping one grimy hand after another, whispering, "Hold on, son, just hold on..."

One "veteran" flight nurse, just twenty-three years old herself, wept as she saw shattered eighteen-year-olds cling to her as though she were their mother. . .

Yet the savage fighting on Iwo Jima worked counter to all these blessed amenities. An abnormally high ratio of men died of their wounds, reflecting the point-blank exchanges of gunfire as well as the proliferation of high explosions, blast effect, shock, and burns.

Marines in the Public Eye By Bob Reutter

Those of you who know me know that I am a computer 'geek.' Being retired (from the financially compensated world) allows me the time to sit at my computer and look up 'stuff.' According to a couple of sources there have been approximately 48 million people serving in the US military since 1775. Of these about 1 million have been Marines. That means that only about 2% of the military – since our country started – have been Marines. Why then, is there so much written, spoken and shown about Marines? The answer to that is complex yet obvious.

Marines have a history of being at the front of any conflict they are involved in. Marines run toward the sound of gunfire. Our training tells us that we are part of a 'family' that will always be there for each other. One of the most recited and representative of this is the story of the Chosin Reservoir campaign during the Korean War. A very few Marines fought to hold ground allowing an entire Division to withdraw from a trap meant to annihilate the division. Although well know and talked about the Chosin Reservoir is far from unique. Marines have been making headlines (much to the chagrin of the Army and Navy) by their aggressive and successful tactics since their inception in 1775. Tripoli, Chapultepec, Belleau Woods, Guadalcanal, Iwo Jima, Viet Nam, Iraq, Afghanistan and into the future Marines have done and will do what is necessary to succeed.

In researching this story I found a question that had been asked "How many Marine Corps generals have become US Presidents? The answer was "Exactly none. Which may prove that the US voters are much brighter than we give them credit for." A better answer, and more closely related to truth would have been "None. Marine Corps generals spend too much time helping keep out country free so others can run for President." Politicians tend to be afraid of Marines since Marines are more interested in what is right than what is politically profitable. Since World War One politicians have tried on several

occasions to disband the Corps. So far it has always failed. To quote General Victor Krulak "America doesn't need a Marine Corps, America wants a Marine Corps." It is interesting to note that our current President put Marines in two of the positions most important to the safety of our nation – Secretary of Defense and Secretary of Homeland Security.

As long as a Marine in Dress Blues causes people to take notice, as long as active duty Marines continue to run to the sound of gunfire and as long as Marines now in civilian clothes continue to be successful in the business world Marines will remain "in the public eye."


