Toys for Tots is in full swing with a handful of Detachment members delivering toy and cash collection boxes to well over 100 locations. Eyewitness News Channel 25 and 7 came to the warehouse and spent over 2 hours shooting footage of the Marines sorting toys and working on the Downtown Evansville Christmas Parade float. The piece aired on the 10PM news on Wednesday November 18th and referenced the Marines as Santa's Helpers. The entire morning team from the station accompanied our float and in the words of Shelley Kirk, lead anchor of the morning team "had the best time of their lives." Instead of just riding on our float the whole team walked along side passing out small toys to the children lining the parade route.

The parade was a grand success with the Detachment occupying a space at the front of the procession (#3 unit) with our Color Guard, float and Tom Kick's van making up our entry. Unfortunately, Larry Scott's jeep and the 2 ½ ton truck from the Sheriff's Department both had mechanical issues and were not able to join us in the parade. We had a dozen Detachment members and friends walking beside the float passing out small stuffed animals and toy cars to excited children along the entire 2-mile route. Others from our Detachment and the MCLA Southern Belles Unit 441 rode in the float to fill bags for the walkers and wave to the crowd. The Color Guard provided a little excitement to the crowd by firing the M-1 rifles every half block or so along the entire route.

Our distribution day for Toys for Tots is December 19th with over 1,000 families registered. If you want to have a fun day join us from 0700 until 1800 on that day to 'fill orders' for the children we serve. We are also having work days each Saturday from now until the 19th from 0900 to 1200 to sort toys and get ready for the big day. I look forward to seeing many of you there.

Marines in the Movies

Our Marine in the Movies this month got his first big role as the sheriff who drives Rambo to extreme measures in "First Blood." Born in Connecticut on 9 July 1938 Brian Dennehy knew he was born to act. He was a big kid, at six foot three inches he played football in high school until a teacher, who was a part time actor and former football player himself, talked Brian to try out for a school production of Macbeth. Brian was hooked. He finished high school and was awarded a scholar-ship to Columbia University as an offensive lineman. But after marrying in 1959 he left school without graduating.

At a loss as to what to do with himself he joined the Marines in September 1959. He trained at Parris Island (3rd Recruit Training Battalion) and then went to A Company First ITR at Lejeune. He finished infantry training and was assigned to HQ company, HQ battalion, 2nd Marine Division working in the G-2 Admin section. 2 years later he joined HQ Battery, 12th Marines, 3rd Marine Division in Okinawa as an intelligence assistant.

Dennehy remained on active duty until June 1963 when he transferred to the Enlisted Volunteer Reserves. Finally on 14 September 1965 he was discharged from the reserves leaving the active Marine Corps as a corporal.

In 1970, after working at a number of mundane jobs that he hated (truck driver, bartender, salesman and several others) he decided to go back to his passion – acting. His list of major Hollywood films include: "Gorky Park" (1983), "Silverado" (1985), "Cocoon" (1985), "F/X" (1986), "Presumed Innocent" (1990).

Brian Dennehy credits the Marine Corps for teaching him that life is too short not to pursue a career that you enjoy leading him into acting. He currently lives with his second wife outside of Sante Fe, New Mexico.

Marine Corps History By Gary Burk

The Chosin Reservoir Campaign of the Korean War is the stuff of legend in the Marine Corps.

During the pivotal battle, which lasted from late November to mid-December of 1950, 15,000 US soldiers and Marines, alongside another 15,000 UN soldiers, fought through a force of 120,000 Chinese soldiers to reach the sea some 78 miles away.

During the campaign, US forces successfully evacuated 98,000 refugees while inflicting heavy losses on the Chinese army.

The Marine Corps led the push against a numerically superior Chinese force. They broke through an enemy encirclement, and even rebuilt a bridge that the Chinese had destroyed.

In the process, they also saved the UN's army in Korea from total defeat.

The campaign is one of the defining events of the Marine Corp's modern history, but it remains largely unknown outside of military and historical circles.

Frostbite casualties of First Marine Division and Seventh Infantry Division, which linked up in order to break out of the Communist encirclement, waited for evacuation by plane in the Changjin area, North Korea. Extreme temperatures and exposure caused 7,338 frostbite casualties.

Overall, there were over 17,000 UN casualties in the campaign, and the Chinese suffered over 40,000 casualties.

Still, the UN forces reached Hungnam by December 24. A 193-ship armada evacuated the soldiers, along with 98,000 refugees that the UN and Marines Corps troops protected on the long march to the sea. After the evacuation, the US destroyed the port to deny the Chinese access to it. The Korean War wouldn't end until July of 1953, and although the US prevented the communists from dominating the south of the peninsula, Korea remains divided to this day.
