If you think our new Commandant, General David Berger isn't ready to carry on the traditions of our Corps, think again! Gen. Berger is planning for a more powerful, more flexible and lighter Marine Corps. One capable of deploying on any Navy ship and directly facing off against China.


"Traditional thinking of limiting Marine deployments to only certain type of ships must end," The Commandant has said, "and conventional thought has to be pushed farther and wider."

Part of his vision had the Corps and Navy ready to face off against China. Berger wants the Corps to be able to fight and survive within range of Chinese missiles, take out enemy ships from land or sea and throw an unpredictable mix of firepower at the enemy. He sees the future of amphibious ships as smaller and lighter – beyond the classes of ships we have right now. He is not looking to do away with the larger ships but to add a lot of smaller ones.

China's buildup of its own navy is seen as 'game changing." This has created the need for the Corps to reverse the diverging path is has been on with the US Navy for the fast two decades while fighting counterinsurgency conflicts in Iraq and Afghanistan.

General Berger has stated the Corps should focus on building up the Corp's capability in the Pacific in hopes of deterring further Chinese aggression. "The cost of deterrence, however high, will always be cheaper than the cost of a conflict."

Marine Corps History Gary Burk

The following is an excerpt from "The Battle History of the U.S. Marines"

STRANGLING RABAUL (1943)

The battle for the American beachhead at Cape Torokina continued unabated into December. The 21st Marines took the lead, fighting savagely to control the high ground known as "Hellzapoppin Ridge."

Marine dive-bomber squadrons lent a hand. The learning curve for close air support in a jungle battle ascended sharply after an inauspicious beginning. The standard white smoke grenades of the infantry proved unreliable; the Japanese would pop their own smoke to confuse the pilots, and on one occasion friendly troops died by errant bombing. Colored smoke grenades provided the solution. The Japanese could never match the variety of colors—green, blue, even violet—soon available to the Marines' forward liaison party.

When bomb fuses set to delay a tenth of a second upon impact failed to detonate in the mushy jungle, the bombardiers switched to four fifths of a second delay setting. These small improvements made a world of difference at Hellzapoppin Ridge. Given this support, the 21st Marines took and held the high ground.

The "short-legged" Marine dive-bombers that supported the 21st Marines so valiantly had launched from the nearby and newly constructed fighter strip at Torokina, which became operational on December 10, thanks to five weeks of backbreaking work by the SeaBees. On the twenty-eighth. General Turnage turned over his positions ashore to the American Division overall command of the campaign ashore passed from General Geiger's IMAC to the Army's XIV Corps. The Marines left steaming Bougainville with pleasure.

Marine casualties in the bruising campaign totaled 423 killed and 1,418 wounded. The operation completed the conquest of the Solomons, neutralized the five Japanese airfields on the island, and placed Rabaul within range of every tactical Allied aircraft in the South Pacific. It became time for the 1st Marine Division, the Old Breed, to reenter the fray. Now they were "MacArthur's Marines," and their mission in the Southwest Pacific Area was to complete the isolation of Rabaul by executing a flanking amphibious assault on the western end of New Britian Island, the opposite end from Rabaul itself. The Marines' objective: the Japanese airfield at Cape Glouchester. Their prinicpal opponent: Major General Iwao Matusda, commanding the 65th Brigade, Imperial Japanese Army.

Of all the miserable battlefields where Marines fought the Japanese in the South Pacific, none could compare with Cape Gloucester in the winter monsoons. Unbelievably dense rains arrived on D-Day and remained. The mud became impassable. The dripping jungle swarmed with poisonous vipers and stinging insects ("even the damed catepiller bite," complained one Leatherneck). At one point early in the campaign the Marines had suffered more casualties from falling trees than deaths by gunshot wounds. The Marines would fight in Gloceste's "Green Inferno" for four months.

Major General William Rupertus (Vandergrift's assistant at Guadalcanal) now commanded the Old Breed, assisted by Brigadier General Lemuel Shepherd. The division had taken nearly a year to recover from Gaudalcanal, inclucing the persistent strains of malaria that still haunted the veterans. Rupertus, twice a national champion with Springfield ".03" rifle and former director of marksmanship for the Corps, used the interlude to supervise his divisions transition to the M -1 Garand. The Old Breed Marines gave up their Springfields reluctantly, but under Rupertus's nononsense intendance, they became proficiend with their new rifles.
