

On Saturday we visited the grave sites of 8 casualties of the last several conflicts. It was wet and cold most of the day but our Marines made a good showing all day. On Sunday we recognized two more fallen before the Patriot Guard left to visit 6 more sites, mostly in the area of the Jasper League Detachment. Art traveled with the Guard all day on Sunday to provide the bugle for those events.

Several of our Marines attended a Boy Scout flag retirement ceremony at St. Ben's church on Sunday, May 24th. Like Saturday the week before there was a lot of rain for the ceremony. On Monday, Memorial Day we had excellent showings by Marines from our detachment at both Locust Hill and Tupman Cemeteries. In addition to color guards at both locations, we provided a rifle salute to honor the fallen at Tupman. Fortunately the rain held off and we were able to enjoy the day. When we weren't the <u>only</u> military unit at an event we were by far the largest contingent at each. In addition (although I might be just a little prejudiced) we were the sharpest looking group at every event. To cap a busy month, we were honored to provide burial services for a WWII Marine on Wednesday morning. May 27th.

We have been offered a fund raising opportunity by the manager of the local Harbor Freight Tool store in Evansville. We will be setting up a grill and shelter at HFT on Thursday thru Sunday (6/4 - 6/7) during lunch to sell hamburgers, hot dogs, chips and drinks to the customers and employees during HFT's sidewalk sale. If we feel it is worthwhile we will have exclusive opportunity to set up there 4-5 times a year to raise funds. If you are available please volunteer to work during one or more of these times. We will likely be there from about 10:30 until 2:30 each day (including setup and clean up.)

Marine Corps History

CIVIL WAR YEARS

The Marine Corps involvement in the Civil War was not impressive. Their first encounter started before war was declared between the North and South.

John Brown seized the U. S. arsenal at Harpers Ferry, Virginia and was stirring up an insurrection of the slaves. This information was sent to Lt. Col. Robert E. Lee on Sunday evening 16 October 1859. Lee and Army Lt. J. E. B. Stuart left on the five o'clock train. Lt. Israel Green was already there with eighty-six Marines from the Washington Marine Barracks. There was no army in the area, so the 86 Marines, led by Green, attacked on the brick arsenal firehouse and captured Brown and his men.

The day before the Civil War, 1 January 1861, the Marine Corps strength was 1,892 officers and men. Half the officers and two-thirds of the lieutenants, including Green, resigned to take commissions in the Confederacy.


The Federal army that marched south from Washington to Bull Run, had a battalion of Marines, 13 officers and 336 men, led by Major John Reynolds. The Marines defended Griffin's West Point battery at Henry House Hill, but then the whole Union line began to crumble. Reynolds and his men marched back to the barracks, less the forty-four who were casualties.

The Marines landed repeatedly on the Atlantic coast line and in the Gulf at New Orleans and Mobile Bay. They performed admirably. Wilmington, North Carolina was defended by Fort Fisher and was the last Atlantic port still accessible to the Confederate blockade runners. On Christmas Day, the Union tried and failed to capture Fort Fisher. On 15 January 1865, Rear Admiral David Dixon Porter pounded the fort with six hundred guns from his fleet. Four hundred Marines landed on the seaward side of the fort to hold a beachhead, and sixteen hundred sailors passed through them to attack the fort with cutlass and pistols. At the same time eighty-five hundred Army troops landed farther up the beach to attack the long breastworks that made up the fort's land face. The Navy landing party was bogged down, but the Army got through a mine field and took the fort. The war was over three months later with Marine war casualties at 148 and another 312 dead from other causes. During the war, the Corps had tripled to 4,167 officers and men.

After the war, the Marine Corps examined itself and its mission. The Army and Navy did not regard Marines as useful, so if the Corps was going to survive it would have to prove its worth.

Before the end of the century, the Marines landed in fifteen countries to protect American citizens and property. The most significant was in 1871 landing in Korea, where a brigade of bluejackets followed a battalion of Marines assaulting and capturing the Han River forts guarding the approach to Seoul, and the 1885 landing in Panama to protect the trans-isthmus railroad.

In July, we will begin examining the historical events of the Marine Corps by month.



Stars in the Corps

Our next Marine movie star was more than rough around the edges, he was a true wild one from the time he was a boy. He was kicked out of just about every school he attended. He was not just physical, he was downright violent. During frequent house parties he would often line up glasses on the bar and start a shooting contest. His gun collection was his most prized possession and he slept with a sharpened axe within each. Police were frequently called to bar fights he was in.

He enlisted in the Corps on 12 August 1942 and shipped off to Parris Island. He shot Sharpshooter in boot camp missing expert by one point. He was sent to Quartermaster School at New River after convincing his DI that he could type (he could not) and then to Service Company, Marine Barracks at Camp Elliot, San Diego where he was promoted to corporal. Several scrapes later now Private, he underwent demolitions training with the 20th Marine Engineer Battalion but his offensive behavior finally exhausted his superiors. He was assigned to mess duty for over a month. In January 1944 he shipped out with D Company, 4th Tank Battalion as a Scout-Sniper. He was part of a recon unit that went into Kwajalein the night before the invasion there.

After surviving that (and R&R in Maui) he was part of the first day's assault on Yellow Beach Two at Saipan on 15 June 1944. Later that day his company was caught in an ambush and 15 minutes later the 247 men of "I" Company, Third Battalion, 24th Marines were reduced to 6. It was then his turn. In his own words "There are two prominent parts of your body in view to the enemy when you flatten out – your head and your ass. If you present the former you get killed, if you raise the other you got shot in the ass. I got shot in the ass." He was eventually placed on a stretcher and had just taken a drink of water when a Jap ammo dump 150 yards away was hit and exploded. He was blown off his stretcher and landed right on his injury which he found out later was 9 inches by 3 inches and 3 inches deep. He was finally put on a passing LCM and made it to the hospital ship *Solace* where he realized he was safe. He also realized that his brother Marines were not and the tears began to flow. He suffered nightmares the rest of his life. He also spent the next 13 months in naval hospitals for his wound and a severed sciatic nerve. He was informed that he had missed being paralyzed by a hair's width.

He received a medical discharge from the Corps with a small disability pension on 24 July 1945. After working several menial jobs he was 'discovered' in a small theatre company (he was working as a janitor/ handy many) and ended up in Hollywood. He is buried at Arlington National Cemetery, near the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier next to heavyweight boxing champion Joe Louis. His headstone is inscribed "Lee Marvin, PFC, U.S. Marine Corps, WWII Feb. 19, 1924 – Aug. 29, 1987. This month's Marine from the movies is Major Riesman from the Dirty Dozen. Now you know.
