Marines in the Public Eye

In the past few months I have written columns about Marines in the movies, sports, the business world. Each month the title of the column has been different. There is one common thread to all however – each person started his/her career as a Marine. So from now on *"Marines in the Public Eye"* will be the title each month. With that being said here we go.

Eugene M. Stoner was born on November 22, 1922 in Gosport, Indiana. He attended high



school in Long Beach, California and afterwards worked for the Vega Aircraft Company installing armament. He enlisted in the Marine Corps during World War II serving as an aviation ordnance crewman in the South Pacific and Northern China. After the war he worked in a machine shop for a company called Whittaker, and aircraft engineering firm, ultimately becoming a Design Engineer. In 1954 he moved to ArmaLite, a division of Fairchild Engine and Airplane Corporation. During his time with ArmaLite he developed a series of small arms including the AR-3, AR-9, AR-11 and AR-12 none of which saw significant production. His only real success was the AR-7 survival rifle which was adopted by the USAF for pilots who were forced to exit their aircraft. By 1955 Stoner had

developed a light-weight (7.25 pound) selective fire infantry rifle using the NATO 7.62x51mm round. This rifle, designated the AR-10, was smaller, lighter, easier to fire in full auto mode than any of the other submissions. Unfortunately, it arrived late in the evaluation trials and was rejected in favor of what would become the M-14. The AR-10 was licensed to a Dutch company who made the rifle for sale to a number of various foreign military forces.

The AR-10 was later scaled down and redesigned to fire the lighter, faster .223 Remington cartridge. The AR-15 was adopted by the US Military as the M-16. Stoner left ArmaLite in 1961 to serve as a consultant to Colt Inc. and eventually accepted a position with Cadillac Gage where he designed the Stoner 62 weapons system which could be configured as a standard automatic rifle, light machine gun, medium machine gun or a solenoid fired fixed machine gun. Until his death in 1997 Stoner continued to develop new concepts in weaponry. One of his last designs is still in service with the Navy as the SR-25 Mark 11 Mod 0 Sniper Weapon System.



Marine Corps History

The War of 1812

The brief period of peace that followed the Tripoli misadventures ended with a military confrontation between the United States and its former adversary, Great Britain.

When diplomatic efforts failed, the U.S. Congress declared war against England on June 18, 1812.

The Marine Corps, now under the leadership of Lieutenant Colonel Commandant Franklin Warton, a forty-five-year-old Philadelphian, commenced the war with 493 officer and men, most assigned to frigates.

USS *Constitution's* Marines swayed a key naval battle when *Old Ironsides* locked alongside HMS *Java* in mortal combat. As the British captain tried to lead his boarding party against the *Constitution*, an American Marine marksman shot him down. Other Marine sharpshooters aloft, now armed with the more accurate Model 1808 U.S. musket, tumbled British officers and petty officers into writhing piles along the scuppers.

The Marines in the fighting tops had organized themselves into six-man teams – five men reloading while the sixth, the best shop, methodically raked the opposite decks with rapid, well-aimed fire. The Americans by no means won the majority of battles in this ragged war, and the Marines suffered the same defeats. On June 1, 1813, the American Frigate *Chesapeake* clashed with HMS *Shannon* off Boston. When British broadsides splintered the *Chesapeake*, its inexperienced crew panicked and abandoned their guns. *Shannon* quickly closed for the kill.

A British boarding party took the fight to the American deck. As Chesapeake's mortally wounded captain, James Lawrence, was carried below, he issued his now-famous order, "Don't give up the ship."

Only a handful of Marines and sailors stood firm, battling valiantly, swinging clubbed muskets, until over-whelmed by *Shannon's* swirling, slashing boarders. Thirty-two of Lieutenant James Broome's forty-four Marines went down fighting; fourteen died, Broome among them.

In late summer 1814, a confident, combined-arms British force under Vice Admiral Alexander Cockburn and Major General Robert Ross advanced on Washington, brushing militia forces aside contemptuously.

President Madison and his Cabinet fled Washington. So, to his later disgrace, did Lieutenant Colonel Commandant Warton, taking the payroll with him.

General Ross's Redcoats and Royal Marines received an unpleasant shock from the small, resolute naval brigade opposing them on the heights. Barney held his fire until the British were uncomfortably close, then blasted their lead columns with well-served artillery, fired in naval broadsides.

A fierce little battle ensued. The British had the numbers and the experience; the Marines and sailors had grit and the high ground. Out of ammunition, and with Barney and Miller both down with wounds, the Americans withdrew in good order.

Ross and Cockburn burned much of Washington but spared the Marine Barracks and the Commandant's quarters at "8th and Eye," some say out of respect for the valiant Marines who had stung their advance force so sharply at Bladensburg.


National Bylaws Article Six - Members, Section 645 - Life Members:.
