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# Marine Corps History By Gary Burk

IN THE BEGINNING - NOVEMBER 10, 1775 . . .

The Marine Corps Birthday is celebrated around the world on 10 November each year. The U. S. Marine Corps had its' beginning by resolution of the Continental Congress to raise two battalions of Marines. They were part of a navel expedition to Nova Scotia to preserve their rights and liberties. This was scuttled by George Washington who was commander of the Continental Army.

After Washington's decision, the Continental Congress went ahead with recruiting Marines. They were recruited to serve in the Continental Navy then forming in Philadelphia.

Approximately three hundred Marines were in eight ships that went to New Providence in the Bahamas. A landing party went ashore on 3 March 1776 and captured two small stone forts and a large quantity of military stores.

Marines, under the leadership of John Paul Jones, were used to harass the British ports on the Irish Sea. The Marines exemplified themselves in the historic battle off Yorkshire, England on 23 September 1779 when Jones' 44-gun Bonhomme Richard defeated the British 50-gun frigate Serapis. (A painting of this historic battle may be seen at the U. S. Naval Academy Museum)

Although the Marines marched across six hundred miles of North Africa's Libyan Desert to storm the fortified Tripolitan city of Derna, they primarily served at sea with the Navy. (We sing to-day in the Marine Corps Hymn ". . . to the shoes of Tripoli.")

The Marine Corps' officers' sword was adopted in 1826. It is modeled after the Mameluke scimitar presented to Lt. Presley O'Bannon for his exploits.

On 18 June 1812, the United States was pushed into war with Britain, because of Britain's imprisonment of merchant seamen from America. At the beginning of the war, the Marine Corps consisted of ten officers and 483 men, half were at sea in ships' detachments and the rest were in the navy yards, or at Washington and New Orleans. Marines were in sea battles on the Great Lakes and fought on shore, notably in the defense of Washington in August 1814 and at New Orleans at the end of the year.

In 1835, the U. S. Government decided to relocate the Seminole Indians from Georgia and Florida to an area that would eventually become Arkansas. A six-year war, which included the Seminole allies, the Creek Indians, was not much to brag about. It was an ugly war which cost the Marines sixty-one casualties which included a lot of tropical fever. Other Marines served in the "Mosquito Fleet" off the coast of Florida. Marines would fight on the rivers again during the Civil War and Viet Nam. As a side note, many people use the term, "if the creek don't rise" when talking about doing something or making appointments. The actual term was, "God willing and the Creek don't rise", was captioned by Benjamin Hawkins when he was being called back to Washington by Thomas Jefferson. It had to do with the Creek Indians rising to fight again.

### Marines in the Movies

This month's Marine was born in Sam Bernardino, California 30 January, 1931. He was raised in Danville, Illinois where his father worked for the local newspaper. Dad took off when the lad was 13. This made him very shy and although he played on the local basketball team in high school he spent most of his free time alone in movie theaters. Finally one month after his 16th birthday he went to the local Marine recruiter's office and enlisted. He shipped off to Parris Island the next day. After graduation he was assigned to Signal Bn. And later ordered to H&S, 2nd Mar.Div. at Camp Lejeune. In the spring of 1948 he was sent to Tsingtao, China to help with the repatriation of Japanese military personnel. On 17 March he sailed for home onboard the USS Chilton (AP-38.) He was honorably discharged on 12 Feb. 1950 but the next day re-upped and served another 4 years. After 7 years' service he left the Corps as a PFC in February 1954. He had earned his GED while in the Corps and after several attempts at school he took a bus to New York where he tried to get into acting. He made friends with another struggling actor named Dustin Hoffman who was also not thought likely to be a star. Several years they shared an apartment while trying out for many roles. In the '60's he had small roles in many different TV shows and several films. He was nominated for an Oscar as Clyde's yokel brother in Bonnie and Clyde. He won a Best Actor Oscar for The French Connection and in 1971 a second Oscar for Best Supporting Actor in Unforgiven (1992.) Yes, our Star in the Corps for this month was none other than Gene Hackman.
