### Marine Corps History Gary Burk

The following is an excerpt from "The Battle History of the U.S. Marines"

#### STRANGLING RABAUL (1943)

The joint amphibious campaign to seize New Georgia and wipe out the nettlesome Japanese airfield at Munda Point bogged down because of inexperience, inadequate resources, and deadly enemy resistance. No Marine divisions were available for Operation Toenails. Thirty thousand Army troops would provide the bulk of the landing forces, beefed up by the Marines' 9<sup>th</sup> Defense Battalion. Marine raiders and parachutists would execute special operations missions behind Japanese lines.

Two companies of Marine Raiders jump-started the New Georgia operation on June 21, 1943, landing at Segi Point, rescuing an endangered Coast Watcher, then crossing the island in four brutal days to surprise and destroy the Japanese coast defense guns at Viru Harbor.

Admiral Kelly Turner landed e Army's 43d Division and the 9<sup>th</sup> Defense Battalion on Rendova Island on June 30, scattering the handful of Japanese defenders. The veteran Marine defense battalion went right work, registering their new 155mm "Long Tom" guns, digging in their AA guns, using their light tanks and LVTs to traverse deep mud. Soon Long Toms began pommeling Munda, eight miles away. So far so good.

Then came Japanese air raids from Rabaul. The first evening a Japanese pilot hit Turner's flagship, the *McCawley*, with a well-aimed torpedo. That was bad enough—Turner switched to a smaller ship, a tug took *McCawley* under tow—but the embarrassing conclusion came after dark when an American PT boat skipper mistook the huge transport for an enemy vessel and sank her with a spread of "friendly" torpedoes.

The disasters continued. On D+2 (the second full day after the D-Day landing) a flight of eighteen Mitsubishi "Betty" bombers and Zero escorts surprised the amphibious force and devastated the congested beachhead, bombing and

strafing at will. By a combination of bad luck and human errors, every search radar on the island had become inoperational during that specific half hour, allowing the surprise attack. Marine 90mm gunners wheeled into action, eventually driving the raiders away, but the beach resembled a charnel house.

Among the 200 Americans casualties was a pugnacious and now incensed lieutenant colonel named David Shoup, an observer from the 2d Marine Division. Indelible helpless chaos Tarawa, four months later.

The star-crossed campaign struggled on. Army troops landed on northwestern New Georgia on July 2-3. Across the island, at Rice Anchorage on the Kula Gulf coast, Marine Colonel Harry Liversedge led a composite regiment of Raiders and Army infantry ashore. "Harry the Horse" Liversedge, an Olympic shot-putter and veteran of World War I, had too many missions for his light forces, but he exerted a magnificent effort.

Fighting through the jungle in a driving rainstorm, Liversedge's force crossed the Giza Giza River on improvised rafts of logs and ponchos, then drove the Japanese from the villages of Maranuso and Enogai on the east side of the Dragon's Peninsula. A futile roadblock in the middle of the jungle failed to restrict Japanese movements and tied up half the command. Liversedge let the rest of him men against the port of Bairoko

Opposing Liversedge in the thickly jungled Dragon's Peninsula was Rear Admiral Minour Ota, commanding one of the largest concentrations of



rikusentai to fight the Americans in the war. For two weeks the Kure 6<sup>th</sup> Special Naval Landing Force slugged it out toe-to-toe with the Raiders and soldiers. Both sides suffered heavy casualties in vicious, point-blank jungle fighting. (The Marines would fight Admiral Ota again in 1945

on Okinawa's Oroku Peninsula.)

#### The Lore of the Corps

Throughout history Marines have been ready to go wherever our country needs them. Not only for combat but for other roles including humanitarian aid and training for our country's allied military.

The 13<sup>th</sup> Marine Expeditionary Unit is currently deploying to Central and South American waters for just such purposes. Several hundred Marines and sailors are headed for that region aboard and amphibious ship in October, according to military officials. The deployment will be comprise of the command element of the 13th Marine Expeditionary Unit, a platoon of grunts from 2nd Battalion, 5th Marines, and a detachment of MV-22 Ospreys from Marine Medium Tiltrotor Squadron 166, according to a news release. The primary mission of the deployment will be to focus on humanitarian assistance and disaster relief across Central and South America. The Corps would not disclose what countries the 13th MEU would visit in Central and South America. It's not common for Marines to deploy to South America aboard amphib ships and the 13th MEU has traditionally operated in the Indo-Pacific and U.S. Central Command area of operations. The 13th MEU's 2018 deployment made history with the first combat strikes in Afghanistan by the high-tech stealth fighter F-35b. The command will serve in a headquarters role for what has been dubbed the Special Purpose Marine Air-Ground Task Force-Wasp.

SPMAGTF - WASP operations officer, said in a command release. "The SPMAGTF - WASP mission will strengthen the interoperability between the Navy-Marine Corps team and partner nations." The South American deployment will not be the first deployment there. The Corps said it carried out a similar deployment in 2018 to Peru. The Wasp MAGTF deployment is expected to build upon that experience. And about 300 Marines with Special Purpose Marine Air Ground Task Force – Southern Command carried out a deployment to Honduras from June 2018 to November 2018.

The Marines helped train partner forces in infantry skills and carried out various engineering projects. The deployment will provide extra training opportunities to work with other countries and bolster humanitarian disaster response capabilities in the region, the release said. "We look forward to serving alongside our Navy counterparts and training with our Central American and South American partners during several humani-

tarian-themed events, Col. Andrew Priddy, SPMAGTF-Wasp commander, said in the release.





"SPMAGTF - WASP is the latest in a long line of engagements with our Central American and South American partners," Maj. Sean Williams,
