
The Story of Miraele Tabernacle Church of God in Christ Vesterday Establish 1.

Established in 1989, the Miracle Tabernacle Church of God in Christ has progressed alongside the neighborhood in which it began. From a small trailer in Racepath, the spirit of the Lord began spreading, reaching down darkened streets once littered with crime and into the homes of families who would one day join Pastor Jeter's quest for a brighter future for Racepath. The bond between community and church was



fortified through a number of marches, outdoor prayer vigils, revivals and celebrations.

The church outgrew the small trailer and moved to 4817 Highway 17 Bypass South, near the back gate of the former Myrtle Beach Air Force Base. After five years and three floods, the ministry relocated back to the


1689 Racepath Street location.

First Baptist Church, Myrtle Beach, 1992 - 1994

The winds of change always brought new opportunity. New programs were implemented; new partnerships forged. The church survived the floods in 1994 that soaked only the material wares and not the spiritual goods of Pastor Jeter's congregation. Such trying times of the church yielded a fruitful harvest—men gathered for Sunday School and many children's programs were established in Racepath: Recharge, an after-school program for

students; a summer day camp; Girl Scout Troop 507; Great To Wait program; Black History programs that honored past community leaders; and tutoring sessions.

After a storm destroyed the trailer, the church moved to the police substation located nearby. There law enforcement officials and neighborhood children played games together as part of the fellowship of the church's Sunday School ministry outreach. Forced to move again, the Miracle Tabernacle Church of God in Christ held services at the First Baptist Church's gymnasium and later at Cathedral Baptist Church auditorium at the former Myrtle Beach Air Force Base.
