Developing young people

In Scouting, we believe that young people develop most when they are 'learning by doing', when they are given responsibility, working in teams, take acceptable risks and think for themselves. Development is guided by the Scout programme, a continuous progression of training, activities, badges and awards for all young people aged 6 to 25.

The programme is designed to suit five core age groups:

BeaverScouts	6 to 8 years	Group based
Cub Scouts	8 to 10½ years	Group based
Scouts	10½ to 14 years	Group based
Explorer Scouts	14 to 18 years	District based
Network Scouts	18 to 25 years	District / County / Area based

In addition to section meetings your child should have the opportunity for outings, indoor residential and camping experiences and other challenges suited to their age and ability.

The programme is tailored to the interests, needs and pace of everyone, but also recognises group achievement. The highest personal achievement is that of Queen Scout award. From age 14 it is also possible to register, through Scouting, for the Duke of Edinburgh's award scheme

Our Responsibilities

In Scouting, all adults must operate responsibly in accordance with our policies on child protection, equal opportunities, and safety in Scouting. The Scout Association apply stringent vetting procedures including criminal record checks, for all adult appointments. All adults must abide by our Young People First code of behaviour. Our policies and procedures are designed to keep young people safe from harm whilst they enjoy the fun and excitement of their Scouting adventure.

Youth Membership

Membership of the Scout Association is voluntary and open to young people, aged 6 to 25, regardless of faith, nationality, race, culture, mental or physical ability, or other circumstances. Membership is confirmed by making a simple promise. While uniform and language may vary, Scouts around the world all wear the same purple membership badge

The Promise



All members make this simple promise and become part of the worldwide Scout movement:


On my honour
I promise that I will do my best
To do my duty to God and the Queen
To help other people
And keep Scout law

The promise is made easier for younger children and is also available in the different forms that recognise the country of origin that an individual belongs to and their God.

Across the UK, young members are supported by almost 100,000 adult volunteers. Adult members of the Scout Association serve as Commissioners (volunteer managers), leaders, sectional assistants, administrators and in many other roles. The support of non-member adults is also welcomed particularly from parents and guardians of our young members.

1st Billingshurst Scout Group

The group belongs to the <u>Petworth and Pulborough Scout District</u>. Together with other Districts from East Grinstead and Haywards Heath in the east to Chichester in the west, we form the Scout County of West Sussex. The whole district assembles for St George's Day parade on the nearest Sunday to the 23 April and all members of the group are expected to attend. Throughout the year there are various other district and county camps, events and competitions run for the different sections. Children should be encouraged to take part in these, as it is important for them to realise that the "Family of Scouting" extends far beyond the four walls of Billingshurst Scout HQ.

1st Billingshurst is honoured to be included in the town's annual Remembrance Day parade on the closest Sunday to 11 November. Again, all members of the group are expected to attend

this parade. The St Georges Parade and Remembrance Parade form the only two events in the year where attendance is mandatory.

Today, we run two Beaver Scout Colonies (Oaklands & Cedars), two Cub Scout Packs (Parbrook & Dauxwood) and two Scout Troops (Arun & Downlands). The different sections meet at the following times and days:

What do members need?

For the first few meetings, your child needs nothing at all to experience the magic of Scouting. Please don't feel you have to rush into buying your child uniform, especially if they are not sure that Scouting is for them. Casual activity clothes can be worn until they make up their mind. They will have about 4 to 6 weeks to decide, during which time they will get to know their leaders and other members of their section

Also, during those first few meetings, your child will complete the requirements for the membership badge and once completed you will be invited to their investiture at a section meeting or event. They will need their uniform for their investiture. This is a proud moment for children and parents alike (and unfortunately involves some work as all their badges will need to be sewn on!)

Our leaders try to put the "out" in Scouting as much as possible, so not all meetings take place at the HQ. Because of this it is important that you complete and sign all the forms at end of this pack in full, with contact phone numbers and alternative contact phone numbers. It is extremely important that you let us know any changes immediately to ensure the safety and welfare of your child.

Buying a uniform

The Scout Association produces a range of uniforms for all age groups as well as an extensive range of books to support the development of members as they progress from the Beaver Scout section through to Scout Network. They can be found online at shop. Scouts.org.uk

You can also find uniform at the Camping World shop in Horsham, Broadbridges, Horsham and DW Camping in Chichester.

The section leader will let you know when your child is to be invested, so that you can purchase a uniform in readiness. The leader will also advise you as to what parts of the uniform are mandatory and which are optional



All members of the Group wear the Group scarf or necker (pictured above) which is presented along with a woggle when your child is first invested into the group. Should you need to replace the necker or woggle one can be purchased via your young person's section leader.

You cannot buy the group scarf as this is presented as part of the investiture ceremony when your child formally joins the Scout movement

How much does it cost?

1st Billingshurst Scout Group charges subscriptions to cover the running costs of the Group. These are for example the cost of meeting materials, the bills involved in the upkeep of the Scout HQ, and insurance premiums. The subscription also covers the young person's membership fee to the Scout Association (currently £62.50 per year) which is paid on their behalf by the group to Scout headquarters at Gilwell. *Each section will ask for Subs at the start of each term, currently subscriptions (subs) are £35 per term.*



An extra charge is normally required for special events, camps, or other outings and you will receive notification of these. All badge costs are covered by the Group.

If you register for Gift Aid, we can claim back the tax you have paid on your Subs. We have included a form in this pack so please consider filling it in.

Changing sections

When a young person reaches an age of which they are required to change sections (8 for beavers, 10½ for Cubs, and 14 for Scouts) they would usually take part in a four-week transition period. During this transition period, they should attend both their current section meeting, and their new section meeting. Their current section uniform should be worn until they are invested in the new section. The section leader will arrange with parents of when this transition period could start and when the young person is likely to be invested in the new section.



Online Scout Manager (OSM) & My.SCOUT



Within 1st Billingshurst we use a system called Online Scout Manager to securely store your child personal details, emergency contact details, medical information, maintain badge records, attendance. Attached to OSM, we have a feature called My.SCOUT where you will be invited to create your own login so you can update personal details; see your child's section programme, badge progress and upcoming events.

Leadership

The adults who run our Scout group are called Scouters. Contrary to popular belief, they are unpaid volunteers who give up their time freely for the benefit of our young people and fully support the aims of the Scout Association. The leaders of each section are uniformed and are helped by non-uniformed Sectional Assistants. Help may also be given by Explorer Scouts, aged 14 to 18, who wish to give service to another section by becoming Young Leaders.

All leaders, Sectional Assistants and Young Leaders are required to undertake training or learning appropriate to their role. This training normally takes place in their own time; the vast majority of our adult leaders and assistants have full-time jobs and family commitments. Training and the cost of adult uniforms are funded by the group.

Section leaders are responsible to our Group Scout Leader who, in turn, is responsible to the District Commissioner for Petworth and Pulborough Scout District. If you have any questions, concerns or complaints please speak to your young person's section leader. If your concern is about the section leader, please contact the Group Scout Leader. If they are not available or you are still not satisfied, please refer to the District Commissioner. Contact details are listed at the front of this welcome pack.

How the Group Operates - Leaders

All leaders at 1st Billingshurst Scout Group are volunteers who give their time for free. They are organised in a hierarchy of roles that include:

Group Scout Leader (GSL) The Group Scout Leader is a uniformed leader responsible for managing and

supporting the Scout Group and its Leaders to ensure it runs effectively.

They are assisted by a uniformed Assistant Group Scout Leader

Sectional Leaders This is the uniformed leader responsible for managing and leading a section. This

includes the planning and delivery of the Balanced Programme to the Section.

Assistant Sectional Leaders Uniformed leader tasked with helping the Section Leader run the section.

Sectional Assistants Sectional Assistants help the Section Leader run the section. They are entitled to

wear the full uniform or just the group scarf

Occasional Helpers This is a non-uniformed leader who helps with the section on a semi regular basis i.e.

a parent helper.

Young Leaders A young person, normally an Explorer Scout, who helps with a section. They are aged

between 14 and 18 years old

How Can I help the Group?

As a voluntary organisation, the Scout Association encourages parents and guardians to assist in the leadership team on a regular or occasional basis. Thank you in advance for any support that you or your family can offer 1st Billingshurst Scout Group.

Parent Helpers:

Some sections will ask that all parents sign up to the Parent Rota. Within the Scout Association there are strict guidelines regarding adult to child ratios for meetings and activities. In order to keep the sections, open and to facilitate the variety of activities run it is likely that you will need to be a part of the parent rota once or twice a term. Along with giving the practical help needed this role enables you to see the different type of activities your child is getting involved in. If you have a skill or interest and are happy to come in and demonstrate, share or be part of an evening meeting we would love to know, your skills and new ideas could be just what we need.

Rotas for parent help will be distributed at the start of each term. If you are unable to help on the day allocated to you, please arrange a swap with others on the rota when you collect your young person from their sectional meeting. It is important that we have enough adults at each meeting. For data protection reasons, the group will not give out an individual's contact details.

It is part of the Scout Association policy that any adult volunteering in Scouting that comes into contact with young people on a regular or semi-regular basis needs to complete the necessary checks with the DBS. This is to help safeguard all involved in Scouting. If you are only going to help occasionally the DBS check does not need to take place. (The GSL will arrange for any required DBS checks)

Sectional Assistant:

This role is the next step up from being a parent helper. The role involves supporting the Section Leader and other uniformed leaders in delivering a balanced programme for that section. The Scout Association provides two 'Getting Started' training modules for this role, from its Adult Training Scheme, to help you understand more about Scouting. Although this role is not entitled to wear a uniform the group scarf can be worn.

Uniformed Leaders:

Becoming a uniformed leader is a natural step up from a Sectional Assistant but you can also go straight into a uniformed position. Every uniformed leader is enrolled onto the Scout Association's Adult Training Scheme. On completion of training each leader is awarded the wood badge.

Knowledge of Scouting is not a prerequisite to be a leader. All that is required is the willingness to join in and help to enable young people to grow and achieve from their Scouting experience. Scouting is an adventure for all involved both young people and leaders.

Group Executive:

The Group Executive committee is there to assist in the effective operation of the Scout Group along with acting as trustees for the group. The three required positions in the executive committee are Chair, Secretary and Treasurer. These are nominated at the group AGM each year.

The executive committee often comprises of other positions designed to support the group. These are positions such as Membership Secretary – responsible for new applications, waiting lists and members moving between sections; Quarter Master – responsible for the maintenance and repair of equipment owned by the Group; Parent representatives for each section; Fundraising Secretary – responsible for raising additional funds for the group.

No matter what skills you have or how much time you can afford to give Scouting it is likely that there will be some way that you can help us. Do please ask for more information and join the team.

Medical and dietary information

It is essential that you inform the section leader if your child suffers from any medical condition or if they require any specialist medicines for treatment. This includes things like allergies, behavioural difficulties such as ADHD or dyspraxia, physical or mental disabilities, and other medical conditions.

It is also necessary for information to be supplied to the section leader about any dietary needs of your child. In the first instance, you should provide this information on the membership form at the back of this pack and thereafter update leaders if circumstances change

Child protection

It is the policy of the Scout Association to safeguard the welfare of all members by protecting them from physical, sexual, and emotional harm. The Scout Association takes all reasonable steps to ensure that, through relevant procedures and training, members and adults taking part in Scouting activities do so in a safe environment. Every leader and helper carry a Scout Association Yellow Card which gives the code of good practice that must be followed. A copy of this card is available for inspection on request.

Supporting your child

Scouting is a team effort; leaders only see the young people for a short time each week, so they rely on parents and guardians to do the rest!

- Encourage your child to prepare themselves for meetings don't do everything for them
- Please ensure that you deliver and collect your child at the appropriate times and place as advised by the Section Leader. Always check that an adult leader has arrived, and one other adult is present before leaving

- your child. Please do not bring or allow your child to arrive more than 10 minutes before the start of their section meeting. Please tell Section Leader if someone different from usual will be collecting your child.
- Make sure your young person's uniform is always clean, smart and ironed. This includes their group scarf.
- Our members wear uniforms to distinguish themselves. The wearing of our uniform also serves to instil a sense of pride in the group and in Scouting in general as well as showing their individual achievements in the form of badges. Please ensure, unless advised otherwise by your Section Leader, that your young person wears their uniform and sensible footwear to every meeting.
- Please ensure that you return any activity forms and any payment on time. If you have difficulties completing forms or making payments, then please speak in confidence to the Section Leader.
- If your child cannot attend the meeting, please phone/text/email/instant message and let the section leader know; contact details are listed in this welcome pack.
- Children are not generally known as remembering things so after meetings please ask if they had a letter; is there a message; or is there anything to do for next time? Again, it's all part of being independent. Most messages will be e-mailed from OSM and added to section Facebook sites.
- We recognise that some children may require additional help at times. If your young person has a school statement or IEP, please make this information known to us so that we can work with you and your young person to ensure that any suggestions are supported during their time with us.
- Badges each section has a number of badges they can work towards at meetings or at home. Full details of
 the badges can be found under the members section in the Scout website
 https://members.Scouts.org.uk/supportresources just select your child's section, Badges and awards and
 look at Challenge Awards and Activity Badges.



- If you are asked to get out tables or chairs, they are found in the small meeting room to the rear of the hall.
- Tea, coffee and juices are stored in the kitchen
- Last, but not least, have FUN and enjoy the activities.


