The Empower Program is designed to foster an inclusive economic environment by addressing barriers to success and creating pathways for business owners who have historically been underserved.

The Empower Program reflects our commitment to walking alongside entrepreneurs, especially those who are often overlooked. The Empower Program is part of the Mayor's Racial Justice and Equity Alliance (MRJEA) Plan, which works to identify and reduce the harmful impacts of institutional racism and create initiatives that promote racial equity across Lansing. Funding for the program is provided through federal ARPA allocations secured by Mayor Schor.
