Peaceful Ponderings...

Dear Saints of the Longest Day—

June 6, 1945 is D-Day and is sometimes referred to as the Longest Day. In fact, there is a movie of the Normandy Invasion with just that title: The Longest Day. But, that is not the longest day to which I am referring. As you know, summer will soon be upon us. In the Northern Hemisphere, the June solstice occurs when the Sun reaches both its highest and northernmost points in the sky.

In temperate regions, we notice that the Sun is higher in the sky throughout the day, and its rays strike Earth at a more direct angle, causing the efficient warming we call summer. Because the sun is highest in the sky on this day, you'll notice that your shadow (at noon) is the shortest it will be all year.

This year, summer begins on Thursday June 20th. In astronomical terms this is referred to as the Summer Solstice. The word solstice comes from the Latin which means "the sun stands still". This came about because the sun seems to stand still at noon for several days before and after the solstice. At noon on June 20th, and in some years June 19th, the sun is directly overhead at the Tropic of Cancer. About December 22nd, the sun is directly overhead at noon at the Tropic of Capricorn which marks the beginning of winter in the northern hemisphere and the beginning of summer in the southern hemisphere. As the Summer Solstice approaches, make note of the phenomenon of the sun standing still during June 18 through June 24.

As you notice the seeming lack of movement of the nearest star, I hope it serves as a reminder that as our Spiritual natures seems to be set and unchanging. Like the changing of the seasons, they continue to move through a life cycle that is part of God's creation. Our human nature interferes with our complete surrender to the workings of the Holy Spirit in ways that tend to diminish our good will and our desire to be more Christlike. We have a tendency to become stuck in a rut and see the world through lenses of our own making. Consequently we can become stagnant in our faith development and fail to heed the leading of the Holy Spirit. That is why faithful and regular worship is important all year long.

Being open to God's call on our lives and the presence of the living Christ can lead to the reawakening of our faith. Indeed things will not seem to stand still. Change upon change will intervene in daily living so that the love of Christ will well up inside us and impel the restructuring of our lives. The seasons come and go. Day turns into night, and our souls are transformed by the nearness of our Lord.

May you have a blessed summer and may the Holy Spirit of Pentecost continue to transform you to grow in holiness and a nature that is more loving and Christ-like in all that you think and do.

Synod Assembly News

Thank you for allowing me to represent Peace at this year's Synod Assembly May 17-18, held at the Italian Community Center. Pastor Quever and I attended the dinner and worship service together Friday Night and heard keynote speaker Vance Blackfox, an Indigenous theologian and citizen of the Cherokee Nation, who serves the churchwide organization of the evangelical Lutheran Church in America as the Director of Indigenous Ministries and Tribal Relations. Lutheran Church of the Great Spirit led an amazing worship service and the offering was designated to support the redevelopment of this ministry.

Saturday was full of business. The 2025-2026 proposed budget was approved. One resolution was proposed to add a half-time position to aid Pastor Kristin as she works with the 28 churchs in transition. The position would require a \$50,000 increase in salaries offset by a \$50,000 reduction in Mission Support, which was already being reduced. Unfortunately, though the need is great, the resolution was not approved.

The following 6 resolutions were approved by the Assembly:

Resolution 1—WHEREAS, ELCA World Hunger is observing its 50th anniversary; therefore, be it RESOLVED, that the Greater Milwaukee Synod will encourage our synod members to support ELCA World Hunger by raising an additional \$50,000 by Synod Assembly 2025 above our usual synodical offerings through initiatives like Global Barnyard, and other opportunities found in the ELCA Good Gifts Catalog, Act 2 Day 4 Tomorrow, and many more opportunities found at www.elca.org/hunger; and

RESOLVED, That congregations of the Greater Milwaukee Synod will be encouraged to learn about and participate in Pray—Act—Connect—Educate (PACE) so that they can be God's hands and voice for our hungry neighbors, near and far; and

RESOLVED, That congregations of the Greater Milwaukee Synod will be encouraged to learn about ELCA World Hunger domestic hunger and hunger education grants.





Synod Assembly, continued

Amended Resolution 2 - RESOLVED, That the GMS work with Wisconsin United to Amend, and communities across the state, to defend democracy from the corrupting effects of undue corporate power by advocating for amending the United States Constitution to establish that:

- 1. Only human beings are endowed with constitutional rights not corporations, unions, non-profits or other artificial entities, and that
- 2. Money is not speech, and therefore limiting political contributions and spending is not equivalent to limiting speech; and

RESOLVED, That the GMS encourage congregations and their members to advocate for a constitutional amendment to that end, and

RESOLVED, That the Lutheran Office of Public Policy of Wisconsin be requested to communicate in support of this effort with all state legislators, members of Congress, and Senators representing the territory of the synod.

Resolution 3—RESOLVED, That the GMS Assembly memorializes the 2025 Churchwide Assembly to authorize the development and adoption of a social statement on children and vulnerable youth.

Resolution 4—RESOLVED, That the GMS Assembly memorializes the 2025 Churchwide Assembly to increase the guidelines for financial commitments by congregations and agencies for continuing education, and to create a process for these guidelines to be regularly revised.


Resolution 5—RESOLVED, That the GMS Council be instructed to request that the Church Council of the ELCA consider creatin and implementing as soon as possible a procedure and system to allow congregations, after completing their Ministry Site Profile, to review brief (up to 75 words) summary statements that do not contain identifying information from potential candidates for called positions, with the possibility of requesting additional information on suitable candidates from their synod.

Resolution 6 (proposed by the Synod Council at the Assembly) Resolved that the 2024 GMS Assembly offers their enduring gratitude and admiration for the courageous leadership and dedicated service of Pastor Joe and Joyce Ellwanger.

Throughout the Assembly, many churchwide organizations had booths in the Galleria, including the Meru Partnership and Mt. Meru Coffee Project. If you have questions, please ask! Next year's assemble will be held May 30-31, 2025 at the Brookfield Conference Center.

Approval of Agenda: Motion by R. Knapton to approve the agenda as presented, seconded by E. Sherry. Motion carried.

Pastor's Report:

Met with the Lueder family in planning for Mary's Celebration of life on May 4th.
