Memorial Day: What Do We Remember?

"O beautiful for spacious skies, for amber waves of grain, for purple mountains majesties above the fruited plain. America! America! God shed His grace on thee..." Those words by Katherine Bates bring to mind the abundant ways in which God has blessed this nation and its people...stalks of wheat falling before huge combines in early July...farm wagons and trucks overflowing with corn and soybeans in late fall. God has truly "shed His grace" on us abundantly in ways that defy enumeration or description.

Memory is a tricky thing. There are some things, however, that we should never forget. These include the sacrifices that others have made on our behalf.

It was a spring morning in 1866, just after the Civil War that had devastated the South. A group of Southerners did something quite extraordinary. They marched down the streets of what was left of their town to a cemetery. There they decorated the graves of the soldiers. ALL the soldiers—Union as well as Confederate. The mothers and daughters and widows had buried their dead. Now they buried their hatred. The time for healing had come. It was the first Memorial Day.

Have you ever wondered why Memorial Day is marked in May? Its date doesn't recall some historic battle; or the start of some war, or the signing of some armistice. Why then, May? For a very practical reason. Because it is a time when flowers bloom. Flowers used to decorate graves.

That which we remember says a lot about us. It speaks volumes about who we are and what we value. The children of Israel retained their identity as a people because they remembered their history and God's continued interaction with them. There are some things that need to be remembered.

There are also some things that need to be forgotten. Our memories are a wonderful gift to us—unless they cripple our ability to function as whole persons, as families, and as a community in the present world.

In every congregation there are persons who need the healing of their memories. There are past hurts that need to be turned over to God. The altar of God is a place for remembering all that God has done on our behalf. It is also a reminder that there are some things not worth dwelling on—leaving them in God's hands. The Gospel is about new beginnings. God beckons us to hold to what was good and of value in our past. But, and even more importantly, to look to the future at the new things God can do in our lives.

I pray that your Memorial Day is a time of reminiscing over those people God has given in your life to pay the price and make the sacrifices that have made you the person that you are today, so that your heart might be overflowing with deep gratitude. Thank you for remembering, and thank you for your faithfulness and generosity for the cause of Christ.

Peaceful Pitstop May 24-27

For those who are new to this or may have forgotten a bit, this is a hospitality tent at the Burlington Jamboree festival, which runs the 4 days of Memorial Day weekend (May 24-27). We provide a place for those in charge of babies and toddlers to change them and feed them. It is also a place to have privacy to change those older children or adults who need to wear diapers and to provide a (relatively) quiet place for festival goers to just sit and get a drink of water. It is a wonderful way for us to serve the Burlington community. Peace provides changing tables, rocking chairs and supplies for those who may have forgotten or run out of changing supplies. We also provide minimal first aid supplies, sunscreen, and coloring books and the like for older siblings of the babies. Our volunteers welcome people into the tent, guide them to any supplies and tell them a bit about us ONLY IF ASKED. Much stress has been put on the fact that we should not be making people feel as though they must be willing to be proselytized in order to be allowed in. Such is not the case! But we should be willing to talk about ourselves if asked. We would not be required to staff the tent ALL of the hours that the festival is open. It will be up to us how many hours we feel we can comfortably provide. Please sign-up in the Narthex. Your time and help will be greatly appreciated!

The meeting was called to order at 10:15a.m. by President M. Hart

Opening Prayer: Led by Pastor Quever

Additions to Agenda:

Under new business - Synod Assembly in May

Under worship – possible communion every Sunday, Continuation of outdoor worship

Under property – new paint for church's front doors

Approval of Agenda: Motion by J. McGinty to approve additions to agenda, seconded by J. Monsen. Motion carried.

Pastor's Report:

Recommended readings from the Passion of Jesus Christ According to St. Mark in place of a homily on Palm Sunday.

Has designed a special bulletin for Easter Sunday. Will meet with Kerry.

Has plans to develop a letter to congregation members for Easter.

Made calls to members who have been absent. Heard back from Myers family.

Secretary's Report (Bev Stobber) Motion by J. McGinty, seconded by J. Monsen to accept February 11,2024 minutes as presented. Motion carried.

Treasurer's Report (Janet McGinty) Deposits for the month of February were \$5504.00. Expenses were \$6120.93. The year-to-date balance is \$7829.75. The current money market balance is &60,119.06. Motion by B. Stobber, seconded by E. Sherry to accept the treasurer's report as presented. Motion carried.

The PACT contract with Pastor Quever has been amended.

Nurturing the Faith – Worship (Elaine Sherry): Sign-up sheets for the Noon Lenten soup lunches have been posted. Posted signup sheet for Easter flowers and placed order. Ordered palms for Palm Sunday. Ordered and picked up cake for new member Sunday. The decision was made to resume Communion being offered every Sunday starting in April. This will require additional volunteers to assist. The decision was made to continue regular indoor worship services through the summer.

Nurturing the Faith – Education (Chris Monsen): Janet McGinty will lead a program of "Inclusion" on March 17th and April 7th.

Growing Relationships (Renee Knapton) No report.

Inviting Folks In – (Elsie Goulding): Birthday cards were sent. Get-well cards will be sent as needed.

Property Report – Open. The box elder tree was taken down, Cleanup will resume when compost area reopens. Will be contacting someone to fix rain gutter on the back side of church. John Monsen volunteered to paint the front doors of the church when weather permits.

Vice-President's Report (John Monsen): Looking for potential nominees to fill council positions. New constitution states that the congregation council shall consist of "not more than eight members of the congregation". Current council members are to provide a description of what their current duties to determine how council positions will be realigned.

President's Report (Marilyn Hart): Transcribed info and notes from Jan. 20 workshop with Pastor Carol and sent them to her. Sent thoughts about sharing info/reports to council members prior to meeting to help shorten council meetings. Sent proposal to have official statement, perhaps continuing resolution, on how to handle things when we see something that might be potentially disturbing to the wellbeing of our church.
