topics. We raised funds to aid victims of large natural disasters, mostly by offering dinners cooked by IWA members. Unused funds, if any, were donated at year end to a local charity. We have grown amazingly in all dimensions in 25 years and



we will be celebrating and building on these achievements throughout this year.

We are proud to announce that we are 175 members

strong this year. About 20 families have been with us continually since inception. We invite you to join us in recognizing their unwavering support. Do continue to invite your friends to join IWA. The more, the merrier.

Our community and fund-raising activities have grown impressively in the past 25 years. IWA members have worked collectively, learning unimagined skills along the way, to publish two elegant cookbooks. The last one, Dash of Desi, was published in 2017. Almost 375 copies have been sold. Our goal is to sell 1000 copies. On May 2nd and May 9th we had a booth at the West Lafayette Farmer's Market where we had snacks prepared from recipes in this cookbook for sampling and sold quite a few cookbooks. We will be at the Farmers' Market again on October 10th. Remember to visit us, along with your friends. Profit from cookbook sales will be donated to Heifer International's Women's Empowerment program and Lafayette Urban Ministry (LUM) After School Program.



Heifer International is an organization that works to empower farm families, and their women. The LUM After School Program provides enriching childcare for about 80 Tippecanoe County children, grades K-8.

Since 2013, we have donated money to Asha Purdue, an or-

ganization that provides education to underprivileged children in India. In 2017, IWA donated \$1000 to ASHA. A portion of this donation was raised by participation of IWA members in ASHA's 5K run. We encourage your family to participate in this fun activity. This year we have launched IWA Academy an Education and Learning fo-



cused wing to develop educational programs fin the STEM and other areas for children, especially those who are underprivileged. Look out for more announcements. You are welcome to submit ideas for this project by email at iwaacademy18@gmail.com.

One of the 2017 objectives was to support struggling immigrants. We donated \$1750 to the LUM Immigration Clinic and LUM Port of Hope program. IWA also collaborated in fundraising activities with Greater Lafayette Immigrant Allies, an organization that focuses on advocacy and support for immigrants. As we have done since inception, IWA members stepped forward to donate \$1000 for communities affected by hurricanes Harvey and Irma and \$1240 to Food Finders for fighting hunger in our community.

In these 25 years, our Diwali celebrations have morphed into the grand Celebration of India (COI). Every one of these COIs has been delightfully different. The 2017 COI was hugely successful. It was one of the best programs that IWA has hosted because of enthusiastic participation by large numbers of people. Between 290 and 300 persons at-







Those Who Serve -

Meet Renu Bhatia

In todays world we have so many demands on our time and resources. And yet, there are some in our community who give generously of their talents. But like violets by mossy stones, they do their good works away from the public glare. This column aims to start shining a spotlight on them.

I don't remember when I first met Renu Bhatia. I'm sure it was at one of the many IWA functions I've attended over the years. Recently however we learned about a young lady in our community who had suffered domestic abuse. Some of us tried to help, but it was Renu who took her under her wing and took care of her. And then I was told that she was a Court Appointed Special Advocate (CASA) volunteer. Knowing what a commitment that is I decided to talk to her about her work.




Renu graduated from Sapphire College in India with a degree in Social Work. After living here for many years she thought of going back to India to start a program to help children and decided the best way to learn how to do this was to join CASA as a volunteer. Many of the things she learned came as a rude shock. Brought up in India she believed that parents always do what is best for their kids. However poverty and addictions turn this maxim on its head. Renu learned that she needed to focus on the child and only what is good for the child.

Being a CASA volunteer is not a walk in the park. There is intensive training before you are given a case. You have to make quite a few visits to different places for one child, including the childs home, the school, the police station and the courthouse. Putting in all this work is not easy, but she kept her focus on empowering the child and very often others who wanted to but could not help the child. She had to make sure to always verify all the facts in the case as one mistake could lead to a devastating effect for the child. But the rewards are immense because it results in a child being safe.

Renu has also volunteered for many other organizations like the women's shelter, and being a LUM advocacy volunteer.

One of the things Renu mentioned was that our Indian community is rich in many resources. Many people need help bringing up their children and stopping the circle of abuse. Besides CASA (http://www.casaforchildren.org) there are many other organizations where you can volunteer some time to help children. Check out the Bauer Family Resource Center (<u>https://bauerfamilyresources.org/volunteer</u>) or do after school tutoring at the LUM after school tutoring program (<u>http://www.lumserve.org/programs/children-families/after-school-program/</u>).

Talking to Renu was the highlight of my day. Due to lack of space, I cannot put everything we discussed here in this column, so if you want to know more about CASA remember she is listed in our directory and would love to let you know more about this very important organization. Thank you Renu for all you do.
