Young Children Support Letters (Ages 12 and under)

Young children can write a support letter if they emotionally and mentally fit to do so. Some children have a very difficult time when their parent or step parent is away. Please do not pressure your child to write a letter if they are uncomfortable or afraid to do so. However, if they are excited to write a letter of support, here are a few tips and an example of what to include.

*General Statement about their feelings *Something they look forward to doing with their parent/step parent when home.

Please let my Dad come home. I love him and miss him. I can't wait until we can go fishing together.

*The child's letter can be handwritten. *Have the child sign/print their name under their letter *The parent/guardian that allows the child to write the letter should also sign the letter and state the relationship to the child.
