ART



Art this week consisted of process art at the easel, writing/collage table and making signs for the Trike-a-thon. The children also enjoyed drawing in their journals.

SCIENCE/SENSORY

In science this week, we used measuring tools to make Porcelain Dough. Our recipe called for corn starch, glue, oil, vinegar and body lotion. We discovered that the recipe, as written, didn't deliver the consistency we liked so we discussed what we needed to add to thicken the dough. We learned that the dry ingredients made the dough thicker and the wet ingredients made it thinner. So we added more corn starch and adjusted the




recipe for future use. Cooking teaches valuable pre-math skills such as fractions & volume, and important language skills, teamwork, cooperation and patience.

MATH/FINE MOTOR





We count in class every day. There are a lot of ways to making counting fun. One of our favorites is the "duck count" game where the children match numbers on rubber ducks. We also get creative with fine motor challenges. This week we used a styrofoam wreath and added golf tees



around the outside and challenged our friends to stretch rubber bands from tee to tee. Another game is matching colored clothespins to matching paint samples.

LANGUAGE/LITERACY





We are continuing to learn about cold weather animals including Polar Bears and Penguins. We will learn more about Penguins next week. The children are getting the hang of drawing closed shapes and are practicing holding writing utensils



correctly. We played a parachute game using rhyming

names. "If your name rhymes with Mandrie (Landrie), crawl under the parachute." All of our friends can now recognize their written names without help from Ms. Laura and I. We re-enacted <u>The Mitten</u> story by Jan Brett using paper mittens, clothespins and laminated story characters. Each child had a complete story set and followed along while placing the characters in their mittens in the correct sequence. This teaches important skills such as sequencing/ordinal numbers, story recall, language/vocabulary, story structuring and fine motor.
