Arrival

n Wednesday March 31 at 12:30 p.m., BIG ARTS will show Arrival (2016), the final film in this year's BIG ARTS Ethics In Film Series. The film runs one hour and

56 minutes, and will be shown in the BIG ARTS Christensen Performance Hall. After the movie, I will lead a discussion in the theater.

The film is directed by Denis Villeneuve with a screenplay by Eric Heisserer, based on Ted Chiang's Story of Your Life. Arrival stars Amy Adams as the linguist, Dr. Louise Banks, and Jeremy Renner as her scientific colleague, Dr. Ian Donnely, and Forest Whitaker as U.S. Army Colonel GT Webe. As the film opens, we learn of the arrival of 12 huge and mysterious alien spaceships at various places across the planet. Dr. Banks and physicist Dr. Donnely are enlisted in an effort to meet with the seven-limbed "Heptapod" aliens inside one of their ships and decipher their strange language, written in swirling strokes on a large screen that separates them from the human visitors. The task is urgent because

China and other repressive regimes are beginning to transmit deciphered messages that appear to demand human capitulation to the visitors' militaristic threats. Solving the puzzle, Dr. Banks experiences the truth that language not only communicates, but shapes the way we think.

On this basis, she deciphers a message that uncovers the reason for the invasion and that alters the

direction of her own life. Arrival asks us to understand how our own cognitive and cultural limits cause us to respond to perceived threats. With her own cognition and sense of time fundamentally altered, Dr. Banks lives in both her present and future.

In response, she says about her life, blemished as it is with tragedy, "Despite knowing the journey and where it leads, I embrace it, and I welcome every moment of it." Would you do so as well?

Before moving to Florida, he practiced law in California for 32 years and occasionally took art classes at Santa Ana College. Since retiring from his law practice and moving to Florida, Zell has won many awards from arts organizations in Southwest Florida, including second place at the Winner's Circle Exhibition in 2007. He was nominated for best new artist in the Angels of the Arts competition in Fort Myers in 2008 and featured as an emerging artist by Grandeur Magazine in Fort Myers. In December 2018, Zell was one of four Southwest Florida artists profiled in Gulfshore Life magazine. Times of the Islands magazine featured an article on Zell and his artwork in its February/March 2019

Zell's paintings have been accepted by the Butler Institute of American Art for its summer exhibitions in Youngstown, Ohio (2013 and 2015). He has participated in numerous solo and group shows on Sanibel, Captiva and in Fort Myers, and currently shows his paintings at 2 Islands Gallery on Captiva and at BIG ARTS on Sanibel. His work is also exhibited year-round at Alpine Fine Furnishings in Lake Tahoe, California. He is an active member of Florida Artists Group and a past-president of the Sanibel-Captiva Art League.
