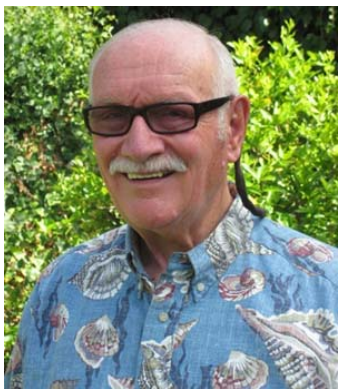
GoF West 2013—COME TO ARIZONA!

The Evolution of: MOSS PART NUMBERS

In the early 70's, Alan Moss was faced with a dilemma. His business was growing, his inventory was expanding, and he had expanded beyond the MG marquee. He now had to manage parts for numerous makes and models. How could he keep track of all of these parts? The following will give you some insight as to how brilliant Al Moss was as a businessman.

First you must understand that, as with all manufacturers, MG had their own OEM part numbers. Regardless whether they made the part it was their number and the suppliers made those parts to OEM standards. However, MG OEM part numbers changed in 1952. MG was purchased by British Motor Corporation. BMC had to change OEM numbers to standardize inventory for like parts within their company for the various other vehicles they produced. Then in 1967 BMC changed to British Motor Holdings, with more changes to OEM numbers as part of industry consolidation.

Hence the dilemma for Al Moss. In the late 60's, Al knew that the future supply of parts would decrease as time went on so he was buying up whole lots of OEM parts. However, the part numbers could actually be different for a like item. Parts made in the 40's would have one OEM number and then later BMC parts had a different. This was all very confusing – like parts with multiple part numbers. How would it be best to inventory and offer these to the public?

The early Moss Motors catalogs help to chronicle the evolution of the Moss part number. Let's follow the changes to the T-Series Wiper Motor number.

06/1946 – Factory OEM MG Parts List: Wiper Motor #A1245

02/1964 - Moss 6th Edition Catalog: The early Moss catalogs used OEM numbers. This wiper motor was used on many models so the Lucas OEM number was best to use Wiper Motor #75051 (Lucas OEM)

11/1971 – Moss 15th Edition Catalog: Al initiates the transition to the management of inventory using the state-of-the art IBM computer, *"Our newly installed IBM computer is working quite happily and we will soon be issuing a completely new catalog with simplified part numbers..."* The new part numbers were standardized to a 6 digit number. This catalog had a mix of OEM numbers and new Moss numbers. Wiper Motor # 145300.

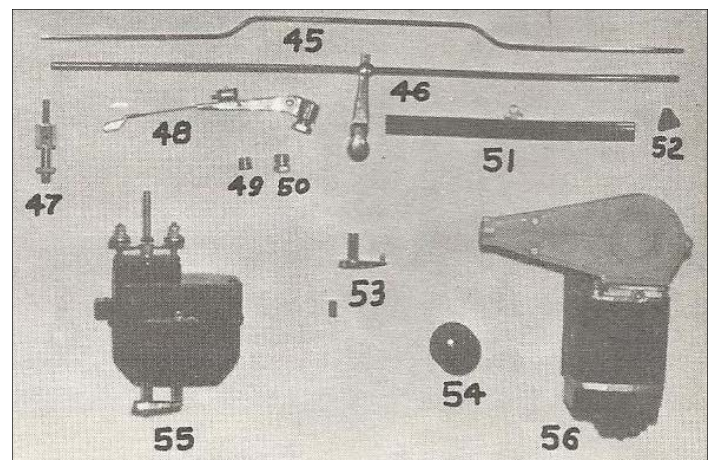
07/1972 – Moss 16th Edition Catalog: This catalog shows a mix of new and old part numbers. *"This catalog is an interim measure prior to publication of our forthcoming all New Edition. About 90% of the part numbers are new computer numbers. Our IBM computer, now in its 2nd year, is proving its worth..."* However, the catalog also shows a new style for the new 6 digit computer number: 1 with a mid-space. The new style is good because it is difficult to recognize 6 continuous digits at a glance. Wiper Motor # 145300. (new style 145 300).

12/1972 – Moss 17th Edition Catalog: The transition is complete to the new numbers with the mid-space. *"In July we completed construction of a 3000 SF building for machine shop and warehouse. Our IBM computer project is complete and catalog reflects all the new part numbers".* Wiper motor #145 300.

02/2013 – Moss Spring/Summer Catalog: At some unknown point a hyphen was added to the numbers instead of the space. Overall, today's catalog still reflects the same numbers Al Moss institutionalized some 30 years ago. Wiper motor #145-300.

So when you read off a Moss parts number, think of Al Moss.

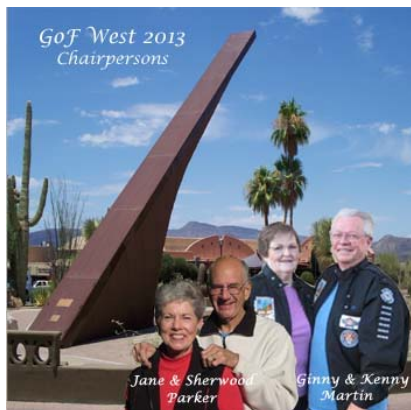


Greetings to All From the AZ MG T-Roadrunners

The sooner you make your reservations, the quicker we can respond to additional rooms that we may need to block at the discount rate. We can block more in the future but only if they are available. The resort's sales staff is currently marketing those unbooked rooms. Also note that there are limited rooms available in the outlying vicinity. Even if you are thinking about attending, book now and don't wait until the last minute to register with the hotel.

The Development of the GoF West Logo

The Carefree 2013 logo was designed by Arizona Roadrunner, Jan Rons. The criteria he was given was that it had to be 4" diameter, octagonal and have GoF West 2013 on it. Otherwise a blank canvas to paint. Jan was asked to offer his thoughts on how and why it looks as it does. His reply:

"It was an easy task to choose the various elements that most characterize Arizona and specifically Carefree. Arizona's beauty is reflected in the blue sky, desert vegetation, rolling hills of the high Sonoran, and of course the Saguaro Cactus. The sun dial had to be included as it is the icon of Carefree itself. As for the MG TC, it is there simply because it is my favorite model." Thanks Jan for a great logo!



Carefree Sundial - The Time is Right!



The Sundial was completed in 1959 and is the largest sundial in the country and third-largest in the Western Hemisphere. It stands 35 feet tall, extends 72 feet and is 90 feet in diameter. This huge dial is made of steel and plated with anodized copper. The Carefree Sundial is located in downtown Carefree at 100 Easy Street. A plaque on the dial reads:

"Solar engineer John Yellot and architect Joe Wong designed the sundial for K.T. Palmer in 1959. It stretches 62 feet and points to the North Star. Solar local time is 27.7 minutes behind Mountain Standard Time and the hour markers are adjusted to compensate. The town of Carefree added copper cladding in 1990."

MG CLUB MEMBERS: The Next-Next Generation

It has been noteworthy that many of our MG Clubs are now celebrating 40 and 50 year anniversaries. These clubs were the offspring of many young rascals back in the 50's and 60's who owned MGs. They had boundless enthusiasm for the MG Marque and demonstrated such with meetings, rallies, races, picnics, funkhana, and many other events. That group of young enthusiasts is now 60 or older. To this day they remain the bedrock of our current membership.

As I have attended various club functions over the past few years it has become painfully obvious that our club membership is at risk. Just look for yourself and ask, "In 5 years, how many attending today will not be here?" We are starting to see more emails with subject: "Sad News". There is also that quiet whisper amongst members acknowledging, that time is taking its toll and the strength of the club future is unknown. We can sit back and resign ourselves to reality or we can re-assess and rebuild the enthusiasm. I suggest the latter and offer a solution.

The Next Generation: The next generation is those folks aged 30 to 60. Although I would hope that this was the next generation of MG enthusiasts, I consider this generation the lost generation. When they were youngsters, the rage was horsepower and speed and today tout the muscle cars "they grew up with". This is the key phrase: *"They grew up with."*

The Next-Next Generation: This generation is today's teenagers. This generation is important because most of our adult interests and values are based our youth experiences. Repeatedly, I hear that someone owns a car because it was their dad's and they remember it as a kid. I first saw my car, TC7670, as a kid when it was owned by my cousin and freshly repainted. This was a memorable event and I was proud to become the next owner.

So, what can we do as a club to rebuild our membership base?

Club Leadership: The senior leadership and event planners should consider and re-focus on today's youths: our grandchildren and friends of our grandchildren. At a minimum, each club member should be encouraged to bring a "junior member" to each event. This should be a standing rule. If there is a club event, maybe even offer an equivalent junior event for those less than 20 years old. Each club should plan their annual calendar to support the junior membership. Any event chairperson should have a junior assistant (mandatory!) Involve the youth in planning, they will bring their friends.

Club Members: You are the mentors. Please involve at every opportunity the participation of our junior members. Don't change the oil without some "junior assistance" even if it is the neighbor kid. Take the time to tell stories about your car when you were a kid. Teach the next-next generation about how to care for, maintain, and enjoy.

Junior Member Achievement: Our junior members need to be rewarded. Many clubs have a point system for end of year awards. When was the last time you remember someone under 20 getting an MG achievement award? Me neither. Clubs should set up a tiered awards program for the juniors and identify the different levels. Then outline basic point programs to achieve these awards and finally assign a "Mentor" to each "Junior" to monitor and assist. Example levels: MG apprentice, Shade Tree Mechanic, MG Master Mechanic. Would it not be great fun for a Junior to set up a rally that required at least 1 junior member in each car in order to qualify for as a winner? And then the Junior organizer gets awarded with the title of "Rally Master" for his achievement?

Junior Liaison: In order to tie all of the above together I would suggest that each club establish a dedicated position to oversee and implement the concept of Junior membership. This individual would be solely responsible for the coordination of Junior membership events, mentorship, publicity and recognition programs. I cannot overstate the importance of a central figure to bridge the gap between the senior and junior members and institutionalize a local junior membership program.

Overall, the main concern is who will be tomorrow's members of our clubs and just as important, who will be the leaders. As today Generals were yesterday's "Boy Scouts", tomorrow's MG Club President can be one of today's *"Next-Next Generation"*.

MMM MGs to Shine in Carefree, Arizona

The North American MMM Register is joining with GoF West to celebrate our 2013 Western National Meet. We live in a very large country so in order for our membership to have a National Meet we have to have two a year. Our Eastern National Meet is going to be held in Put-in-Bay, Ohio in late August. Our Register was created several years ago by Jerry Keuper to provide a means of communication among owners of MMM MG cars in North America.



"MMM" refers to Midget, Magna, Magnette, the overhead cam MGs produced from 1929 to 1936. Currently some 230 members participate in the Register (including several "Friends" who do not presently own a MMM car but have an abiding interest therein.) The members own a total of 250+ cars encompassing 22 different models.

NAMMMR is an affiliated club of MG Car Club Limited of Abingdon, England and is closely related to The Triple-M-Register in the UK. The MG Car Club of England is one of the largest and longest established one-make clubs in the world.

Midget, Magna, and Magnette - three little words that describe MG in its most exciting and formative years, from the 1928 London Motor show which saw the launch of the first M type Midget, to 1936 when the last overhead cam car came out of the Works. These were the Cecil Kimber years...golden years for automobilia and MG in particular. Kimber was in his prime, an innovative, feisty task master, and a dogged and enthusiastic proponent of automobile excellence through competition. It is said that the early Midget and its following brethren would scarcely have made quite such an impact without the tremendous boost furnished by MGs racing and record-breaking achievements.

Early successes in the Brooklands 12/12 races propelled MG into the forefront on light car racing in the 30's...the men, women and cars were legendary and the accomplishments were legion. Through the 30's MG won more motoring competitions of all sorts than any other marque!

Of the 11,500+ MMM cars produced between 1928 and 1936 there is one common thread: the strong, small displacement, single OHC engines that were the heart of these four cylinder Midgets and six cylinder Magnas and Magnettes. They are marked by a unique vertical dynamo/bevel gear cam-drive train and range from 746cc to 1271cc.

Today more than 3000 of these historic MGs are in the hands of enthusiastic MMM Register members worldwide, and as it is the mission of the Register to preserve and foster the use and enjoyment of these historic prewar MGs, the North American MMM Register welcomes you to come see, up close and personal, the only MGs that bear Cecil Kimber's fingerprints!

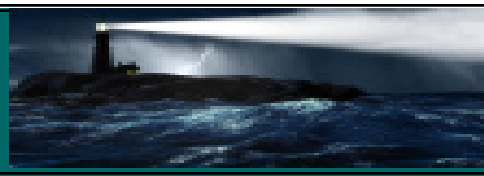
The Register's activities during our National event will parallel and join the GoF West activities with quite a bit of tire kicking in the parking lots.

We will also participate in car shows at MGOC's MG's by the Bay in Danville and the Scottish Games in Pleasanton, for a calendar total of 21 events. 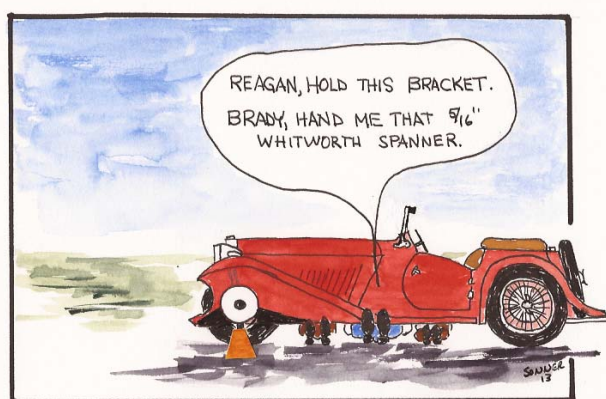
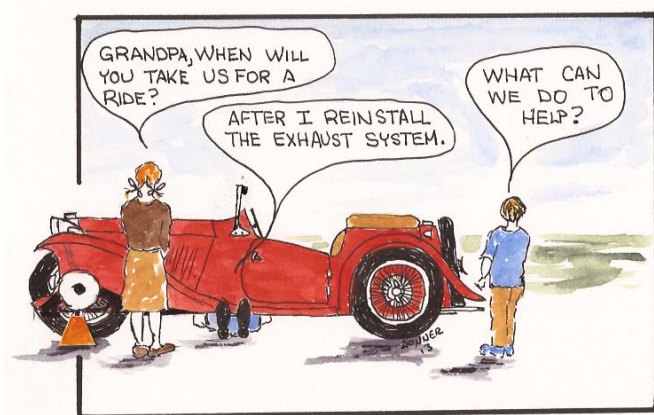
Left: SSTS MGs under the wings of historic planes at the Air Museum at Travis AFT.

Do you know the history of your club?

Club History: At the present, our history never seems important because it is fresh in our minds. But after time we realize that our history is our heritage. Many of the car clubs of yesterday have gone defunct, many have merged with others clubs. And there are many that continue on with the rich history of the past. Or is it? Does your club have a historian to capture the events of today so they are remembered for tomorrow? Does your club still have charter members who can help chronicle the club's past?

The Sacramento Valley MG Car Club (SVMGCC) knows exactly how it was started. Here's the story.

How the SVMGCC Got Started

I started work at British Motors of Sacramento in July 1977. I was selling brand new Jaguars, Triumphs and MG's. At that time, the MG car was, to me, simply a transaction. I was a young man in his late twenty's was making a lot of money, just selling MG Sports Cars.

However, all that changed on August 10th 1978. When I actually became an MG owner. I had never owned a new car in my life and this new MG was now my pride and joy.
