#### HB 1 Haleigh's Hope Act

 Signed into law by Governor Nathan Deal on April 16, 2015



#### HB 1 Final Passage



#### What did HB 1 do?

- Provides immunity from prosecution for possession of medical cannabis oil for 8 qualifying conditions
- Cannot possess more than 20 ounces
- Patient must register with the state for registration card in order to have immunity
- Oil cannot exceed more than 5% THC

#### HB 1

- Qualifying conditions for immunity are:
  - Seizures
  - Cancer
  - ALS, Lou Gehrig's Disease
  - MS
  - Crohn's Disease
  - Parkinson's Disease
  - Mitochondrial Disease
  - Sickle Cell Disease

#### SB 16 signed into law May 19,2017

- Adds 6 conditions to existing law
  - Alzheimer's
  - AIDS
  - Autism
  - Tourette's Syndrome
  - Peripheral Neuropathy
  - EB (rare skin disease)
  - Also adds eligibility if in hospice care

#### SB 16 signed into law May 19,2017

- Provides reciprocity with other states
- Reduced reporting requirements for physicians

# Legislative Addition 2018 HB 65

- Adds PTSD & Intractable Pain to Low THC oil registry
- Creates Commission to study and recommend a solution for the access issue in Georgia
- Signed by Governor Deal May, 2018

#### Challenges remaining for patients

#### **Typical daily message:**

"I've signed up for the registry, what do I do now????"

or

"How do I now get the oil???"

#### Challenges remaining for patients

- Still can't access medicine in Georgia, with limited exceptions – very low THC oil (less than .3%), considered hemp, can be purchased online (don't know content)
- Must travel to another state to obtain it, and risk violating federal law by bringing it back to Georgia (impractical for most)
- Many are buying plant off the street, and making the oil themselves (illegal, don't know content)
- Underground network.....(not sustainable)

#### **NATIONAL UPDATE**

- 46 states now have some form of medical cannabis law on the books
- 31 allow some form of cultivation inside their state, including Florida and Arkansas
- 15 have possession only laws similar to Georgia, including Tennessee, Alabama and South Carolina

#### Federal Solution?

- Protect state medical programs
- Remove CBD from controlled substance act
- Eliminate federal research barriers
- Ensure equality for military veterans

## Poll: Georgians want med pot law expanded

More than 300 families have qualified for Ga.'s medical pot registry.

Georgians overwhelming ly back expanding the state's new medical marijuana law, according to a new poll from a group advocating the idea.

The poll also showed a nearly even split among Georgians on the idea of fully legaltzing marijuana for recreational use.

The results come after Gov. Nathan Deal said that he's not continced the state needs to expand its new program, which for the first time this year allows use of a limited form of cannabis oil to treat severe forms of eight illnesses including cancer, Parkinson's disease and epidepsy.

More than 300 families have since qualified for the state's new medical marijuana registry, allowing them to use the oil in treatment.

Parents and advocates, however, want lawmakers to go one step further: allow growers to harvest and distrib-

ute cannabis oil in-state.

The poll conducted on behalf of the newly formed Georgians for Freedom in Healthcare is part of that effort to show that Georgians are comfortable with expanding the program – even if the governor long.


The poll, conducted Nov. 29-30 by Atlanta-based Optiion Savey, found 84.5 percent of Bledy 2006 Georgia primary voters somewhat to strong by supported allowing production and distribution of cannabis off in Georgia.

Another 72.7 percent of respondents said they are some what to very confident law enforcement agencies could effectively police the law's expansion – something law enforcement officials in Georgia have said they are still skeptical about.

Among other findings, 81.8 percent of respondents said they support expanding the list of filtnesses now included in the program for the oil's use. Another 61.5 percent said they somewhat to strongly support allowing the smoking of medical marijuana as a form of treatment. And 49.4
