



- 1. Check the back of the church for sign-up sheets. Or call/email me if there is a place you would like to work, and you have not signed up yet. We especially need kitchen help. The kitchen is a very busy place and the more hands involved makes for a smoother operation. Dishwashers are needed, also!
- 2. Crafts are needed. We need to fill those tables up. If you are not crafty, consider making a gift basket. You can pick up a basket at Goodwill and come up with a theme. We will be putting the baskets together at church on the evening of October 26th. We will have supplies to wrap up the baskets. Keep track of the cost so that we can place an appropriate price of your basket.
- 3. Santa's regifting ideas. Popular items are Christmas decorations or anything Christmas, Christmas sweaters/men's ties. Also, purses, jewelry, CD's, DVD's, *current* books, nick-nacks, any type of gift item, etc. Think of anything that would be good for a yard sale.
- 4. Kitchen monetary donations are welcome and needed. One can of oysters sells for around \$85 a gallon. We will need at least 15 gallons. \$85 x 15= \$1,275. There are 3 patties per platter. That is a lot of oysters. Please consider donating to this expense. Thank you.
- 5. Baked goods are also needed. Pies, cakes, cookies, candy, etc. Label items if they are sugar free, contain nuts, raisins, etc.

CROP Hunger Walks are community-wide events sponsored by Church World Service and organized by local congregations and civic groups to raise funds to end hunger at home and around the world. CROP Hunger Walks help to support the overall ministry of Church World Service, especially grassroots, hunger-fighting development efforts around the world. In addition, our local CROP Hunger Walk will retain 25 percent of the funds it raises to support hunger-fighting programs here at home for distribution to those in need through the Mt. Airy NET.

CROP Hunger Walks help to provide food and water, as well as resources that empower people to meet their own needs. From seeds and tools, to wells and water systems, to technical training and micro-enterprise loans, the key is people working together to identify their own development priorities, their strengths and their needs- something CWS has learned through some 70 years of working in partnership around the world.

This year's Mt. Airy CROP Hunger Walk will be held Saturday, November 4, 2023 starting at 9:00am and walkers will travel around the easy 1-mile trail in Watkins Park. Registration will begin at 8:30am in the parking lot of St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church, 609 Center St., Mt. Airy, adjacent to the park.
