Peace Lutheran Church June 2019



I want to thank each one of you, both individually and as congregations, for the love, respect, and encouragement you have shown me during this interim ministry. There have been a few challenges--the roads in February; the fact that I'm a guest in your communities and not a resident; and the fact that my home and husband, David, are in Spokane. Despite these limitations, I feel like the congregations have journeyed well through this interim time. Giving has stayed at expected levels and although attendance has dropped a bit, it has stayed up on the holidays. The joys have been the two baptisms--one in each congregation. Seeing the kids perform the Christmas story was great. Christmas Eve and Easter were outstanding. Sadly, I have been called on to preside at the memorial services of 14 of your members. That is a lot for the 9 months I've been with you. But, now it is time to move to the next phase of your congregational life. Your next called pastor will be Ian McMichael. He and his wife, Corrin, and their son, Hans, will do a wonderful job with you. Put your trust in him. He is your shepherd. Let him gently guide you into God's future. Let the Lord's transformation come into your hearts.

It doesn't take much to turn a noun such as, transformation, into a verb. Let's talk about Living Transformationally. In the book of Acts there is a dramatic description of Saul's conversion from persecuting Christians to proclaiming the gospel of Christ crucified, risen, and ascended. Along with the conversion is the transformation from the use of his Roman name, Saul, to his Hebrew name, Paul. It took a blinding light from heaven to change Saul into Paul. A penetrating and shocking light revealed what he had become in his zealousness to persecute Christians and opened him to the possibility of what he could become in Christ. The scales fell from his mind and spirit, as well as from his eyes. He saw and felt the loving grace of Jesus. He saw ruthlessness in himself. He saw truth in Christ. From Acts 9:18 we read, "and immediately something like scales fell from Saul's eyes and his sight was restored. Then he got up and was baptized."

We are meant to be changed because of this grace that God has shown to us in the selflessness of Jesus. We are meant to be surprised, even shocked. The presence of Jesus speaks a truth to us about this path we are on as we try to follow the example of Jesus. He invites us to walk the path of love by our trust and selflessness, through sacrifice & obedience. It is the path less traveled that Jesus followed God's leading--for our redemption and salvation.

Saul--now Paul--could see that he would be living and loving differently than he had before. Even before he could explain the change or plan the priorities that would govern his **newness**, he was already becoming transformed. Explaining and planning are sometimes the consequence of change and transformation, rather than the cause. When Christ declares you **new**, you are that already, and the mind and manners will hasten to catch up with this truth. We can start acting now the way we want always to be acting later. We can change-- our habits, our practices, our thinking--and let the newness in. The congregations of Peace and Trinity **can** transform, change, improve, and grow --in outreach, in openness and let the newness in. Our world can change with justice, with peace, with community--and let the newness in. God's grace makes it possible. Let's ask ourselves--what can I do to be Living Transformationally?
