# Pastor's Message

**25** But Jesus called them to him and said, "You know that the rulers of the Gentiles lord it over them, and their great ones exercise authority over them. **26** It shall not be so among you. But whoever would be great among you must be your servant,[a] **27** and whoever would be first among you must be your slave,[b] **28** even as the Son of Man came not to be served but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many."

—Matthew 20:25-28

Dear Member of Peace and Trinity,

Imagine with me for a moment. You are standing around at a party, minding your own business, sipping on a beverage of choice and partaking in all of the wonderful finger food, and someone comes up to you and starts a conversation with you by saying, "Don't take this personally but..." You don't know what is coming next, but you feel a pit drop in your stomach, you know whatever it is, is not going to be good. You immediately, within a millisecond, go through all the possible things that could come next: Am I eating too much and not leaving enough for others? Am I dressed appropriately for the occasion? Did I park the car outside correctly? Have I been doing OK at my job?

It's possible you've experienced something like this outside of social situations as well. This type of comment can really up the anxiety when it pertains to work performance, or when it comes from family, friends, or someone else we trust.

In part, hearing these comments and feeling anxious is part of being human. We wish people were self-aware enough to approach us with issues in different ways, but we attempt, as best we can, to remain centered on who we are, and to give ourselves the benefit of the doubt. In other words, we tell ourselves, "Whatever this person is saying, it will be extremely difficult to not take it personally, but I know that I am doing the best I can."

The trick, it would seem, is to recognize this fact: I am doing the best that I can. And then to also ask yourself the question, "Whatever comes next, does this person really get a vote in my life?" In other words, no matter how offensive the next words are, do I care enough about this person and what they think of me to let it ruin my evening? If you don't, we do our best to move on. If you do, then it is probably worth having a conversation with this person and growing from the conversation that follows.

But there is another side to this too, isn't there? A side where, instead of caring too much about what ever person thinks, people simply become indifferent to the world. Where they seem to lack joy, purpose, hope in a better tomorrow, a willingness to work together and, they at least give the impression that, they simply do not care what other people think. Instead of taking things personally, they simply drive harder towards the next goal, bulldozing people who may be in the way.

So whether you are the bulldozer or the empath above, they both have the potential to become two sides of the same coin, that end up paralyzing you as you try to care about what everyone thinks, or you don't care about anyone at all.

The trick is to decide whose opinion you truly do care about, who gets a vote in your life, and whose opinion you can just, simply, ignore. That's the hard part, the middle ground. This is highlighted as we head towards Easter, because Jesus coming to earth and dying was perhaps the most personal thing of which we can think. Jesus dying on the cross was for you, for me, and for all of us, in a very visceral and real sense. Jesus on the cross flies in the face of indifference. Jesus cares. We are meant to take it personally. And Jesus is not some random person at a party telling us our suit is wrinkled, Jesus is the Savior of the world. Jesus's thoughts do, in fact, matter a great deal to you and me as Christians. We are meant to listen! Jesus gets a vote!

So this Lent, take it personally. Not the comments from people meant to hurt you. I'm hopeful we can move past that. But take the death and resurrection of Jesus personally. Take his life as a testament to God's love personally. Because, it was meant for you, for me, for all of us. Personally.
