Pastor's Message

"Since we are surrounded by so great a cloud of witnesses, let us also lay aside every weight... and run with perseverance the race that is set before us."

Hebrews 12:1

Dear Members of Peace and Trinity,

Each year on November 1, or the Sunday following, the Church pauses to observe All Saints' Day, a festival of remembrance and hope. Whether you are reading this before or after that date, I wanted to take a moment to reflect on the important celebration with you all. I remember growing up, on this day, at Trinity Lutheran Church in Hermiston, the pastor would break out the largest handbell and ring it each time a name, collected in the previous weeks from the congregation, was read. At the end, we could yell out names and have the bell rung for those who were, for whatever reason, not listed. I also remember one year, a girl a couple of years younger than myself, yelled out the name of someone who was still alive. The pastor paused, made a comment about how we normally remember the saints who have died during this time, but then rang the bell anyway.

Two decades later, I still remember that moment. First, because it makes me grateful for the saints still on earth who surround me in my life of faith. We can call them, as the writer of Hebrews does, "witnesses," or simply mentors, friends, or family, but they remain vital to our life here. And second, this moment sticks in my mind because it reminds me that the witness does not end in death. The saints are lifted up each year because of what they have left behind, but also because of the community they continue to form, both here on earth and with God in heaven. We are a great cloud, spanding millenia, generations, time, and space.

This day reminds us that it is not just the well documented saints of church history who can claim that title. In fact, every baptized believer, living or deceased, is a saint: claimed, loved, and made holy by the grace of God. Martin Luther often referred to believers as both "saint and sinner," reminding us that sainthood is not about moral perfection but about being made new in Christ.

This communion is not just a poetic idea—it's a real and living connection, rooted in our shared faith in Jesus Christ. Those who have gone before us are not gone from the story of God—they are part of it still. And we, who continue on our earthly journey, are strengthened by their memory, their faith, and their example.

So as we light our candles, say our prayers, and gather around the table this All Saints' Day, may we be reminded that we are never alone. We are surrounded by a great cloud of witnesses—those who loved us, taught us, and pointed us to Christ. And one day, by God's grace, we too will take our place among them.

May this day also be a reminder that does not have the last word. Life and love have won the day. The promise is for those who have gone before us, and for us as well. Thanks be to God for the saints. Thanks be to God for the promise.
