Pastor's Message

By the sweat of your face you shall eat bread until you return to the ground, for out of it you were taken; you are dust, and to dust you shall return."--Genesis 3:19

Dear Members of Peace and Trinity,

I am, generally, an optimist. That doesn't mean I have my rose colored glasses on all the time. I also don't think that this fact precludes me from also being a realist. I am not an optimist, at least I don't think, that ignores the real challenges, pain, and brokenness that exists in the world. However, I remain an optimist. First, I think it makes life more enjoyable. It is just better to assume that people, as harsh as they can be sometimes, are simply doing the best that they can with what they have. It is more fun to assume good intent than bad. It is more life-giving to join in all the wonderful things that people are doing around the world, to find vocational call in the hard realities of life, and to hear God's call as we work to make the world a little less broken. I also think choosing to view the world in the best possible light is biblical. All that God has created is good. We are stewards of that goodness. To view life through this lens, no matter how hard it may seem sometimes, is a call from Christ. When life is too hard, when too much piles up, when we can't view the world like this, God is still with us, but God constantly calls us to participate in the goodness of God's creation. In many ways it remains a both/and. We Lutherans are good at that. There is one holiday, though, that brings out my cynical side, where it is difficult for me to view it in a positive light: Valentine's Day! Now, defenders of Valentine's Day will say that to find joy in the holiday one need only look into a Preschool classroom full of four year olds exchanging Valentines. Or, regardless of the less-than-stellar history of the holiday with regard to the greeting card companies, it can still be an extra day set apart to show people that you love them. You would be 100% correct on all counts. That is entirely true.

However, my biggest complaint about Valentine's Day is that it often gives this sort of unattainable goal of love. For one day at least, we ignore the fact that love is hard times. There are disagreements with those whom we love. There are days of immense stress, days where you are so tired you can't even utter a sentence, days when you hardly see each other because of busy schedules. Even as I write this, the optimist in

me is poking out to say, "Yes, but maybe this is the one day that you can put the hard stuff behind you for 24 hours and enjoy each other." While I can agree with my inner voice here, I also think this day puts so much pressure on that outcome, that I dare say it rarely actually happens.

But this year...this year! Take a guess as to what else falls on Valentine's Day? The beginning of Lent! Ash Wednesday. It is a day where we will remember that we are dust, and to dust we shall return. It is a day where we remember Christ's sacrifice for us, a true sacrifice of love. In some ways, I wonder if Ash Wednesday is a more realistic view of love than Valentine's Day. On Ash Wednesday we acknowledge that we don't want to, but that we will hurt those we love the most. That we will let them down. That we are sinful and broken even though we would give almost anything not to be. And yet, even as sinful broken people who will send our Savior to the cross, who live in a world that is falling apart all around us, we still choose to celebrate love. Jesus still chose to die for us. Still gave everything as a sign of God's love for us. That's worthy of

celebration and God is worthy of worship.

I think there is something there that will preach! If you'd like to hear more, or if you would simply like to gather with people who also want to enter into these forty days remembering their mortality, and their willingness to love deeply as a sign of God's love for us, then please join us to begin the journey together.
