A WORD FROM MOTHER DEBBIE

Collect: Second Sunday after Epiphany
The Book of Common Prayer

The other day I found myself Googling (amazing how that's a verb now!) what day the sun would start setting on or after 5 pm (January 22nd) or starts rising at/before 7 am (February 7th). I don't why, but part of it is just missing the light. It is part of the reason we have Christmas traditions that involve using lights and candles—it falls at the darkest time of the year for the northern hemisphere, and takes on traditions borrowed from ancient wintersolstice pagan festivals such as Saturnalia and Yule which all had elements of candles, fire or light in them, pushing back against the dark. And while I would hardly classify myself as a sun worshipper, I am strongly drawn to light and light filled spaces. I know many others feel the same way.

January in the life of the Church is Epiphany time. Epiphany is that season of manifesting, of revealing. We use the imagery of light in all this revelation, for light helps us to see; there is the kind of light we can perceive with our eyes, and the kind we can perceive only with our hearts. The Gospel readings of Epiphany shed light on who Jesus is: Jesus as King is revealed to and by the three Wise men of the East; Jesus as a baptized adult in the Jordan is identified as God's son; Jesus calling disciples, revealing God's teachings, and teaching those disciples that they too are 'the light of the world'.

But what does Jesus mean when he says to his disciples that they are 'light of the world'? After all, the Collect above calls Jesus the light—so which is it? Well, both actually. Jesus is the source, the light; we who are baptized into his death and resurrection, into his new life—we too are light carriers, light bearers, hopefully choosing to shine our Christ lights into the world. But as Jesus tells his disciples (and us too), we can't hide our light. If we do, we're not fulfilling our call, our mission—just like a lamp under a basket can't live out its mission either.



We, as the church, are to be a collective light as well. One that shows forth God's love, hospitality, mercy, and acceptance within our community—and to those who are seeking. A community that was called to serve, to help light others' way, so that 'He may be known, worshiped, and obeyed to the ends of the earth'—by letting our revealing light shine.

As the song we will sing at our Second Sunday service goes, "This little light of mine, I'm gonna let it shine..."

It's Epiphany time—time to shine.

Annual Meeting Sunday January 26 after ONE combined service at 9 am

Just like any 'corporate' body, our parish holds an Annual Meeting where we receive and hear reports from the various ministry groups for the year ended December 31, 2019, and elect new officers such as Wardens and Vestry members, who make up the governing board of the parish. The financial results from 2019 are presented as well as the projected budget for 2020 (which is approved by Vestry). We also elect delegates to Convention and Convocation as this time as well.

Our annual meeting will be held on **Sunday, January 26th** after a solo combined service. **The service will be held at 9 a.m., with the Annual meeting immediately following in the Parish House**. All are welcome to attend; however, voting is reserved for those age 16 and over who are 'communicants' of the parish (those who regularly participate in worship and the life of the parish).

The following positions are open and taking nominations at this time:

<u>Sr. Warden</u>: Bonnie Roberts is our current Sr. Warden and has agreed to serve one last term (thank you!) Warden can serve a maximum of 3 consecutive terms of 2 years each.

<u>Vestry member:</u> A three year term on the Parish Vestry (board): we need to fill one full term

<u>Vestry member:</u> A three year term on the Parish Vestry (board): we need to fill one full term position, provided the by-law revision passes.

<u>Convention delegates (3) and alternates</u>: These persons commit to attending a one-day Diocesan Convention which will held Saturday March 7th at the Crowne Plaza, Cherry Hill. <u>Delegates to Monmouth Convocation (3) and alternates (3)</u>: These persons commit to attending Convocation meetings twice a year (usually held on a weeknight).

We will also honor our retiring Vestry members: Nancy Pharr and Merissa Zuzulock. Barbara Drakulich was in this group, but stepped down this past fall when she and Scott moved to Livingston.

If you are interested in serving in any of these positions, please see our Nominating committee members: Mother Debbie, Sr. Warden Bonnie Roberts, Jr. Warden Mike Parmelee,



or Nancy Pharr or Merissa Zuzulock.

Proposed By Law Changes To be voted on our January 2020 Annual Meeting

The current Vestry (governing board) of All Saints' consists of the Rector as President, our Sr. and Jr. Wardens, and 9 Vestry members, making a total of twelve. For a parish our size, with an average Sunday attendance of about 60 to 65 or so (sometimes more), this is a bit large, and many churches our size have smaller Vestries. Diocesan Canons state the Vestry terms shall be three years in length and we can have as small as 3 and up to 12 Vestry members.

In order to balance our congregation size with our Vestry size, the Vestry has voted on a by law change for there to be six (6) Vestry members, plus two Wardens and the Rector. This means there will be two persons elected each year, vs. three. A small Vestry means that instead of serving on Vestry, this may free persons up to chair or lead a ministry group—which is itself a leadership ministry. The old and new bylaws are below: per our bylaws they need to be published in advance for discussion. These will be voted upon by the congregation in the early portion of the Annual meeting before conducting elections.

CURRENT:

Article II, Section 2

The Vestry of this Parish shall consist of a Senior and Junior Warden whose terms of office shall be two years each, or any unexpired part if required to fill a vacancy caused by an unexpired term, and <u>nine Vestry members</u> whose terms of office shall be three years each, or any unexpired part if required to fill a vacancy caused by an unexpired term.

PROPOSED:

Article II, Section 2

The Vestry of this Parish shall consist of a Senior and Junior Warden whose terms of office shall be two years each, or any unexpired part if required to fill a vacancy caused by an unexpired term, and **six Vestry members** whose terms of office shall be three years each, or any unexpired part if required to fill a vacancy caused by an unexpired term.



CURRENT:

Article IV, Section 1

To constitute a quorum of the Vestry, there must be present:

- A. The Rector, one Warden and five Vestry members, or
- B. The Rector, both Wardens and four Vestry members, or
- C. The Rector and six Vestry members.

Or, if there be no Rector, or if the Rector is unable to attend, a quorum shall be deemed present:

- A. One Warden and six Vestry members, or
- B. Two Wardens and five Vestry members.

PROPOSED:

Article IV, Section 1

To constitute a quorum of the Vestry, there must be present:

- A. The Rector, one Warden and three Vestry members, or
- B. The Rector, both Wardens and two Vestry members, or
- C. The Rector and four Vestry members.

Or, if there be no Rector, or if the Rector is unable to attend, a quorum shall be deemed present:

- A. One Warden and four Vestry members, or
- B. Two Wardens and three Vestry members.

Coat Drive Continues!



Stewardship

First, Thank you! to all those who have made Giving Commitments for 2020 so far, and those who have faithfully given this past year. As of press time, we have received 35 Giving Commitments for a total of \$110,478. This includes 6 new pledges vs. last year's Commitments, though we have lost a few due to moves or deaths—but represents a 13% increase (dollarwise) over last year. Let's keep the momentum going! The Church is grateful that you have stepped out in faith this way, giving intentionally and in trust.

For those of who still thinking about making a financial commitment to contribute to the church: we know that making that commitment to the church or any organization, for a future time (annually, or committing to make a certain contribution per week, etc), can feel unsettling. We all know how things can change suddenly and/or surprisingly: job losses, illness, home or auto repairs, you name it. And so our tendency is to be cautious, to hold on, to give AFTER everything else is taken care of—'just in case'.


But God asks us to trust, and to give out of our 'first fruits'. In other words, to give off the top, to give to God first. Why? First, all we have is from God, and so to give is to acknowledge that by giving thanks in a tangible, sacrificial way; and second, to give 'up front' exercises our spiritual muscles of trust in God's provision and love and generosity. Just like honoring the Sabbath disciplines us to let go and trust that God is in charge, and that it's not all up to us—so does intentional, practiced giving help us build trust in God, and help us realize that giving does not diminish us.

The Church fosters the development of that spiritual disciple through an invitation to making a Giving Commitment (or 'pledge') to the church. The ancient Israelites brought forward their first fruits offering to the temple in remembrance of all God had done for them—and these offerings were used to sustain the temple, its priests, and be used to help those in need. In our modern day context, we ask persons to consider giving a portion of monetary income which is used for similar purposes: the mission of the church, local and global. So, yes, a



Giving commitment helps the church fund things like operational costs (staffing, utilities, etc) but also funds local outreach, and even global outreach though the parish's giving 'upward' to the Diocese, who then passes a portion of the funds onto the larger Church.

Each of us have been invited to consider to stretch and strengthen our 'stewardship practice'—while strengthening the ministry of All Saints' as well. Please prayerfully consider taking a step forward in faith in making and/or increasing a Giving Commitment to All Saints'. Commitment of Giving cards are available on the back table in the church.
