

Mother Debbie's Schedule

A WORD FROM MOTHER DEBBIE

As I write this, on a rainy (again!) Tuesday morning, we are waiting for the delivery truck full of Canadian slate for the rectory roof project. After months of planning and negotiating, the long awaited rectory roof replacement project is under way. Scaffolding around the rectory will soon rise, construction materials and debris containers, etc will occupy the campus this summer. But in the end, another of the long planned capital projects—replacing the original



roof on the rectory--will be done. (The first project done last fall was the reinforcing the foundation of the rectory).

The needed capital project list is long, and this is only the tip of the iceberg. God willing, re-roofing the church will come next. However, how much gets done is truly up to us—we can only do what we have the funds for. The Cornerstone Capital campaign project list is extensive—and hopefully transforming for this community: not only in preserving the past with roof and foundation, stone and wood work for many structures but preparing for the future. Projects such as accessible access to the church, an improved parish hall layout, a better kitchen, better parking and access roads are other items that will go a long way to aiding the church on meeting and expanding mission.

The Campaign is beginning its outreach to the community—and we invite everyone's participation in that: making a pledge if you haven't not already done so, and inviting others who cherish either history or God's mission here to do the same. Many longtime area residents have family members buried here, or have been married here, or attended a funeral here. The Church exists to serve, and will continue as long as it is able. How long that is, is up to all of us.

Beyond the capital campaign, which is giving for a focused purpose in a limited time frame, there is the church's annual and ongoing mission budget—or for those business minded persons, our operating budget. Salaries, utilities, regular maintenance, outreach, office materials, etc. fall under that domain—and that budget is constrained as well. Joe Colquhoun, our Treasurer, spoke on that topic at our Pentecost Parish meeting, sharing the year-to-date financial information with those present. Right now, as of May 31, our operating deficit (yes, deficit) is minimal—thanks to a successful auction. However, summer tends to be a financially challenging time for many parishes, and so that picture is likely to change soon.



How can you help? Well, for those who have made a giving commitment to the Church, we ask that you keep meeting that commitment over the summer (and throughout the year) as much as possible. For those of you who have not yet made or are unsure of making a giving commitment (or even what that means), I invite your questions as well as your prayerful reflection. As we are made in God's image, and God's nature is to give, so we are to as well. God does not need our money—but God's mission in the world often does. But God primarily asks us to give—without strings or reservation—because doing so reflects our faith and trust in God and God's provision, and reminds us that all we have is thanks to God.

I have no doubt that as the Church is of Christ, and Christ is eternal, so the Church will be. What that will look like in the future, I have no idea. After all, the early church met in homes and public spaces, and there may come a day we return to that. But we have been given a gift, built with generosity and faith, in this campus of buildings, and it is now our turn to not only maintain these buildings for the sake of their history but even more, because they were built to serve God's mission, to serve the world as Christ does.



Cornerstone Campaign

In October, we launched our parish Capital Campaign: *The Cornerstone Campaign*. This \$2.5 million campaign, in partnership with the greater community, is multi-faceted: about 70% is dedicated to historical preservation (roofs, foundations, stained glass window, the barn, etc), and the remainder is dedicated to items such as improving access (a handicap access ramp, improving parking) and campus safety (upgrading the kitchen, making stairs and access to the upstairs parish hall safer), in addition to building the Trust's endowment to provide for future needs. And while we know that only a portion of these monies will come from within our own parish base, it is important that everyone consider how they can give: a one-time gift, or a gift over time.

Beginning this spring, we will begin reaching out to the greater community: individuals, agencies, and foundations that share a passion for supporting historic landmarks or the mission of the church, and they will want to know: "How committed is the parish?" That is why we have been actively inviting everyone for their participation, at whatever level is comfortable for you and your family. Pledge statements can be found at the back of the church or in the hall. Pledges can be submitted at any time, and paid over a 3 year period or done as a one time donation.

Our goal was to wrap up the parish portion of the campaign by March 31, and we are close! To date we have total donations and/or pledges of close to \$233,875. Thank you!! This plus our State grant of \$150,000 means that we are close to funding the replacement of the rectory and church roofs —the next project after that is make the church entrance more accessible. Every pledge and dollar counts to help preserve and improve All Saints' campus, and make it more welcoming!

Our Cornerstone Campaign Prayer

Lord Jesus Christ, you call your Church to be the household of God. The founding families of All Saints' Memorial Church answered that call and built upon your foundation. May we, who have been blessed by their generous good work, continue this mission not only by preserving the good works left to us but also building upon them, renewing our buildings and also our mission. Give us grateful and generous hearts to share of ourselves and resources so we can continue to share the gift of this campus with others, and find new ways to serve our neighbors. All this we ask in and through the Name of the One who binds us all together, Jesus, the Cornerstone. Amen




Pentecost Parish Meeting

At our Pentecost Parish meeting, held on June 9th, we covered a number of items. First, Mother Debbie led a discussion about the mission of the Church—which is to continue Christ's work of love and reconciliation and to bring people into a deeper relationship with God and each other in Christ. The Church lives out its mission through its members, through prayer and worship, sharing the Gospel, and as the Book of Common Prayer says, by 'promoting justice, peace and love.'

We live out the Church's mission in many ways here at All Saints': worship and formation, outreach, fellowship, sharing our campus with others in the community, Mass on the Grass in Highlands, Ashes to Go on Ash Wednesday, working with other faith communities in the area. We do some aspects of mission well, and others may need a second look. Regardless, no one church (or one person) is called to all things to all people. So, what are we (personally and as a community) called to?

Those in attendance were asked to indicate which three or so ministry areas they felt we should focus on—AND how they would like to be involved in that. Thank you to all for your input! As of now, our main communal focus areas appear to be Worship, Fellowship and Outreach. However, there are still a number of persons we have not yet heard from—so fill out a 'Focus on Mission' form as found in the back of the church, and let us know how you feel All Saints—and you—are called to serve God's mission!

The Vestry will using this information to discern the focus the church's resources (including our time) as we move forward in the second half of the year—and beyond.


2019 Project Backpack Update: July 14 - September 1
