A WORD FROM MOTHER DEBBIE

For we are God's servants, working together; you are God's field, God's building.

1 Corinthians 3:9

As All Saints' has progressed through its Cornerstone Capital Campaign, which is inherently building focused, such passages have become more meaningful to



me—but not necessarily how you might think. For me, the Church is not and never has been about the buildings. Part of it (a large part) is my knowledge and commitment that the Church is the people, the assembled community around Christ. But a lesser part, one that I only discerned recently, is the fact that I don't connect a building to my spiritual formation; a 'church home', as it were.

I was raised Roman Catholic, and we moved to Freehold in 1966. We began by attending St. Rose of Lima in Freehold Borough, where I received my First Communion and made my first confession (now called the Rite of Reconciliation). But as Freehold was growing, often times the congregation was too big to fit in the old church building, and masses were held in St. Rose school gym. In 1971, the Diocese decided to plant a new church in the Township: St. Robert Bellarmine, and we were to be founding members of that congregation—one without a building until 1975.

Worship was held in various schools; the Pastor (Fr. Dentici) and the other priests lived in a suburban home near the high school. A group of Sisters of Mercy nuns lived for a time in home at the end of my block—and it is there I received middle school religious education. Other CCD classes were held in various parishioner homes; my father taught for a brief while too. My confirmation took place in Laura Donovan school. So, for me, who worshipped in a variety of secular spaces, church was never about the space—but it was about the people: the priests and nuns, the parents of my friends who taught and served, the people who gave and worked to build the community. Each person a part of God's building, Christ's body.

And it is the people—the assembled community around Christ—that does the work of the Church: the Church's mission of love, reconciliation, justice and peace through worship and prayer, evangelism and care for those in need. Yes, it helps to have a space to do that in—but it is not necessary. However, what is necessary is for people to give to foster, sustain and grow



that mission: in time, in talent, and yes, in resources.

Each parish or mission congregation in the Episcopal Church has its own dynamics to work with: whether one has a full or part time priest, or a deacon in charge; whether it has no paid staff or multiple paid staff; new or old buildings, surrounding land or cemetery, or a small spot on a street, or even a rented store front. All however gather for worship and prayer; all are connected through our Diocesan structure. Here at All Saints' we are blessed to have clergy and staff, buildings to use and to share with the community. The extent of mission we do and can continue to do is up to us, based on our sharing of our time, talents and resources. Certainly we could do without a number of things—many do. After all, all we need is Jesus Christ and those willing to follow him, living out their faith in action. Regardless there is a cost: primarily, surrendering ourselves to Christ; and second, giving of ourselves for God's mission.

This mission has been ongoing at All Saints' for over 150 years—which means multiple generations of lives being touched in some way through this place. We hope and pray that will continue for generations to come—but each of us has a part to play in that story: each of us represents a stone in God's building, a planting in God's field. What we do or share, or choose not to do or share, has an impact on the structure of that 'building' or the harvest of the 'field'.

So, this month, as we reflect on and give thanks for God's good gifts and how we are to be good stewards of them and God's mission, ask yourself: How can I help further God's mission in the world? What kind of 'building' or 'harvest' do I want to be part of? What am I willing to give of myself and my time or talent or resources so to make that happen? Each of us have a part to play—for WE are the Church. Let us work together as God's servants—and keep building on the foundation laid for us, that of Jesus Christ our Lord.

Stewardship

First, Thank you! to all those who have made Giving Commitments for 2019, and those who have faithfully given this year. The Church is grateful that you have stepped out in faith this way, giving intentionally and in trust.

Making a financial commitment to contribute to the church, or any organization, for a future time (annually, or committing to make a certain contribution per week, etc), can feel unsettling. We all know how things can change suddenly and/or surprisingly: job losses, illness, home or auto repairs, you name it. And so our tendency is to be cautious, to hold on, to give AFTER everything else is taken care of—'just in case'.

But God asks us to trust, and to give out of our 'first fruits'. In other words, to give off the top, to give to God first. Why? First, all we have is from God, and so to give is to acknowledge that by giving thanks in a tangible, sacrificial way; and second, to give 'up front' exercises our spiritual muscles of trust in God's provision and love and generosity. Just like honoring the Sabbath disciplines us to let go and trust that God is in charge, and that it's not all up to us—so does intentional, practiced giving help us build trust in God, and help us realize that giving does not diminish us.

The Church fosters the development of that spiritual disciple through an invitation to making a Giving Commitment (or 'pledge') to the church. The ancient Israelites brought forward their first fruits offering to the temple in remembrance of all God had done for them—and these offerings were used to sustain the temple, its priests, and be used to help those in need. In our modern day context, we ask persons to consider giving a portion of monetary income which is used for similar purposes: the mission of the church, local and global. So, yes, a Giving commitment helps the church fund things like operational costs (staffing, utilities, etc) but also funds local outreach, and even global outreach though the parish's giving 'upward' to the Diocese, who then passes a portion of the funds onto the larger Church.

This November, each of us will be invited to consider to stretch and strengthen our 'stewardship practice'—while strengthening the ministry of All Saints' as well. Please prayerfully consider taking a step forward in faith in making and/or increasing a Giving Commitment to All Saints'.

Proposed By Law Changes

To be voted on our January 2020 Annual Meeting

The current Vestry (governing board) of All Saints' consists of the Rector as President, our Sr. and Jr. Wardens, and 9 Vestry members, making a total of twelve. For a parish our size, with an average Sunday attendance of about 60 to 65 or so (sometimes more), this is a bit large, and many churches our size have smaller Vestries. Diocesan Canons state the Vestry terms shall be three years in length and we can have as small as 3 and up to 12 Vestry members.

In order to balance our congregation size with our Vestry size, the Vestry has voted on a by law change for there to be six (6) Vestry members, plus two Wardens and the Rector. This means there will be two persons elected each year, vs. three. A small Vestry means that instead of serving on Vestry, this may free persons up to chair or lead a ministry group—which is itself a leadership ministry. The old and new bylaws are below: per our bylaws they need to be published in advance for discussion. These will be voted upon by the congregation in the early portion of the Annual meeting before conducting elections.

CURRENT:

Article II, Section 2

The Vestry of this Parish shall consist of a Senior and Junior Warden whose terms of office shall be two years each, or any unexpired part if required to fill a vacancy caused by an unexpired term, and nine Vestry members whose terms of office shall be three years each, or any unexpired part if required to fill a vacancy caused by an unexpired term.

PROPOSED:

Article II, Section 2

The Vestry of this Parish shall consist of a Senior and Junior Warden whose terms of office shall be two years each, or any unexpired part if required to fill a vacancy caused by an unexpired term, and six Vestry members whose terms of office shall be three years each, or any unexpired part if required to fill a vacancy caused by an unexpired term.



CURRENT:

Article IV, Section 1

To constitute a quorum of the Vestry, there must be present:

- A. The Rector, one Warden and five Vestry members, or
- B. The Rector, both Wardens and four Vestry members, or
- C. The Rector and six Vestry members.

Or, if there be no Rector, or if the Rector is unable to attend, a quorum shall be deemed present:

- A. One Warden and six Vestry members, or
- B. Two Wardens and five Vestry members.

PROPOSED:

Article IV, Section 1

To constitute a quorum of the Vestry, there must be present:

- A. The Rector, one Warden and three Vestry members, or
- B. The Rector, both Wardens and two Vestry members, or
- C. The Rector and four Vestry members.

Or, if there be no Rector, or if the Rector is unable to attend, a quorum shall be deemed present:

- A. One Warden and four Vestry members, or
- B. Two Wardens and three Vestry members.





Daylight Saving Time Ends! Sunday, November 3rd

A 15 Year Blessing > From A Homeless Person

This is a story that happened 15 years ago but it has always stayed with me since then. On the way back from work every evening, more often than not there would be a homeless man standing at the exit of the freeway. He looked to be in his late 40's but was probably a lot younger. He had shoulder length straight black hair a short beard, and he was of average stature.

His eyes were what struck me the most about him, they were brown and they had a sparkle. Like an inside light that was beaming out of his eyes. His eyes, I thought, represented the man in general. People say they can tell a lot from a person's eyes. It was certainly true in his case. He always waved at every car, he was always happy and smiling and sometimes almost dancing.

Every day after work I would remember to gather any spare change, and put it aside to give to him if I saw him. A feeling of joy would come over me every time I saw him, as I came off the ramp. He had that effect.

I'd quickly roll down my window and give him the coins. Occasionally the red light would be on for a minute and we would ask each other about our day. His answer would always be the same, "I'm blessed!".

I knew what his answer was going to be every time, yet I would still ask. It amazed me that even in his situation of being homeless he was so positive, and his answer would remind me of how blessed I was. A single mother of four amazing kids, with a place to call home and with a job to provide for my kids.

Then one day I was called into my boss's office and was told that I was being laid off due to the economy. A feeling of worry engulfed me, and for the rest of that day all I could think of was "how am I going to provide for my kids, how am I going to pay rent, what am I going to do?"

Needless to say that on my way home that day I was very sad and upset. I didn't remember to look for my spare change and keep it ready like I usually did. I wasn't feeling the joy as I got off the ramp where the homeless man would be. Yet there he was as always, as I turned the ramp. He set his eyes on me, while still smiling and waving at others.

I'd hoped to catch the green light, but I missed it. While I was waiting for the red light to turn, he strolled over to my car. He had a big smile he looked me straight in the eyes and said



"today I will give you a dollar". He then reached into his pocket and pulled out a dollar bill. I was blown away. I burst into tears. I wanted to jump out of my car and hug him! You see that day he gave me more than a dollar bill, he taught me a valuable lesson. No matter what material things are taken from you, no one can take away your choice to be joyful. My ride home was smooth sailing, I had lost my job, had no savings, but I knew I was blessed!

Every time I'm faced with challenges, I think of the homeless man's valuable lesson and remember that I am blessed.

Dear Fellow Saints!

Ephesians 1:15-16 (CSB) Prayer for Spiritual Insight

¹⁵ This is why, since I heard about your faith in the Lord Jesus and your love for all the saints, ¹⁶ I never stop giving thanks for you as I remember you in my prayers.

As we enter the month of November, there are many things to observe. The beautiful colors of Fall, November is the perfect balance of fall and winter. The crisp, fresh air you get to break out your cozy sweaters, watch the leaves change color and eat pumpkin flavored everything. We are urged this month to be aware of Diabetes, Epilepsy, Veterans and Caregiver's and last but definitely not least - Thanksgiving. I'll go ahead and acknowledge the giant turkey in the room, Thanksgiving can be the pits for people who are grieving. Many of the values, traditions, and messages associated with the day, like warmth, comfort, gratitude, and family togetherness, can feel in direct conflict with a grieving person's actual reality. If you are grieving, you probably know what I mean by this. Basically, grief can make people feel cheated, angry, self-focused, bitter, lonely, isolated, resentful, guilty, sad, anxious, worried, or depressed.

Although you may be hesitant to admit it in the face of all the festivities, the '30-Days of *Thankfulness*' challenges on Facebook, and Charlie Brown and his dang pumpkin. Know that you are amongst friends who have experienced loss. And, it's okay to admit that you're feeling just a little (or a lot) less grateful than you have felt in years past. After a death, it's common for grieving people to feel apathy towards the experiences and activities that used to bring them joy. This is not a deliberate choice anyone makes, grief just changes the way life looks and feels. Sadly, this loss of joy may seem like a secondary loss, especially if you feel out of touch with things you previously cherished, like holidays and special days. What you wouldn't give to feel those old familiar and enthusiastic holidays feelings, but instead, it feels like you're standing out in the cold, watching through a window while everyone else enjoys the warmth and togetherness of the holiday season.

With all the uplifting and nostalgic holiday messaging, no one would blame you for feeling left out. Many people feel like the holidays are only for happy people and so those who are sad either need to shape up or ship out. However, I'm here to refute this notion. Your invitation to the holidays isn't revoked simply because you don't embody holiday cheer.

Please know many of us experience the heavy thoughts and distressing emotions of grief and



you may not be the only one thinking about scraping Thanksgiving altogether. I know my 1st Thanksgiving was awful; I worked and then went to bed. Maybe you're dreading the grief triggers, maybe your loved one seemed so central to the day that you wouldn't know how to carry it off without them, or maybe you're just feeling anything but grateful.

A side point. There are those who grieve holidays not because those who have died are no longer with them, but because they never had the "Norman Rockwell" celebration that is offered up as the expected "norm".

If it's the latter (a sense of gratitude) that's making you feel cut-off from Thanksgiving,

I would like to present some simple suggestions.

Just as the holidays aren't only for happy people, neither is gratitude. You don't have to choose between grief or feeling grateful. You can feel two things at once. In fact, **grief is fertile ground for experiencing conflicting emotions.** So may I offer this, try (Yeah, I know its easier said than done) to have a balanced outlook towards gratitude this Thanksgiving. Why is this suggestion important? Because, frankly, it stinks to feel alienated, isolated, left out, and disconnected, especially during the holidays.

Okay, there are two parts to this, so here goes.

Part 1: Remember, it's okay to feel not grateful

I know that other people may be like, "Rah, Rah. office gathering or party! Which may leave you feeling cranky or sad; you are simply a person who is having a difficult time particularly during this time of year. It's okay to acknowledge this and to recognize your grief, anger, apathy and sadness. You don't need to stuff your feelings for the benefit of other people. I know grief is something that everyone experiences yet no one is comfortable with - but, the bottom line here is that it's okay to acknowledge all the reasons why you are anything but grateful.

Part 2: For every gripe, find a gratitude

Look, we know the world has robbed you of someone so incredibly precious to you, and so its beyond annoying for me to come along and tell you to be grateful. I don't offer this suggestion lightly because I know finding gratitude may feel like a stretch. Let me suggest this balancing your outlook is important. Finding gratitude doesn't have to be complicated. It's simple, actually. As simple as seeing the beautiful colors of the leaves or enjoying a child's laughter ...

Even though Thanksgiving will feel different this year, actively seeking gratitude can be an empowering way to reclaim a part of the holiday for yourself.
