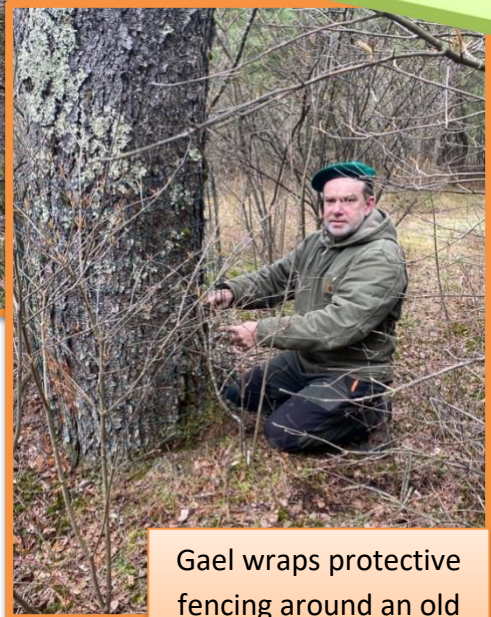

Spring trail work is in full force by volunteers Gael & Rebekah Audic. High gale winds forced many groups of trees down over our trails which they cleared. Two bridges needed sizable extensions, and another bridge needs to be replaced yet. Your donations make it possible to buy materials and tools necessary for this work.

Bridge extensions cover wet areas.

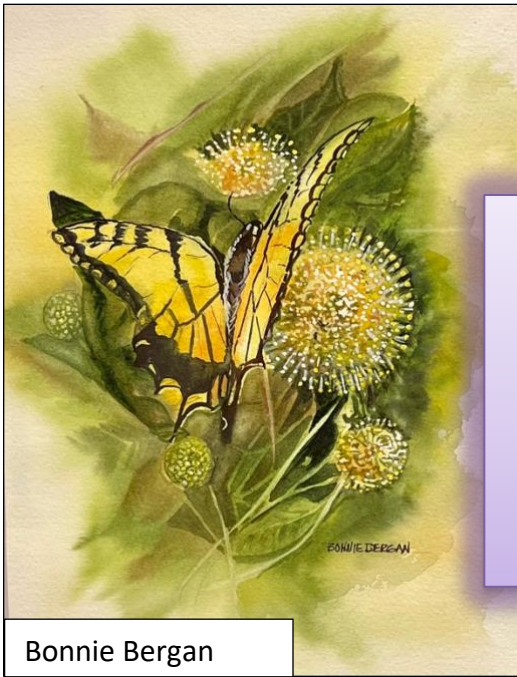


HOW WE GET ALONG WITH OUR BEAVERS

We wrap some (not all) cherry trees with fencing to save from being eaten by the beavers. Sometimes they fell a tree and it gets hung up so they can't access the edible bark. Gael helps them by felling it to earth level where they can eat it. He will even turn the tree so they can get to all sides. When the beavers are finished, he cuts it up for firewood.

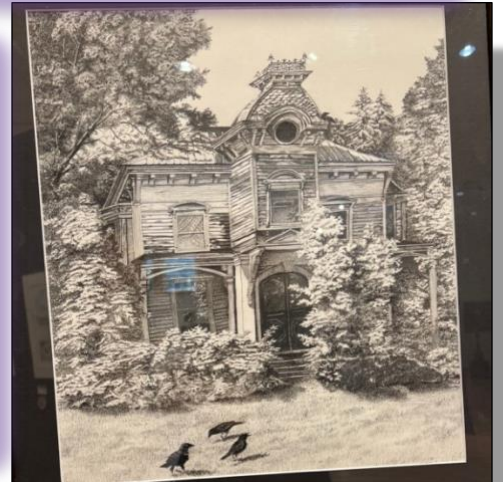

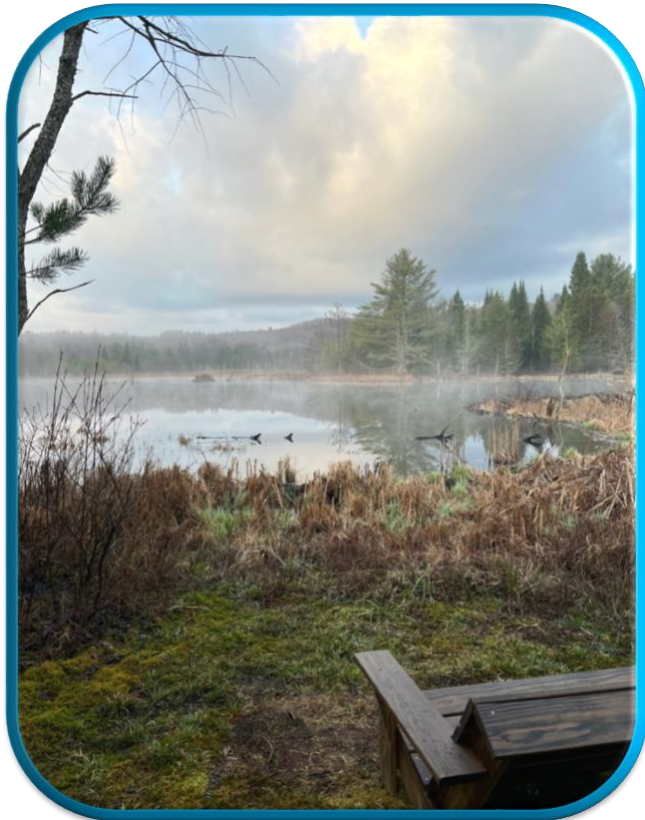
