### **Bloomsdale Fun Farms**

Carla Fischer is a retired High School Teacher who also worked for Eckert's Farm for many years. She and her family opened Bloomsdale Fun Farm in 2021 as an agritourism attraction. It's similar to Eckert's, but with much more!

Bloomsdale Fun Farm is open for pumpkin season only, which is the last weekend in September and all weekends in October. General admission covers most attractions with a few exceptions.

The farm currently includes seven mechanical rides, play equipment, hiking trails, farm animals, and a multitude of other activities! They also include accessibility accommodations including a wheelchair lift for the hayride wagons and special swings and seating.

Twin City Area Optimists will be working the farm Saturday October 4 and Saturday October 25. Six volunteers will be needed each day for low liability tasks. Five volunteers will have assigned positions with the sixth floating to provide breaks. The shifts are eight hours and require a lot of standing. In exchange for the work, a donation will be made to our club.

# June 19, 2025 Tim Krysl



Tim Krysl joined our June 19 meeting to discuss Juneteenth. Tim teaches eighth grade United States History at Festus Middle School and is a history professor at Maryville University. He spoke to our club last year about Jim Crow laws. There was such positive feedback from last year's talk that he was invited to return this year.

To explain Juneteenth, Tim first reviewed the events of the Civil War, starting with the election of November 1860 which resulted in several states seceding from the Union. The states that seceded had threatened this action if Abraham Lincoln was elected President and followed through after the election. While they initially seceded as individual entities, they joined to form the Confederate States of America (CSA) on February 4, 1861.

The Civil War officially started on April 12, 1861 at Fort Sumter. While there were 11 states in the CSA, their flag included two more stars, adding Missouri and Kentucky for 13, although neither state seceded or joined the Confederacy.

Locally, Festus was divided by Main Street, with north of Main primarily supporting the Union and south primarily supporting the Confederacy.

President Lincoln's primary goal early in the Civil War was to preserve the Union. He signed the Emancipation Proclamation by Executive Order on September 22, 1862 which became effective January 1, 1863. A few things to note about the proclamation that many people do not realize:

- The proclamation did not say slavery was illegal unless you were in the 11 states that seceded, i.e. were part of an active rebellion.
- Great Britain and France were close to allying with the Confederacy. Changing the subject of slavery to a moral issue versus an economic issue discouraged that alliance.
- The Proclamation Emancipation resulted in an integrated military.

It was the responsibility of the Union Military to enforce the Emancipation Proclamation as it was a military decree. The last Confederate state after the end of the Civil War was Texas, primarily due to the small number of Union troops available to enforce the proclamation. When Union troops arrived on June 19, 1865 and found slavery still intact, Major General Gordon Granger announced General Order #3 which informed Texans that "all slaves are free". That was the birth of Juneteenth.

Juneteenth has regularly been celebrated in Texas, but more limited elsewhere until the Civil Rights movement in the 1950's – 1970's. Texas declared Juneteenth a state holiday in the 1980's with other states following afterwards. It became a National Holiday on June 17, 2021 through Executive Order by President Biden.

Locally, Juneteenth celebrations circulate between the Quad Cities, with the primary celebration in 2025 being in Herculaneum.


