June 20, 2024 Speaker: Tim Krysl Local Historian



Tim Krysl presented information about how the post-Reconstruction Jim Crow laws still impact people of all races today. Tim has been teaching eighth grade American history at Festus Middle School for 17 years. He is interested in creating an interpretative center focusing on the history of Jim Crow laws and their effect on this (Twin Cities in particular) community. Tim also is a history professor at Maryville University where he is working on developing a course on local (St. Louis) history in addition to his other coursework.

"The Jim Crow laws were state and local laws introduced in the Southern United States in the

"The Jim Crow laws were state and local laws introduced in the Southern United States in the late 19 th and early 20 th centuries that enforced racial segregation. "Jim Crow" being a pejorative term for an African American. Such laws remained in force until 1965." (Google)

Tim's interest in the impact of Jim Crow laws spiked after attending a conference in Flagstaff, Arizona in the summer of 2023. The conference focused on the Dine' (Navajo) and life on the reservation as well as The Green Book. The Green Book was an important tool for African Americans traveling during the early to mid 1900s.

- Reconstruction lasted from the end of the Civil War (1865) to the end of President Ulysses S. Grant's presidency (1877)
- The Green Book outlined safe places for African Americans to dine, lodge, and visit as they took part in exploring the United States as tourists or performers or for employment. Those traveling Route 66, which of course wound its way through St. Louis, would find this book of great use.

The end of Reconstruction did not truly reunite the United States from the conflicts in beliefs and actions that caused the Civil War. Even though constitutional amendments and federal laws guaranteed freedoms and rights to African Americans, states were left in charge of interpreting and applying those laws. Historically, it is believed that financial, physical, emotional, and political recovery from the Civil War lasted 100 years...but

some of that recovery did not involve equality or freedom.

Examples of Jim Crow laws that impact all today:

- Hunting license. South Carolina did not want former slaves to have access to guns so they established a law requiring those who wanted to hunt animals to feed their families to buy a license, with money which was not readily available to African Americans.
- Racialized spaces. These are areas that are defined by race, sex, or age, as to who may use or attend them. Examples include the Elks Lodge which was built for white men to congregate. Douglass High School in Festus-the gymnasium is still standing. Star School in Crystal City is only remembered by a plaque. The Miller (currently La Jade) theater had a balcony for African Americans. Gordon's Stoplight had a "coloreds only" window to place and pick up orders. Cemeteries-Mount Zion Cemetery was for African Americans.

Tim indicated the importance of this year, 2024, in relation to African American rights.

- 70 years ago, the U.S. Supreme Court ruled in Brown vs. Board of Education of Topeka, Kansas (1954) overruled the concept of separate but equal (established 58 years earlier in Plessy vs. Ferguson 1896) schools was unconstitutional, ending the racial segregation of schools.
- 60 years ago, the Civil Rights Act of 1964 was passed prohibiting discrimination on the basis of race, color, religion, sex or national origin.
- 2025 will mark the 70th anniversary of the brutal murder of teenager Emmett Till from Chicago who was visiting relatives in Mississippi. This horrible action sparked the flame of the Civil Rights movement.

Tim's goal is to show what Jim Crow laws looked like in the Twin Cities by having buildings and locations marked with information about how the races were treated in a separate manner. He'd like the racialized spaces of churches, businesses, schools, government and sports facilities, as well as cemeteries to have historical markers placed upon them.

Tim gave credit to one of his college professors with these words of wisdom, "Education is the cure for the cancer of ignorance."






