August 1, 2024 Missouri Kids Unplugged



Our speaker for the August 1 noon meeting was Rodney Bickel, Vice President of Missouri Kids Unplugged. His presentation was an enthusiastic display of his belief in and passion for this non-profit organization. We learned that Missouri Kids Unplugged (MKU) has been serving the youth of our community for over 10 years. Through a variety of events, MKU strives to get kids to put down electronics and experience the outdoors (in other words, unplug).

MKU founders Tony and Amy Krieg own and live on 130 acres off Hwy B in Hillsboro. It is there they host outings for approximately 1500-2000 kids each summer. All programs are completely FREE. As an avid fisherman, Tony shares his love for the sport by equipping and teaching participants to fish at the three ponds on the property. The children are gifted with

rods and reels for their future fishing adventures.

The Kriegs also host private events for kids organized by the YMCA, Home Depot and others as well as five or six public events each summer. All events share a single goal to teach youth what the natural world around them has to offer, a respect for nature and to have FUN.

What a treasure for the youth of our community.

Board Update:

August 15, 2024 Developmental Disability Advocates



Donna Pulliam, Service Coordinator for Developmental Disabilities Advocates, spoke to the club about the services they provide for individuals with developmental disabilities which enable them live full and enriched lives. The organization is a local government entity that receives property taxes from the state .and federal governments. Clients must receive Medicaid to be eligible for their services.

Donna indicated that one in five people has a developmental disability, 1,200 of which live in Jefferson County. The organization provides equipment, supplies, services and even help to find homes for the disadvantaged. The housing options available to the clients of

Developmental Disabilities Advocates include a group home, assisted living facilities, and residential care facilities.

Volunteers are needed to help with services such as transportation to doctors' appointments, grocery shopping, etc. They recruit volunteers through EZMO. Here is the link to that website if you would care to volunteer to be a driver: https://www.ifcac.org/ezmo.html.

Donna also spoke about the Barb McDowell Memorial Fund which was established in 1999 in recognition of Barb. Barb served from 1981 through 2000 as Executive Assistant of the JCDDRB and NextStep for Life, Inc. This fund helps meet needs of the disabled that don't fall under the criteria set up by the governmental bodies that provide the funding for Developmental Disabilities Advocates. August 22, 2024 Foster Together



Laura Storm, Executive Director, and Rebecca Kadlez, Outreach and Education Specialist, spoke about the Foster Together organization at the August 22 luncheon meeting.

Foster Together provides clothes, toys, baby items, etc. to children in foster care, free of charge. Their support extends to kinship placements and through the first year of reunification. The children receive a menu of what they are can get, but the facility is set up as a boutique so it is more of a shopping experience.

Most children enter foster care with only the clothes on their back. While the state does provide monthly subsidies to the foster parents, the funds are usually not available when the child is first placed.

In addition to clothes and supplies, new car seats can be obtained in a matter of hours without the child being present. The health department does supply new car seats, but requires the child to be present which is not always possible in a foster situation.

Another program started in May of this year is to provide beds. Since the beginning of this program, 40 beds and mattresses have been provided, primarily to kinship placements. The beds are ordered from Amazon and delivered in a couple of days.

The Foster Together organization started when Laura Storm had a calling to help foster children. Without having any contacts in the foster system, she started collecting items from

her own house as well as church and community. They started a Facebook page and people immediately started reaching out for help. The organization has grown from there. They currently have a 2000 square foot store in Arnold as well as storage units, and they hope to move to a larger facility in the next couple of years.

Rebecca Kadlez and her husband were both in the foster system and knew they wanted tof oster children once their bio kids got into their teens. Since 2017 they have fostered 47 children and adopted two. They are currently fostering two sets of twins, around 5 months apart. In addition to raising a family and working with Foster Together, Rebecca mentors families starting to foster and hosts recruitment classes.

September 12, 2024 Sponsor Appreciation

The Sponsor Appreciation luncheon was held September 12, 2024 Taytros. After a delicious lunch (and cake!) President Peggy Scott introduced Jean Naeger and Barb Schmidt. With Barb acting as technical support, Jean ran a presentation updating the sponsors on some of our club's activities this past year.

Jean began the program by reviewing some of the grants our club has received and the organizations that provided them.

Carroll Metzger explained the formation of our new foundation, The Foundation of the Twin City Optimist Club, and its benefit to the club. She also shared that the foundation has been granted incorporation by the state of Missouri, and that the IRS granted it a 501(c)(3) tax exempt status.

Mary Hatfield updated everyone on Twin City Days and the bike helmet project. Twin City Days was quite a success with 163 bike helmets being given away to children of all ages.

Becky Francis talked about a 'Learn to Ride Your Bike' track to be installed at Sunset Park in Festus. This project is in conjunction with the Festus Parks department and currently is in the design phase.

Debbie Hogenmiller provided an update on Brenden's Backpacks, an organization that feeds over 1700 children in 60 Jefferson County schools every week. During the most recent community food drive held by the TCA Optimists at the local Walmart, the community donated 10,019 individual food items, \$727 in cash donations and \$60 in online donations.

Barb Schmidt reviewed some of our past fundraisers from this year as well as upcoming drives which include Koeze Nut sales this fall and a wine tasting event in February, 2025.

September 19, 2024 Missouri Historical Society



Susi Reed, Volunteer Coordinator at the Missouri Historical Society and a previous educator in Jefferson County, spoke at the September 19 meeting. The Missouri Historical Society (MHS) was founded in 1866 "for the purpose of saving from oblivion the early history of the city and state." While it is called the "Missouri" Historical Society, it primarily addresses the history of the St. Louis area.

The MHS is part of the Metropolitan Zoological Park and Museum District which is funded by the taxpayers in St. Louis City and County. This district also includes the St. Louis Science Center, the St. Louis Art Museum, the St. Louis Zoo and the Missouri Botanical Gardens. The Missouri Historical Society is comprised of three physical campuses: The Missouri History Museum in Forest Park, the Library and Research Center on Skinker Blvd, and the Soldiers Memorial Military Museum in downtown St. Louis.

The History Museum is in the Jefferson Memorial Building in Forest Park and was dedicated in 1913. The north entrance reflects the architecture of that time while the south entrance has a more modern look due to expansions over time. Some of the more well-known items are the statues of Thomas Jefferson on the main floor and the replica of Charles Lindberg's plane, the Spirit of St. Louis. Current exhibits include the Eads Bridge and the 1904 World's Fair, which has just been updated as it is every 20 years. A source of pride in the museum is the accessibility Through Open Captioning, Audio Descriptions, Labels, etc.

The Library and Research Center houses many collections in addition to being a resource for research and genealogy.

The Soldiers Memorial Military Museum was dedicated by President Franklin Delano Roosevelt in 1936. An exhibit opening soon is on the Ghost Army. This exhibit will tell about a WW II unit that used inflatable tanks and sound effects to fool the Germans on the location of allied troops.

While there are exhibits and collections on display at all three locations, the bulk of the museum's collections actually are housed in a non-descript building in downtown St. Louis.

The MHS offers many programs for children as well as tours and events for adults. Twilight Thursdays, a concert series on the front steps of the museum, is held in May and September. The museum also can be rented for private events such as weddings, birthdays, etc.

The MHS Volunteer Program has approximately 120 active volunteers. Three to five new volunteers are added per month. Volunteers assist at all three MHS locations.

Several Optimists inquired about donating items to the museum. They were directed to the artifact donation form on the society's websites. While all submissions are reviewed, not all donations are accepted as they may already have duplicates of the same item.

BIKE SAFETY RODEO AND HELMET CLINIC August 11, 2024

In January 2024, Katie Huck presented to the Twin City Area Optimist Club New Project committee the need to teach children bike safety rules and the importance of wearing helmets. Gina Otto, the Event Planner Director for Trailnet, asked if we would be interested in doing a Bike Rodeo. Mary Hatfield and Katie went to monthly meetings with Trailnet and Bottleneck Bridge Race to see what the rodeo was all about and to offer what our club would do to help with the event. Chris Creed, from Pedal'N Pi, gave Katie a lead with Helmets First, organized by Dr Cangas. He agreed to supply us with one hundred helmets. We

partnered with Trailnet who provided education and equipment to perform the bike rodeo.

The Bike Rodeo had eight to nine stations. Twenty-nine children were fitted and given a bike helmet. After stopping at the stations, the children moved on to have their bike checked by a club volunteer for the ABC's (Air, Brakes, Chains) to make sure their bike was safe to perform the bike rodeo. Each child used their bike to ride a straight line, weave, figure eights, learn hand signals for turns, and try a short slow race.

The chair, Katie Huck, and co-chair, Mary Hatfield, along with club volunteers accrued 75.5 hours. We also gave out goody bags that included the safety rules of biking, proper helmet fitting, bike light, bike bell, and bike streamers. The children were given a treat after they were finished with the rodeo.

We have another project related to our original project at Twin City Days on Saturday, September 7, 2024, where we will be fitting helmets, distributing the helmets free of charge, and raffling a bike.


