Common Fraud
Speaker Detective Ryan Weston



Detective Ryan Weston was our guest speaker for the January 12, 2023 meeting. Detective Weston talked about the various types of fraud citizens of Jefferson County should be aware. Most common frauds are telephone and internet scams which may request your personal information. This can enable the criminal to access bank or credit card accounts.

Lonely older adults may be victims of internet chatting. Once a relationship is established the criminal will ask for money to help with an emergency or travel money to come visit. Be cautious, the IRS never calls demanding money, or that you will go to jail. Never purchase gift cards and then provide the gift card number to the criminal. Bottom line NEVER give out your personal information, including social security number to anyone.






