

Please be advised that pursuant to PA State law, intentionally ignite or discharge fireworks within one hundred fifty (150) feet of any structure, vehicle, place adapted for overnight accommodation (residence) or place for conducting business. A violation of this section may result in prosecution by local law enforcement.

Exempt from this law are handheld sparkling devices, toy caps or novelties.

Patterson Heights to Enhance Its Recycling Program

The Borough of Patterson Heights is planning to get two "retrievers" for the purpose of recycling paper and corrugated cardboard. These boxes will be placed behind the Borough Building, and can be accessed by car from 7th Street.

There are several reasons for this program. The cost of disposal of trash, including recyclables, continues to rise as we use up the space devoted to landfills. The more we can remove from the waste stream, the more we can relieve the pressure on landfill space and keep our costs down. The best part is that Pennsylvania will actually pay us for using less landfill space.

Our Recycling Program currently consists of the materials picked up by Valley Waste every week, along with the items picked up by the Borough (yard waste, leaves, Christmas trees). Last year alone we were responsible for recycling 29 tons of mixed recyclables (Valley Waste), 125 tons of yard waste, and 90 tons of leaves. That's a whole lot of landfill space!

We are asking you to support the paper and cardboard collection efforts. We want to further demonstrate to the Commonwealth

that we are committed to recycling, and ask that they support our efforts with grant money they make available for municipal projects. I think we all agree that our leaf pick-up is great for the Borough, but the leaf machine is on its last legs. Wouldn't it be great if the Commonwealth bought our next one?

A couple of recycling tips: The box for paper will accept newsprint, catalogs, magazines, shredded paper, and all types of junk mail. The box for cardboard is for corrugated cardboard only. That's the kind that is thicker, with a type of honeycomb construction between the layers—like a box you would get from Amazon. Please call the Borough Office with any questions—(724) 846-0677. Grass Clippings in Street

It has been brought to the attention of the Borough Council that grass clippings have been left on the street adjacent to resident property. The clippings present several problems. When they are washed down the street by rainwater, they can clog storm sewers. Secondly, if they are washed into the sewer, chemicals on the grass are washed in the local waterways. It is for this reason that the Borough of Patterson Heights not allow the practice of leaving grass clippings on the streets.

This practice is prohibited by Ordinance, and Council is empowered to levy fines against individuals who choose not to comply. Please sweep up your clippings, or blow them back into your yard. If you use a landscaper, they are subject to the same restrictions, except that the citation will go to the property owner.
