Besides the obvious benefit to the environment, our record on recycling of all types (paper, cardboard, yard waste, leaves, mixed recyclables on Mondays) helps us when we apply for state grants (free money!).....Unfortunately, we still see a lot of cardboard left out with the trash on Mondays when it could be going toward our recycling totals. Remember, it's just a short jaunt to the borough building to unload all of that recycling that is accumulated in the garage!

What happened to our Fire Siren?

Several residents have asked why our Patterson Heights Fire Siren has not been heard at 6 p.m. on Sunday evenings for the past several months. It seems that the siren is broken and is too expensive to repair.





We note with sadness and sympathy the loss of five, long-time Patterson Heights residents since the last publication of the **View From the Heights** in Fall 2018.

On December 7, **Charles "Chap" Andrews** passed away. Chappy lived in Patterson Heights all his life, graduated from Beaver Falls High School and served in the military during WWII. After graduating from Penn State University with a degree in Civil Engineering, he worked for Michael Baker, Jr. and then became City Engineer for the City of Beaver Falls; later he became Manager of the Beaver Falls Municipal Authority.

Chap was an avid Penn State football fan, a member of the Beaver Valley Country Club (later the Beaver Valley Golf Club) and continued to play 18 holes of golf several times a week until three years ago. He was an active member of the Beaver Falls Rotary and a volunteer tax preparer during tax season.

He was a proud Patterson Heights resident, serving the Patterson Heights community in various ways; many terms on the Borough Council and participation on other committees and in other activities.

He is survived by his wife of 65 years, Joann, and their son Mark.

JoAnne Autenreith came to Patterson Heights when she married **Earl Autenreith**, who had been born in Patterson Heights. JoAnne and Earl raised their four children in Patterson Heights and were very much in the Patterson Heights community. Both collectors of locally produced flint glass, they had an extensive collection and wrote a book about the Cooperative Flint Glass that was produced in Beaver Falls in the early 1900's. JoAnne taught at Geneva and did antique appraisals. She and Earl traveled extensively and, as part of the 1976 Bicentennial celebration, were part of a wagon train reenactment that crossed the Plains of the United States. Earl died in February of 2011.

JoAnne took part in many Patterson Heights activities and was always interested in the history of Patterson Heights and the surrounding area. She had recently become a great-grandmother (for the second time) in January and, in early February celebrated her 90th Birthday at a luncheon celebration at the Beaver Valley Golf Club. She died April 7, and is survived by her four children Evan ("Skip"), Tim, Mindy and Amy, five grandchildren and two great-grandchildren.

It is always sad to lose these friends and neighbors from our little community -- their contribution to our community was certainly valued and definitely will be missed my many.

ZONING IN THE BOROUGH

If you plan to make any changes to a structure on your property, including an addition, alteration, deck, demolition, driveway, electrical, excavation, fence, garage, garage demolition, plumbing, porch, porch enclosure, repair, roof, shed, or swimming pool, you could possibly need a zoning permit, a building permit, or both. The permit must be issued BEFORE you begin the work. For more information, or to download the permit application, check the Borough website at <u>www.patterson-hgts.com</u>.

You may also call the Borough office at (724) 846-0677. A word of caution: your contractor is not a good source of information about permits! If he puts your fence or garage in the wrong place, it could cost you as much as \$1,500 for a zoning variance (if the variance is granted)!
