A MESSAGE FROM YOUR TAX COLLECTOR

2020 BOROUGH TAX CHANGES

The Borough tax bills were mailed on March 1. Due to potential financial hardship caused by the Corona Virus lockdown in May, our Borough Council passed Resolution 20-05-1 to extend the DISCOUNT period for the Borough taxes until August 31, 2020. The resolution also eliminated any penalty on the Borough taxes up to December 31, 2020. The revised periods are:

March 1 – August 31 DISCOUNT

September 1 – December 31 FACE

After December 31 PENALTY & LIEN FILED

Any residents who pays their Borough taxes using installment payments are not affected by these changes, and should continue to pay their installments according to the schedule printed on the tax bill.

2020 SCHOOL TAXES

Blackhawk School District tax bills were mailedd July 1, 2020. There are no changes to pay periods for the 2020 School Tax bills.

Eagles in the Heights

Greetings neighbors! Since I've known her for a long time Ruthanne asked me to write a few words about my experience with the big birds down the hill and she knows I like that kind of stuff. For those of you who don't know me, I have lived in Patterson Heights on and off for 40+ of my 60+ some odd years. Debbie and I just settled into an old house on 7th Street (next door to the one in which I grew up) after I retired from the chemical industry last July. We had spent the last 28 years living up on 9th Avenue where she raised a couple of "Heights Kids", while I traveled relentlessly. Retirement is bliss and climbing around in the woods behind the house is something I enjoy now more than I did when I was a 4 year-old following my father around in his new patch of green.

When I was a kid there were only 2 types of large black birds flying around the neighborhood and I imagine you know both of them well; laughing crows heckling from an oak or sugar maple and silent turkey vultures ominously searching for a snack on the local updrafts and thermals. Thanks to a bunch of interested folks (not-the-least Rachel Carson, our local environmental hero), birds of prey are back in great numbers after the DDT ban was enacted in the '70's by USEPA. As a result, a 3rd large black bird (actually dark brown but looking black from far away) is successfully negotiating the hills above the Beaver River. This one has a white head and tail (at least as an adult) and to call it large does not do it justice. The Bald Eagle (Haliaeetus leucocephalus) female nesting in a large sycamore tree above the last bend in the Beaver River easily checks in over 10 lbs with a wing span around 6 1/2 feet and her mate, although clearly smaller, is no less imposing. Bald Eagles are doing so well in the lower 48 that they are no longer considered endangered by USEPA, and the pair nesting below us is no exception. According to the regional PA game warden, the local pair built this nest 3 years ago (overcoming one stretch of significant weather damage) and has raised three broods. This year the female laid two eggs (2 is normal in a range from 1-3) on or about Feb 7 (early around here but not unheard of) and hatched two eaglets in the second/third week of March. As you read this, I imagine both of these eaglets (now almost as big as their parents) have fledged the nest. The young fledged "juveniles" are mostly dark (camo brown and some white) and will not display their bright white head and tail feathers for another 4 years or so. In the meantime, these two will follow cues from their parents and join the numerous other juveniles and mature adults fishing the local waterways until they pair up and build nests of their own.

To see this nest, the best idea is to wander down to Big Rock Park in New Brighton and take advantage of the mounted binoculars at the bend. The nest is the giant mass of sticks and limbs about 3/4 of the way up one of the peeling white sycamore trees on this side of the river. If you are lucky you will see the adults sitting in a tree near the nest or on the flood plain. Look for a flash of bright white. As for the juveniles, you can see many flying around the area - just look up! From a distance you might think it is just another hawk or a turkey vulture, but after a while you will get used to their size, shape, and wing pattern and you can confidently say to yourself, "That is an eagle". We are lucky to have them so close to us. Enjoy the summer.

Use Your Resources

It's always a bit surprising that more people do not know that Patterson Heights has its own website. You can find it at www.pattersonhgts.com. Even if you simply Google "Patterson Heights," the search will show you the link to the website. On the site you can find a great deal of current information, such as a listing of the Borough Council members and their contact information, other officers such as the Mayor, Police Chief, Fire Chief. Code Enforcement Officer, Tax Collector, and Secretary. There is information about current and upcoming festivities, a calendar of events, and a collection of all the Borough Ordinances, both old and new. You can also find and download forms, like applications for zoning and building permits.

The website is a good place to start whenever you are looking for information about something related to Patterson Heights. If you have a specific question, you can also email, pheights600@gmail.com (a new email address), or call the Borough Office at (724) 846-0677. Remember, though, that the office is only manned part-time, and if you need more immediate assistance, call the Secretary or any council member on their cell phones.

Don't Forget Your Permit

With so many of our residents working reduced schedules, many of you are getting around to adding that deck, porch, or shed. If you are unsure if you need a permit for your project, be sure to check with the Borough Office, NOT with your contractor. If you put your fence in the wrong place, and have to move it, shorten it, or get a variance, the result can be more expensive than the original project. An application for a zoning permit costs \$75, but a zoning variance starts at \$800, and the process could easily end up costing 2 or 3 times that amount.

What About the Park? The Food Trucks?

The Park has been reopened, and we hope to have food trucks again beginning the second week of July. We will probably be asked to wear masks as much as possible, and to maintain social distancing. Better to be safe than sorry.

Primary Election

The June 2 Primary Election results were predictable, primarily because most races were uncontested. The majority of votes in Patterson Heights were submitted by mail. 90 mail-in ballots were received at the Courthouse, while 72 voters came in on election day. Republican and Democratic participation were equal, with 81 voters from each party. Between mail-in and in-person voting, Patterson Heights participation was about 36%. Countywide, Democrats turned out at a rate of almost 42%. while about 37% of Republicans voted. Total voter turnout was just under 40%, with 20,000 requests for mail-in ballots, and 38,000 votes actually cast. While it is difficult to predict the pandemic situation on Election Day in November, it is safe to say that the turnout will be much higher. In-person voting will be set up in much the same way (masks, social distancing), but there will be many more voters waiting. People should seriously consider using mail-in ballots.


