

Arts Richmond Literature Festival 2025 Review by York Membery

The 2025 Arts Richmond Literature Festival at Twickenham's Exchange Arts Centre proved a great success.

The annual event kicked off in early November with an 'in conversation' with long-time Radio 4 Today presenter Justin **Webb** discussing his acclaimed memoir, The Gift of a Radio.

The affable broadcaster might have been up late the night before recording the latest Americast podcast, but he spoke with candour and humour about his childhood in Bath, his 40-plus years at the BBC and the current state of US politics.



The following week saw politician-turned diarist Chris Mullin take to the Exchange stage to do an 'in conversation' with Arts Richmond's York Membery, who interviewed three of the four authors appearing. Pictured here with Co-Chairs Sue Pandit, Jean Wit and interviewer York Membery.

After talking about his latest volume of diaries, Didn't You Used to be Chris Mullin? he recalled his years as a politician and journalist fighting for the release of the Birmingham Six, and shared his views on the newish Labour government. (It wasn't exactly a ringing endorsement!)

Week Three saw **Tracy Borman**, Chief Historian at the Historic Royal Palaces and the author of several acclaimed books about Tudor England, give a fascinating illustrated talk about her new book, The Stolen Crown, which looks at the pretenders to the throne during Elizabeth I's long reign. (Spoiler alert: they mostly seem to have ended up in the Tower or going to an early grave.)



Lastly, the broadcaster Reeta Chakrabarti – best known for presenting the peak time news bulletins on BBC One – spoke a bout her moving debut novel, Finding Belle, and her 30-plus-years career as a broadcaster. Pictured here with Sue Pandit

The wide-open spaces of present-day East Anglia give little indication of the region's rich past, a time when Norfolk was one of England's most densely populated and wealthiest areas. During the Middle Ages, a vibrant economy based on trade and farming resulted in the creation of beautiful churches and

fine buildings in the towns. Wealth and power went hand in hand as the centuries passed, and politics also loomed large in East Anglia. For those at the top of the political tree, in many cases men from merchant backgrounds, the system of patronage enabled the building of some of the country's most magnificent country houses, each with its glorious architectural embellishments and splendid art collections.

Here are some of the highlights of this trip. On our way to Norwich, we will visit Flatford Mill. During our stay, we will have a guided tour of Norwich Cathedral, a visit to Sandringham, as well as a visit

to Wells-next-the-Sea and Holkham Hall. We will also have a boat trip, and will go on a steam train! A visit to Ely Cathedral and more.

Strawberry Hill House

Henry VIII's Lost Dagger: From the Tudor Court to the Victorian Stage 1 November 2025 – 15 February 2026 Strawberry Hill House & Garden, Twickenham

This landmark exhibition unravels the lost history of one of Horace Walpole's most talked-about objects: a sixteenth-century Ottoman dagger he believed once belonged to Henry VIII. Richly decorated and recorded in eighteenth-century drawings, the dagger vanished after Walpole's famed 1842 Strawberry Hill Sale, only to reappear in the hands of Victorian actor-manager Charles Kean, who used it on stage in his historically accurate Shakespeare productions. The exhibition traces the object's journey across courts, collections and theatres, revealing how Tudor diplomacy, Ottoman craftsmanship and Gothic imagination became intertwined.

£25 standard | £17.50 students. Experience Strawberry Hill House after hours as part of its major exhibition Henry VIII's Lost Dagger. Visitors arrive from 6 pm for a rosewater spritz, followed by candlelit access to the exhibition rooms, including the Tribune, where two jewelled Ottoman daggers — from Vienna and Welbeck Abbey — are displayed together for the first time. At **7 pm**, art historian Timothy Schroder (FSA) presents Henry VIII's Kunstkammer, an exploration of the King's long-lost cabinet of curiosities at Whitehall Palace. The talk examines how monarchs used rare and exotic objects, including ceremonial Ottoman arms, to assert power, prestige and global reach. The Others Thursday 22 January

Formed in the summer of 1963 in Hampton, The Others were originally a bunch of rebellious schoolmates. Fired up by the Richmond Sound, spearheaded by the likes of the Rolling Stones and the Yardbirds, The Others picked up the baton and ran with it, swiftly building a devoted fan-base of their own and a circuit of regular gigs. In the summer of 1964, they recorded their one and only record, Bo Diddley's "Oh Yeah", on Polydor (TF 501) Their record has become a collectors' item and Brian May's early band, "1984" (later "Smile") used to include The Others' self-penned "B"-side, "I'm Taking Her Home" in their own repertoire. Pete Hammerton, Geoff Coxon, Rob Tolchard and Paul Stewart remained in touch and reformed The Others in 2014. Personal lives got in the way and the Others once again disbanded and have now re-reformed with originals Peter Hammerton, Paul Stewart and Geoff Coxon, with the addition of Tim Staffell, vocalist of Smile, the band that went on to become Queen. www. eelpieclub.com £14. £17 on the door.
