

Utilize every opportunity and avenue available to increase awareness of your local association with both retirees and active teachers who are your future retirees! Utilize the marketing opportunities in your local area to build name recognition and branding. Establish identity both internally and externally to make your presence known. Be accessible by providing contact information for your local association.

This must be a continual process and kept current.

Asking is the most efficient and most successful action you can take. Ask the prospective member to join you in accomplishing the goals of the association in promoting and protecting the well being of retired educators. Please remember that asking is a verb that requires repetition...ask, ask again, and ask again. Asking should be the first ten rules of membership recruitment and retention!

Fastest Growing SCAM...Compromised QR codes!

BEWARE! QR codes may contain malware which will be downloaded into your cellphone to steal your identity and/or information. QR codes are everywhere... from use by diners to obtain menus at restaurants or to access sales, services and alerts! However, scammers are creating fake codes to steal sensitive data, such as account passwords. How to protect yourself? Do not scan codes printed on stickers as scammers sometimes stick fake codes over legitimate ones. Do not scan codes found online or in e-mails unless you are certain the site or sender is legitimate. As always be diligent in protecting your personal and/or sensitive information.

Birdwatching (and the lessons I've learned)

Living in an area with an abundance of trees, water, and suitable food sources, over time I found that I am in a great location to renew an interest in birdwatching. Over the years, I moved birdfeeders closer to the windows of my house to enhance the ability to photograph or just observe close range. Reel-



foot Lake and the Mississippi River are just a few miles away. Not only do I get to observe native songbirds, but also visitors just over-wintering here for a brief time. Most fascinating, I think, are migratory birds following the great flyways.

In 1972, Dr Robert McNeish wrote a sermon to be shared with his church based on observed patterns of geese. His "Lessons from Geese" has been used for years as a metaphor for teaching cooperation and teamwork in schools and leadership training in the corporate world. The essence of his sermon was that we can accomplish more working together, encouraging each other on our journey, and moving in the same direction until we reach our destination. Long journeys are difficult, and often we must travel at night or whenever conditions are favorable.

As we approach the current legislative session and midterm elections, perhaps we should reassess our ranks, align our flock and stay focused on our destination. As retired educators, we do not want to lose or give up any benefits, and we do not want to see our retirement eroded by the current level of inflation. It is important to convey this message to elected officials and candidates. Flocks of geese are noisy. Let's continue to use our collective voice.
