Rhoderick John S. Abellanosa is currently Faculty and Staff Development Officer of the Sacred Heart School–Ateneo de Cebu. His areas of interest (where he has mainly published) are political thought, politics and religion, and the political dimensions of poverty. His articles were published in the *Philippine Sociological Review* (2013), *Asian Horizons* (2013), *Asia Pacific Social Science Review* (2008, 2009), *Asian Perspectives in the Arts and Humanities* (2012), *Philippine Quarterly of Culture and Society* (2011) and *Kritike* (2010) among others. His latest publications are two chapters in the book *A Conversation about Life: Points of View on Reproductive Health* (Claretians, 2014). In 2011, he was awarded a Graduate Research Fellowship by the Asia Research Institute of the National University of Singapore and researched on the relevance of Filipino historiographer Reynaldo Clemena Ileta to Filipino political thought – under the mentorship of Dr. Julius Bautista.

Feorillo Petronilo A. Demeterio is Full Professor of the Department of Filipino, College of Liberal Arts, and Director of the University Research Coordination Office, De La Salle University. He is the author of the books *Ang mga Ideolohiyang Politikang ng Catholic Bishops' Conference of the Philippines* (2012), *Ferdinand Blumentritt and the Philippines* (2013), and *The Socio-Political Discourses of the Catholic Bishops' Conference of the Philippines* (in press) as well as various essays on hermeneutics, cultural studies, Philippines Studies, and Filipino Philosophy that are published in a number of local and international journals. He served as a visiting professor at the Council for Research in Values and Philosophy, Catholic University of America, Washington, D.C., in 2013. In 2014, Dr. Demeterio was recognized as an outstanding alumnus in the field of philosophy by the Graduate School of the University of Santo Tomas.

Jude Raymund J. Festin, SVD is the author of such books as *Beliefs and Certitudes*, *Mindfulness*, and *The Black Nazarene and Philosophy*. He has published articles in international journals on the thoughts of Gadamer, Collingwood, and Wittgenstein. He obtained his Masters in Theology from Divine Word Seminary, Tagaytay City and Doctorate in Philosophy from Katholieke Universiteit Leuven (Louvain), Belgium.

Jan Gresil S. Kahambing is an instructor at the Leyte Normal University. He received all his academic degrees from the University of San Tomas: Bachelor of Philosophy (*Magna Cum Laude*) in 2011; Bachelor of Arts in Classical Studies and Philosophy (*Rector's Awardee, Magna Cum Laude*), in 2013, and Bachelor of Sacred Theology (*Magna Cum Laude*) in 2016. While serving as editor, he has published articles and literary pieces in the publications of the Faculty of Philosophy and Faculty of Sacred Theology in UST. He has also written book reviews in *Philippiniana Sacra* and articles in international journals.

Santiago Sia retired as Professor of Philosophy and Dean of the Faculty of Philosophy at Milltown Institute (National University of Ireland). Prior to that appointment, he was for several years Professor of Philosophy at Loyola Marymount University, Los Angeles, USA, and previously Senior Lecturer in Theology and Philosophy at Newman College (now Newman University College), Birmingham, England. Author/editor of numerous books and journal articles (some of which have been translated into French, German, Slovenian, Russian, and Polish) in the philosophy of religion, in ethics, and in process thought, he has lectured at universities and colleges in various countries throughout the world and has presented papers at a number of international conferences. He is the recipient of various awards, including the Robert Taylor, SJ, Chair in Philosophy at LMU and Senior Research Fellowship from the Katholieke Universiteit Leuven, Belgium. He has also been a participant in the educational systems of several countries: Guest Professor (Katholieke Universiteit, Leuven, Belgium); Aquinas Lecturer (University of Malta); Dharma Endowment Lecturer (Dharmaram Vidya Kshetra, Bangalore, India), Erasmus Exchange Lecturer at the University of Ljubljana, Slovenia and at Sofia University, Sofia, Bulgaria. He was also an invited member of the international consultation on Catholic Universities in the New Europe (Lublin, Poland) and was recruited as consultant on ethical matters and on education for the UN International Atomic Energy Agency in Vienna, Austria, and as an expert adviser for the European Commission, Directorate H-Nuclear, Belgium, and for Autorité de Sûreté Nucléaire, Palais des Congrès, France. Recently he has been closely involved in research with academics in Central and Eastern Europe. He is an alumnus of the Divine Word Seminary of Tagaytay, Philippines (B.A.

and M.A), of St. Patrick's College, Maynooth, Ireland (Honours Bachelor in Divinity) and of Trinity College, University of Dublin, Ireland (Ph.D.).

Noe M. Santillan is Assistant Professor of Philosophy and Social Studies at the University of the Philippines Cebu. He is the spokesperson of Movement Against Tyranny-Cebu. Also, he is a volunteer for the Cebu Archdiocesan Commission on Social Advocacies as educational staff-researcher and for the Save Our Schools Network as teacher-organizer. He has presented papers in both national and international conferences.
