

Radio Alert Test Volunters Needed! Read details below.

Emergency Radio Update

The creation of Southern Marin's emergency radio system is one giant step closer with the presentation of proposals by two competing communications firms. The meeting was held on January 13 at the Mill Valley City Council Chambers and was well attended by representatives from police and fire departments and other city and county agencies. Included were Marin County Fire Chief Stan Rowan, Fire Marshal Jack Rosevear, and Marjorie Goodman, Administrative Aid to Supervisor Gary Giacomini.

One of the firms submitting proposals has arranged for testing to be accomplished prior to the granting of any contracts. A transmitter will be set up at Mill Valley's Public Safety Building, the proposed location for the permanent transmitter. A signal will be generated in the form of a brief pre-recorded message and engineers will be combing the Southern Marin area to test for signal strength and clarity.

We need assistance from our MWPCA members to monitor the proposed frequency (530 on the AM frequency). Those who are usually home during the day on weekdays could monitor the channel for the brief testing period and report back to me at 381-8430. Once the date and time is set for the test our "monitors" will be notified.

The beset results would be obtained if we had about 12 monitors spread throughout the community, especially in some of our valleys and on the West side of Panoramic Highway. We also need to monitor a number of different AM radios including those that are part of our larger stereo systems, portable (transistor type) radios, and those inside our automobiles.

The next step is to pursue the installation of at least one more siren somewhere in the vicinity of Four Corners. This will insure adequate coverage of our entire community in case of emergency. I'll keep you posted.



Board Meeting Highlights, Wednesday, December 2, 1992

Treasurer Clif Davenport reported that the Club's financial status, excluding the Save Mt. Tam funds, was normal. For the first time in his experience, rental income exceeded dues.

Following the success of the Oktoberfest, the Board tentatively planned another dance for New Year's Eve.

Members were reminded of the Fire Department's "Toys for Tots" drive. Toys and canned goods were collected at the fire station or brought to the Children's Party at the Club.

The Board voted to add \$200, for a total contribution of \$400, to John Barnes' efforts to remove the brush along Ridge Avenue.

James Campbell reported that, due to foot-dragging by the Sheriff's Department, the collection of bids on the Emergency Broadcast System was behind schedule. With the project now in the hands of the public authorities, the MWPCA has been cut out of the decision-making loop. Jim will attempt to re-establish good relations with the Fire Department.

The Board urged the Safety Committee to create a menu of potential projects for establishing priorities for public safety programs.

The Environmental Health Committee solicited the names of owners of "clean", i.e., cancerfree, houses which could be tested for electromagnetic radiation as a control on the results of the study of cancer houses in Muir Woods Park.

The Board also approved a tentative calendar of events for the first three months of 1993, after examining the scheduled prepared by Lila Daniels and Peter Hindley.

The next Board meeting will be held at the Club on February 3rd at 8:00 PM.

Environmental Committee Report

New geophysical anomaly discovered on "Hill". Armed with field meters and dowsing rods, Jim Bramell and Del Goetz were checking the area behind Sue Lopez' house. They found an unusually high electromagnetic field below the power lines on the Marin View Avenue easement near its intersection with Mt. View Avenue. field readings at ground level ranged from 2.4 to 5.4 (.5 is normal; anything over 2 is unsafe). When the meter was raised to shoulder height, the field dissipated and readings were normal. Experts haven't encountered this before.

Dowsing indicates a subterranean water course 25 feet below the surface. It is moving downhill directly under and in line with power lines. The field occurs between 40 and 80 feet from a transformer on a pole. We think it is possible that the field generated by the water course is resonating with the field from the transformer creating an enhanced field. Mike Lopez died from brain cancer a few years ago.

A Brief History of ... Muir Woods Park Community Association

It was mud and dust that started the whole thing. Six inches of mud in the winter and six inches of dust in the summer blanketed Panoramic Highway (named Marin View Avenue back then). As the summer of 1935 progressed, the early residents on Throckmorton Ridge were choking on the thick clouds of dust churned up by tourists driving up the mountain now that the famous narrow gauge railway no longer ran up Mount Tamalpais.

The pioneering residents of the neighborhood determined to take collective action to get the road paved, and in September 1935 they formed the Muir Woods Park Improvement Association to pressure the County of Marin to get that job done. MWPIA was incorporated as a non-profit organization in January, 1937. It was recently reincorporated as the Muir Woods Park Community Association.

This was just the first of many successful battles fought by this group to improve and protect the neighborhood. It was for many years the largest improvement association in Marin County -- one long recognized by the County Supervisors as a power to contend with. These community struggles and activities have included:

- · Getting the first mail delivery into the neighborhood
- · Getting school bus and Greyhound bus service on Panoramic
- · Getting natural gas installed on the mountain
- · Becoming our own voting precinct
- · Getting garbage collection
- Supporting one road improvement after another, including helping to pave Ridge Avenue up to the clubhouse
- Helping to defeat a proposed building ordinance which would prohibit one from repairing their own property
- Defeating an attempt to spot zone "Four Corners" for a commercial use so that a gas station could be installed
- More than doubling the number of fire hydrants on the mountain
- Learning about combating the serious fire hazards on the mountain and forming a volunteer fire brigade
- Getting our semi-rural area variously down-zoned to quarter acre, half acre and full acre lot sizes
- Supporting the many successful acquisitions of parklands to gain the open space we all enjoy today
- Defending year after year the natural integrity of the surrounding parklands against excessive exploitation
- Developing a far-sighted master plan for the proper land management of our own neighborhood
- Sponsoring innumerable festive potlucks, parties and special events for community get togethers
- Getting Highway 1 reopened the year after it was closed following the earthquake in 1989

For the past half century the MWPCA has brought together the strong-willed individuals of the mountain to defend, protect and improve the community and surrounding parklands. It promises to continue these good works with your dedicated participation.

P.S. Do you know why our hill is referred to as "nut hill"?
