Please make an effort to participate in this TOWN MEETING. Bring a potluck dish and get to know your neighbors.



Emergency Radio System Test

On Saturday, February 6, a test was conducted of the proposed emergency radio system. A test signal was broadcast for about 2 hours from the Mill Valley Public Safety Building. Several of our neighbors participated in monitoring the signal and reporting on the reception in various parts of our community My own monitoring of the signal strength and clarity involved driving through our community and into some of the more secluded streets.

Once the initial test was completed, I was able to convince the engineers to conduct a second test by transmitting a similar signal from the Throckmortion Fire Station. The signal transmitted from this location provided slightly better coverage of our community than the signal transmitted from Mill Valley., However, it was reported that this signal's range was not adequate to cover Mill Valley.

I later determined that the engineer responsible for testing the "field strength" of the signal in our community did so from a number of locations along Panoramic Highway, and that except for a short section of lower Edgewood, did not venture into our side streets to determine the reception in our neighborhoods. It appears the only data available to address that issue was obtained by myself and our volunteer monitors. As a result of our testing, I am not fully satisfied that the proposed transmitter location is capable of meeting our needs. I will be exploring the possibility of a possible transmitter site on Blithedale Ridge.

If any of you caught the transmission on February 6 and have not yet contacted me with your results, please do so at 381-8430. It's never too late!

I'll keep you posted.

Dear Mr. Maneatis:

The Muir Woods Park Community Association (MWPCA) in Southern Marin County has conducted a survey of cancer occurrence in its neighborhood. Our Environmental Health Committee's cancer cluster study of cancer houses in our area has produced evidence of high EMF's in and around all of the cancer houses studied. As a control group, we have sampled long term residents in households with no cancer. All these houses had low EMF readings. Obviously more study is needed, but many residents rightly find the implications of this study alarming.

We are requesting two actions from PG&E:

1) PG&E should work with the MWPCA to conduct a complete survey of the neighborhood, house by house, to ascertain where problems exist with power lines and transformers.

On several occasions, Mr. Skillman of PG&E has conferred with residents in our area, but more work needs to be done. We feel that conducting a complete and systematic survey of the area at this time is far less disruptive to your staff than having each of the 350 families here make individual requests.

2) PG&E should begin to survey the supply lines immediately. All transformers found to be faulty (emitting high levels of EMFs) or containing PCBs should be removed and replaced prior to the end of 1993.

It is known that some transformers in the area still date from the 1950s. Many are rusting and present a clear hazard to health if they leak or are taken down by windstorm or earthquake.

The MWPCA Board of Directors feels that this issue is of such importance that we are enlisting the aid of our elected officials to help us win PG&E's cooperation.

Board Meeting Highlights, Wednesday, February 3, 1993

Dick Popson welcomed new Board Members and congratulated returning members for the successes we had in 1992.

Del Goetz will devote her primary energies to organizing the community during 1993. She will be looking for ways to actively involve everyone in some way. She will create a Community Organizing Committee, to act as a resource for other committees as they reach out into the community.

Clif Davenport reported that the finances are in good shape. We have \$12,354 in the checking account, including the Save Mt. Tam Fund, and \$7,211 in the money market account. This is the best financial shape ever, largely due to the fundraising efforts last year. Those funds will be spent once a decision is made about the location of the emergency radio broadcasting transmitter.

Income from Clubhouse rentals exceeded income from membership dues for the first time during 1992. So, it was decided that we need to do a major Clubhouse clean-up and then arrange for regular cleaning.

Barney Lenheim was appointed Sergeant-at-Arms.

Bob Rydjord will take over the responsibility of community relations representative.

Kathleen Delehanty will have a "welcome" packet going out to new residents on the mountain beginning in Mid-February.

The next Board meeting will be held at the Club on March 3rd at 8:00 PM.

Pollen Alert! Pollen Alert! Pollen Alert!

Your Environmental Health Committee (EHC) urges all of you with runny noses, sneezing, asthma and other allergy symptoms to beware of the acacia. Acacia is one of the most highly allergic pollens and our woods are full of them.

There are 2 varieties which can be distinguished from one another. The most common one has a fern-like leaf; the less common one has a long, narrow leaf much like a bay tree. Both have yellow blossoms. However, the narrow leaf variety has a lighter, almost creamy colored blossom and is more potent. Both are in bloom now.

Another allergenic pollen currently in bloom is redwood. Yes, redwoods do have pollen--a light, yellow powder that often causes sinusitis and coughing as well as affecting eyes and nose.

Those of you with allergies may contact the EHC Chairperson Del Goetz about how to minimize the impact of pollens that create allergies.

The EHC recommends electronic air filters for furnaces, large amounts of vitamin C, and a chain saw to the acacias as most successful remedies.




1993 Dues are Now Due: Send them in by <u>February 28</u> to AssureYour Listing in the 1993 Directory
