Prescriptive Burning?!

One of the primary goals for our association has been to plan and implement programs addressing the safety and welfare of our community. The predominant issue is that of fire safety and, as we draw closer to the start of the fire season, many questions are being raised concerning the methods by which this danger will be mitigated by our public agencies.

The April 23 General Meeting will be devoted to fire safety. The agenda will include a presentation by Robert Badaracco, Manager of the Environmental Resources Division for the Marin Municipal Water Department, of the proposed fuel management plan and use of prescriptive burning.

Fire Marshal Jack Rosevear, Capt. Frank Neer, and other representatives of the Marin County Fire Department will also be participants in what will prove to be a very interesting program.

The agenda will also include some discussion of the status of the emergency radio system currently under development, the Multi-Agency Wildland Fire Drill set for May 22, community fuel reduction programs, and related issues. However, the primary focus will be fuel management, particularly the application of prescriptive burning.

Board Meeting Highlights

DEL GOETZ SUGGESTED that MWPCA apply for a special permit covering a broad area for removal of exotics from state park lands. It was agreed that the following plants should be listed for removal on the permit: broom, acacia, eucalyptus, pampas grass, anise, Monterey pine, and thistle. The Board approved waiving the usual fee for use of the broom-pulling weed wrench for park exotic removal.

CLIF DAVENPORT REPORTED the finances continue in good shape. The St. Patrick's Day part was a "wash" due to the cost of the band. Peter Hindley reported that the costs of the new secure shed behind the clubhouse will cost about \$1,500.

PLANS for the April 23 General Meeting were approved. The focus of the event will be discussion of the countywide plan for prescriptive burning headed up by Robert Badaracco of MMWD.

KEN BOVERO will push the brush pile on the lower lot over the edge of the hill with his Bobcat on Chipper Day, April 25. The chipper will be there from 10 am-1 pm.

"NO DUMPING" SIGNS will be put near the corner of Ridge and Panoramic to discourage the dumping that has gone on there recently.

A SECURITY DEPOSIT for Clubhouse rentals will normally be \$300; for those members with a good cleanup history, Clif Davenport will have the discretion of reducing the amount to \$100 for members. Costs of cleanup after events will be deducted from deposits.

THE BOARD WILL SPONSOR a booth at the Lions Club Mill Valley Day festivities on May 31. Keith Papulias will organize MWPCA activities.

ROBERT RYDJORD REPORTS that the county agreed try to improve road markings at the Four Corners itersection to help reduce the confusion.

DEL GOETZ REPORTS that the possible reason for delays with the MWPCA incorporation process may be that it lost its incorporation in the 1950s because of a refusal to sign some sort of loyalty oath. Reinstatement should now be easier

KATHLEEN DELEHANTY REPORTS that the welcome packet is available and will go to new members as well as new residents.

- 4) A donation of \$5/household is requested. Funds will go to support our fire prevention efforts.

Environmental Health Committee Report

On March 18, MWPCA members met with representatives of PG&E to discuss our association's request for a survey of the power lines and transformers in our area. We want to be certain that there are no areas of high EMF's. PG&E representatives indicated a reluctance to undertake the survey, but finally admitted that problems do exist and that they will take steps to "mitigate".

We requested that PG&E conduct a complete survey of the neighborhood, house by house, to ascertain where problems exist with power lines and transformers. We asked that any faulty transformers (emitting high levels of EMF's or containing PCB's) be replaced no later than the end of 1993.

We also advised them that static noise from their lines was interfering with our AM safety broadcast reception and requested they "clean it up".

We are still waiting to receive a "letter of understanding" outlining just what PG&E is willing to commit to in the way of "mitigation".

Attending the meeting was MWPCA's President, Dick Popson; V.P., Del Goetz; Cancer Cluster Study Coordinator, Jim Bramell; Disaster Registry Coordinator, Virginia Soper; Environmental Health Committee Member, Stella Winn; Donna Lowe, and Fred Skillman and Brad Cottreau of PG&E.
