PARCEL TAX UPDATE

January 1994 Issue

County Supervisors continue to press property owners for additional revenue. Instead of getting their priorities straight about the fact that taxpayers see a much greater need for fire and paramedic personnel than for planning staff and other clerical efforts, the Sups are pressing for yet another tax.

They are proposing a \$76 tax on each living unit (landlords take heed); \$114 tax on each business; \$38 tax on each unimproved parcel, which doesn't include MMWD lands or Park lands—most of the unincorporated area. They expect the overtaxed property owner to support the burden. We suggest they tax the tourists who use the MMWD and Park lands; we are already paying more than our share.

To make matters worse, the County Administrator, Tom Campanella, has made the decision to take all the monies from the 1 cent sales tax approved by voters in November and give them all to the Sheriff and Justice Departments—none will go for Fire and Paramedic Service. Governor Wilson has issued a public warning to counties trying to misuse the 1 cent sales tax funds, which were designated for public safety. Our association is exploring possible violations with the Governor's Office.

BOARD MEETING HIGHLIGHTS

Saturday, January 8, 1994

To start the year off well, new MWPCA President, Del Goetz hosted a special half-day board meeting to discuss priorities and roles for 1994. Despite the fact that the football playoffs were underway and the heater wasn't working in the Clubhouse, the group stayed focused and productive. (Everyone came except Jim Campbell who was away on business.)

Del was assisted by organization consultant and resident Bill Daniels regarding organizational structures, especially those most appropriate for voluntary organizations. (He and Lila Daniels run a successful business from their garage here on the mountain.)

The analogy of a tree worked well to describe overall roles and responsibilities: board members function as the trunk to sustain the overall organization, the branches are committees, and the leaves are individuals who become involved in specific, issue-related tasks and then move away.

Key motivators for board member participation reflect those of the community at large: political action as a community to protect our safety, respect for each other's privacy while still being part of the community (private but not alone), have fun, be part of the community, help out, and find out what's happening.

As a board we want an organization that effectively deals with specific issues, doesn't 'cry wolf' by creating artificial issues, and respects the influx of new blood coming in which is more interested in social aspects of community. There is a sense that our community may be ahead of the growing trend where people want a greater sense of community.

The board agreed to make more personal contact with community members, which will include developing networks around disaster preparedness.

Committees were formed for the year. Also discussed was the upcoming public hearing about the proposed parcel tax on Tuesday, January 25 at 11:00 AM in the Board of Supervisors Hearing Room #322 at the Civic Center. Interested residents are urged to attend.

PUBLIC SAFETY

Efforts are underway to explore the possibility of creating an emergency fire access road that would connect North Edgewood Avenue to Washington Park Avenue. Property owners have been contacted and hopefully will meet soon with Fire Department personnel to look over the area to determine if the connection is feasible.

The proposal would require bulldozing along the easement between Les Draper's property and that owned by Richard Roncancio. The access would not be open for use; it would be kept chained to prevent through traffic. But, the access would give residents an emergency exit and enable fire fighters to have additional access to the area.



A Brief History of ... Muir Woods Park Community Association

It was mud and dust that started the whole thing. Six inches of mud in the winter and six inches of dust in the summer blanketed Panoramic Highway (named Marin View Avenue back then). As the summer of 1935 progressed, the early residents on Throckmorton Ridge were choking on the thick clouds of dust churned up by tourists driving up the mountain now that the famous narrow gauge railway no longer ran up Mount Tamalpais.

The pioneering residents of the neighborhood determined to take collective action to get the road paved, and in September 1935 they formed the Muir Woods Park Improvement Association to pressure the County of Marin to get that job done. MWPIA was incorporated as a non-profit organization in January, 1937. It was recently reincorporated as the Muir Woods Park Community Association.

This was just the first of many successful battles fought by this group to improve and protect the neighborhood. It was for many years the largest improvement association in Marin County -- one long recognized by the County Supervisors as a power to contend with. These community struggles and activities have included:

- · Getting the first mail delivery into the neighborhood
- · Getting school bus and Greyhound bus service on Panoramic
- · Getting natural gas installed on the mountain
- Becoming our own voting precinct
- Getting garbage collection
- Supporting one road improvement after another, including helping to pave Ridge Avenue up to the clubhouse
- Helping to defeat a proposed building ordinance which would prohibit one from repairing their own property
- Defeating an attempt to spot zone "Four Corners" for a commercial use so that a gas station could be installed
- More than doubling the number of fire hydrants on the mountain
- Learning about combating the serious fire hazards on the mountain and forming a volunteer fire brigade
- Getting our semi-rural area variously down-zoned to quarter acre, half acre and full acre lot sizes
- Supporting the many successful acquisitions of parklands to gain the open space we all enjoy today
- Defending year after year the natural integrity of the surrounding parklands against excessive exploitation
- Developing a far-sighted master plan for the proper land management of our own neighborhood
- Sponsoring innumerable festive potlucks, parties and special events for community get togethers
- Getting Highway 1 reopened the year after it was closed following the earthquake in 1989

For the past half century the MWPCA has brought together the strong-willed individuals of the mountain to defend, protect and improve the community and surrounding parklands. It promises to continue these good works with your dedicated participation.
